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12	Section 1. Subsection (15) of section 121.021, Florida
13	Statutes, is amended to read:

17	(15) "Special risk member" means a member who meets the
18	criteria specified in s. 121.0515.
19	(a) Until October 1, 1978, "special risk member" means any
20	officer or employee whose application is approved by the
21	administrator and who receives salary payments for work
22	performed as a peace officer; law enforcement officer; police
23	officer; highway patrol officer; custodial employee at a
24	correctional or detention facility; correctional agency employee
25	whose duties and responsibilities involve direct contact with
26	inmates, but excluding secretarial and clerical employees;
27	firefighter; or an employee in any other job in the field of law
28	enforcement or fire protection if the duties of such person are
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29 certified as hazardous by his or her employer.

(b) Effective October 1, 1978, "special risk member" means 30 a member of the Florida Retirement System who is designated as a 31 32 special risk member by the division in accordance with s. 121.0515. Such member must be employed as a law enforcement 33 34 officer, a firefighter, or a correctional officer and must meet 35 certain other special criteria as set forth in s. 121.0515. 36 (c) Effective October 1, 1999, "special risk member" means 37 a member of the Florida Retirement System who is designated as a special risk member by the division in accordance with s. 38 39 121.0515. Such member must be employed as a law enforcement 40 officer, a firefighter, a correctional officer, an emergency 41 medical technician, or a paramedic and must meet certain other special criteria as set forth in s. 121.0515. 42 (d) 1. Effective January 1, 2001, "special risk member" 43 44 includes any member who is employed as a community-based correctional probation officer and meets the special criteria 45 set forth in s. 121.0515(2)(e). 46 47 2. In addition, the member's primary duties and 209 responsibilities must be the supervised custody, surveillance, 210 control, investigation, apprehension, arrest, and counseling of 211 assigned juveniles within the community.; or 212 (f) (h) Effective October 1, 2005, through June 30, 2008, 213 the member must be employed by a law enforcement agency or 214 medical examiner's office in a forensic discipline recognized by the International Association for Identification and must 215 216 qualify for active membership in the International Association 217 for Identification. Crime laboratory analyst (class code 8463); Senior crime laboratory analyst (class code 8464); 234 4. Crime laboratory analyst supervisor (class code 8466); 235 5. 236 6. Forensic chief (class code 9602); or 237 7. Forensic services quality manager (class code 9603). 238 (h) (i) Effective July 1, 2008, the member must be employed 239 by a local government law enforcement agency or medical 240 examiner's office and must spend at least 65 percent of his or 241 her time performing duties that involve the collection, 242 examination, preservation, documentation, preparation, or 243 analysis of human tissues or fluids or physical evidence having 244 potential biological, chemical, or radiological hazard or 245 contamination, or use chemicals, processes, or materials that 246 may have carcinogenic or health-damaging properties in the 247 analysis of such evidence, or the member must be the direct 248 supervisor of one or more individuals having such 249 responsibility. If a special risk member changes to another 250 position within the same agency, he or she must submit a 251 complete application as provided in paragraph (3)(a). 252 (i) Effective July 1, 2010, special risk membership also

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253 includes a member who is a court deputy in the state courts 254 system and whose primary duties include transporting, 255 controlling, and fingerprinting prisoners within the courthouse; 256 maintaining care and control of juries; notifying court 257 administration when larger courtrooms are needed, bringing 258 judge's supplies to the courtroom, announcing the judge and 259 calling the court to order; and maintaining a safe and secure 260 environment for the public in a courtroom setting. 261 Administrative support personnel, including, but not limited to, those whose primary responsibilities are clerical or in 262 263 accounting, purchasing, legal, and personnel, are not included. 264 (4) REMOVAL OF SPECIAL RISK MEMBERSHIP.-Any member who is a special risk member on July 1, 265 (b) 266 2008, and who became eligible to participate under paragraph 267 (2) (f) $\frac{(2)}{(h)}$ but fails to meet the criteria for special risk 268 membership under established by paragraph (2) (g) $\frac{(2)(i)}{(i)}$ or 269 paragraph (2) (h) $\frac{(2)(j)}{(j)}$ shall have his or her special risk

270 designation removed and thereafter shall be a Regular Class 271 member and earn only Regular Class membership credit. The 272 department may review the special risk designation of members to 273 determine whether or not those members continue to meet the 274 criteria for special risk membership.

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(9) CREDIT FOR UPGRADED SERVICE.-

(c) Any member of the Special Risk Class who has earned
creditable service in another membership class of the Florida
Retirement System in a position with the Department of Law
Enforcement or the Division of State Fire Marshal and became
covered by the Special Risk Class as described in paragraph

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281 (2) (q) $\frac{(2)(i)}{(2)(i)}$, or with a local government law enforcement agency 282 or medical examiner's office and became covered by the Special 283 Risk Class as described in paragraph (2)(h) $\frac{(2)(j)}{(2)(j)}$, which 284 service is within the purview of the Special Risk Class, and is 285 employed in such position on or after July 1, 2008, may purchase additional retirement credit to upgrade such service to Special 286 287 Risk Class service, to the extent of the percentages of the 288 member's average final compensation provided in s. 289 121.091(1)(a)2. The cost for such credit must shall be an amount 290 representing the actuarial accrued liability for the difference in accrual value during the affected period of service. The cost 291 292 shall be calculated using the discount rate and other relevant 293 actuarial assumptions that were used to value the Florida 294 Retirement System defined benefit plan liabilities in the most recent actuarial valuation. The Division of Retirement shall 295 296 ensure that the transfer sum is prepared using a formula and 297 methodology certified by an enrolled actuary. The cost must be 298 paid immediately upon notification by the division. The local 299 government employer may purchase the upgraded service credit on 300 behalf of the member if the member has been employed by that 301 employer for at least 3 years. 302

302 Section 3. <u>The Legislature finds that a proper and</u> 303 <u>legitimate state interest is served when state court employees</u> 304 <u>who are responsible for maintaining a safe and secure</u> 305 <u>environment for staff and the public in a courtroom setting are</u> 306 <u>classified as members of the special risk class of the Florida</u> 307 <u>Retirement System. These persons must be provided benefits that</u> 308 <u>are fair and adequate and that are managed, administered, and</u>

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309	funded in an actuarially sound manner as required by s. 14,
310	Article X of the State Constitution, and part VII of chapter
311	112, Florida Statutes. Therefore, the Legislature determines and
312	declares that the amendment of s. 121.0515, Florida Statutes,
313	made by this act fulfills an important state interest.
314	Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2010.
