A bill to be entitled

An act relating to health care transition programs and services for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs; providing legislative intent; establishing an office within the Division of Children's Medical Services Network in the Department of Health to implement a health care transition program for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs; specifying duties of the office with respect to the oversight, implementation, and coordination of the program; requiring that the office provide technical assistance to communities, providers, and organizations; requiring the Department of Health, in partnership with the Agency for Health Care Administration, to identify options for addressing the compensation of health care providers and improving access to adult and specialty health care for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs; requiring the department to enter into contracts, contingent upon appropriations, with local health and transition services programs; providing requirements for program structure and design; specifying the services that may be offered by local health and transition services programs; requiring that at least one health and transition services program be associated with each of the eight regions of the Children's Medical Services Network; requiring an evaluation of the program; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. <u>Legislative intent; health care transition</u> programs and services for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs.—

- (1) It is the intent of the Legislature to provide a strategic and comprehensive approach to the development and implementation of effective health care transition programs and services for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs.
- (2) An office is established within the Division of Children's Medical Services Network which shall be responsible for:
- (a) Overseeing and implementing the national maternal and child health goals, using existing state plans, in order to implement effective transition programs for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs. As used in this section, the term "adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs" means individuals who are 12 through 26 years of age; who have chronic physical, developmental, behavioral, or emotional conditions; and who require health care or related services of a type or amount beyond that which is generally required by adolescents or young adults.
- (b) Developing a planning and implementation process and the necessary guides for use by community providers and organizations in developing coordinated systems of services for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs.

  The coordinated system of services shall include different

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models that accommodate the geographic and cultural diversity in the state and that are adapted to the local needs of communities and to local health services delivery systems. Furthermore, the models shall promote the integration of health care transition services with transition programs in education, vocational rehabilitation, and independent living, and shall address the varying needs of subpopulations, such as students who are enrolled in postsecondary educational institutions and individuals in the child welfare or juvenile justice systems.

- (c) Developing and disseminating resource guides that outline the various public and private health care financing options, including commercial insurance, and the respective health care benefits.
- (d) Coordinating the program with training institutions, including medical centers, to identify and make available for health care providers existing training programs regarding the principles, objectives, and methods of successfully transferring adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs to adult health care providers.
- (e) Maintaining and updating web-based materials related to health care transition which can be used by adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs and their families, providers, and others involved in health care transition.
- (f) Collecting and disseminating information in specific clinical areas concerning evidenced-based practices and best practices for providing health care transition services for youth and young adults who have chronic special health care needs or disabilities.

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(g) Providing technical assistance to communities, providers, and organizations that are involved in the development and implementation of systems of services for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs.

- (h) Developing and disseminating quality improvement and evaluation components for health care transition programs. The quality improvement and evaluation components must include a common or comparable set of performance measures for all entities that provide health care transition services for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs.
- (3) The Department of Health shall work in partnership with the Agency for Health Care Administration to identify potential waiver or state plan options that address health care provider compensation strategies, including, but not limited to, comanagement, care plan development and oversight, provision of a medical home, and use of tele-health technology to improve access to adult and specialty health care for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs.
- (4) The Department of Health shall work with the Office of Insurance Regulation to explore and recommend effective policies that address medical management and health care transition services for adolescents and young adults who have special health care needs.
- (5) The Department of Health may enter into contracts, contingent upon a specific appropriation provided in the General Appropriations Act for this purpose, with local health and transition services programs that meet the requirements of this section.
  - (6) The program structure and design must be adapted to the

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needs of the local community and health services delivery

system; however, the following elements shall be in place in

order to ensure the success of a local health and transition

services program:

- (a) A consultative partnership between adult and pediatric health care providers in a major medical health care organization or academic medical setting for the purpose of transferring adolescents and young adults to adult health care services.
- (b) Community-based health care services that are provided under agreements with major health care organizations or academic medical centers for the purpose of providing consultation concerning the management of special health care needs.
- (c) Community-based support organizations that can provide assistance with services such as supported living and employment, health insurance, and support services to maintain the young adult in the community.
- (d) A medical home that provides for coordinated and multidisciplinary care and focuses on engaging adult health care providers in the care and treatment of adolescents or young adults.
- (7) The following services may be offered by the local health and transition services program to individuals who are served in the local health and transition services program:
- (a) An assessment of health needs, education and vocational status and needs, and health insurance status.
- (b) In coordination with the educational system, community-based organizations, and the vocational system, a plan for

(8) There shall be at least one transition program 150 151 associated with each one of the eight regions of the Children's 152 Medical Services Network, subject to the availability of funds. 153 (9) The local health and transition services program shall 154 be evaluated by an organization or university that has expertise 155 and experience in evaluating health care programs. The 156 evaluation must be formative and cumulative and must include 157 program process and outcome measures, as well as client 158 outcomes. The results of the evaluation may be used by the 159 department to improve and develop other local health and 160 transition services programs.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2010.

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
