An act relating to the state university system; amending s. 1001.706, F.S.; revising the powers and duties of the Board of Governors relating to accountability; requiring that the board align the missions of each constituent university; amending s. 1004.226, F.S.; revising the legislative findings and intent relating to the 21st Century Technology, Research, and Scholarship Enhancement Act to conform to changes made by the act; amending s. 1007.33, F.S.; revising provisions that require a Florida college to provide notice of its intent to propose a baccalaureate degree program; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Subsection (4) of section 1001.706, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1001.706 Powers and duties of the Board of Governors.-

- (4) POWERS AND DUTIES RELATING TO ACCOUNTABILITY.-
- (a) The Board of Governors shall align the missions of each constituent university with the quality of its students; the national reputation of its faculty and its academic and research programs; the quantity of externally generated research, patents, and licenses; and the strategic and accountability plans required in paragraphs (b) and (c). The mission alignment and strategic plan shall consider peer institutions at the constituent universities. The mission alignment and strategic

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plan shall acknowledge that universities that have a national and international impact have the greatest capacity to promote the state's economic development through: new discoveries, patents, licenses, and technologies that generate state businesses of global importance; research achievements through external grants and contracts that are comparable to nationally recognized and ranked universities; the creation of a resourcerich academic environment that attracts high-technology business and venture capital to the state; and this generation's finest minds focusing on solving the state's economic, social, environmental, and legal problems in the areas of life sciences, water, sustainability, energy, and health care. A nationally recognized and ranked university that has a global perspective and impact shall be afforded the freedom to pursue an agenda on the global stage in fair competition with other institutions of other states in the highest Carnegie classification.

- (b) (a) The Board of Governors shall develop a strategic plan specifying goals and objectives for the State University System and each constituent university.
- $\underline{\text{(c)}}$ The Board of Governors shall develop an accountability plan for the State University System and each constituent university.
- (d) (e) The Board of Governors shall maintain an effective information system to provide accurate, timely, and costeffective information about each university. The board shall continue to collect and maintain, at a minimum, the management information databases as such databases existed on June 30, 2002.
 - (e) (d) If the Board of Governors of the State University

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System determines that a state university board of trustees is unwilling or unable to address substantiated allegations made by any person relating to waste, fraud, or financial mismanagement within the state university, the Office of the Inspector General shall investigate the allegations.

Section 2. Subsection (1) of section 1004.226, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1004.226 The 21st Century Technology, Research, and Scholarship Enhancement Act.—

- (1) LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND INTENT.
- (a) The Legislature finds that diversifying this state's economy requires a focus on building a growing base of high-wage jobs and on nurturing those technologies and clusters that will be the foundation of Florida's growing economic diversity and prosperity.
- (b) The Legislature further finds that special programs are needed to facilitate the recruitment of exceptional talent to Florida's research universities and centers and to provide the infrastructure and resources that precipitate joint efforts and coinvestment among state research and development institutions, private industry, and government. Florida needs consistent commitment and investment in order to further the state's strategy of capitalizing on innovative research and development to build a thriving, technology-rich economy.
- (c) The Legislature further finds that a university that has a national and international impact has the greatest capacity to promote the state's economic development through: new discoveries, patents, licenses, and technologies that generate state businesses of global importance; research

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achievements through external grants and contracts that are comparable to nationally recognized and ranked universities; the creation of a resource-rich academic environment that attracts high-technology business and venture capital to the state; and this generation's finest minds focusing on solving the state's economic, social, environmental, and legal problems in the areas of life sciences, water, sustainability, energy, and health care. A nationally recognized and ranked university that has a global perspective and impact shall be afforded the freedom to pursue an agenda on the global stage in fair competition with other institutions of other states in the highest Carnegie classification.

Section 3. Paragraphs (a) and (b) of subsection (5) of section 1007.33, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

1007.33 Site-determined baccalaureate degree access.-

- (5) The approval process for baccalaureate degree programs shall require:
- (a) Each Florida college to submit a notice of its intent to propose a baccalaureate degree program to the Division of Florida Colleges and the Chancellor of the State University

 System at least 100 days before the submission of its proposal under paragraph (d). The notice must include a brief description of the program, the workforce demand and unmet need for graduates of the program, the geographic region to be served, and an estimated timeframe for implementation. Notices of intent may be submitted by a Florida college at any time throughout the year.
- (b) The Division of Florida Colleges to forward the notice of intent within 10 business days after receiving such notice to

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the Chancellor of the State University System, the President of the Independent Colleges and Universities of Florida, and the Executive Director of the Council for Independent Education. State universities shall have 60 days following receipt of the notice by the Chancellor of the State University System to submit an alternative proposal to offer the baccalaureate degree program. If a proposal from a state university is not received within the 60-day period, the State Board of Education shall provide regionally accredited private colleges and universities 30 days to submit an alternative proposal. Alternative proposals shall be submitted to the Division of Florida Colleges and must be considered by the State Board of Education in making its decision to approve or deny a Florida college's proposal.

Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2010.

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
