House Memorial

A memorial to the Congress of the United States, urging Congress to pass comprehensive clean energy legislation.

WHEREAS, the United States currently spends approximately \$1 billion each day to import oil, and the United States

Department of Energy estimates that without comprehensive clean energy legislation, the nation's reliance on foreign oil could cost \$8.5 trillion by 2030, and

WHEREAS, under the current energy policy of the United States, wealth is being transferred to nations that are rich with oil, many of which are politically unstable or unfriendly to the United States, and

WHEREAS, the generation of electricity through the use of renewable energy presents opportunities to promote energy self-sufficiency, create jobs and economic benefits, preserve natural resources, and improve the environment, and

WHEREAS, over the past two decades, in the absence of comprehensive federal clean energy legislation, many states have been the true "laboratories of democracy" by independently advancing clean energy policies, and

WHEREAS, many states have adopted renewable energy standards and goals that require a significant percentage of a state's electricity to be generated from non-fossil fuel renewable energy sources such as wind, solar, wave, hydropower, biomass, and biofuels, which have led to significant job growth in the clean energy sector of the national economy, and

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WHEREAS, the Pew Charitable Trusts reports that employment in the field of clean energy has risen by nearly 250 percent over the last decade at a rate approximately 10 percent faster than the rest of the job market, and

WHEREAS, thousands of businesses have joined together in calling for comprehensive federal clean energy legislation, including the United States Climate Action Group and the Clean Economy Network, and

WHEREAS, the United States Energy Information

Administration predicts the creation of up to 2 million new jobs

as a result of comprehensive clean energy legislation, and

WHEREAS, there is significant global competition for clean energy development, and without comprehensive clean energy legislation, such competition could weaken the economy and threaten clean energy innovation in the United States, and

WHEREAS, without congressional action, the United States Environmental Protection Agency intends to regulate greenhouse gas emissions through administrative rules, and

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2009, the United States House of Representatives passed the American Clean Energy and Security Act on a bipartisan vote, and bipartisan members of the United States Senate are currently considering and drafting the Clean Energy Jobs and American Power Act, and

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has the historic opportunity to enact comprehensive clean energy legislation that will strengthen our national security, increase the number of clean energy jobs, reduce pollution, and advance clean energy innovation in the United States, NOW, THEREFORE,

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Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the United States Congress is urged to pass comprehensive clean energy legislation to create a unified framework that reduces greenhouse gas emissions; protects low-income and moderate-income citizens from increased energy costs; invests substantially in energy efficiency; supports alternative sources of energy, including, but not limited to, wind, solar, wave, hydroelectricity, biofuels, advanced nuclear energy research, and clean coal technologies; provides strong protections for environmentally sensitive offshore and onshore oil and gas exploration and makes all new exploration subject to the approval of affected states; acknowledges the carbonintensive nature of the United States economy and includes emissions offsets that protect energy consumers; does not preempt state legislative efforts to control carbon emissions; and advances clean energy innovations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be dispatched to the President of the United States, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the Florida delegation to the United States Congress.

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
