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An act relating to attorney's fees in workers' compensation cases; amending s. 112.1815, F.S.; providing that the finder of fact and law is not bound by provisions of state law relating to the provision of indemnity or medical benefits for employment-related accidents or injuries when awarding attorney's fees in cases involving first responders; requiring that the finder of fact and law consider certain factors when awarding attorney's fees in such cases; providing a statement of important state interest; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

- Section 1. Subsection (5) is added to section 112.1815, Florida Statutes, to read:
- 112.1815 Firefighters, paramedics, emergency medical technicians, and law enforcement officers; special provisions for employment-related accidents and injuries.—
- (5) For purposes of first responders as defined in subsection (1), the finder of fact and law is not bound by any statutory provision regarding attorney's fees relating to the provision of indemnity or medical benefits for employment-related accidents or injuries, but must consider the following factors when awarding attorney's fees:
- (a) The time and labor required, the novelty and difficulty of the questions involved, and the skill required to perform the legal service properly.

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(b) The fee customarily charged in the locality for similar legal services.

- (c) The amount involved in the controversy and the benefits payable to the claimant.
- (d) The time limitations imposed by the claimant or the circumstances.
- (e) The experience, reputation, and ability of the attorney or attorneys performing services.
 - (f) The contingency or certainty of a fee.
- Section 2. The Legislature finds that this act fulfills an important state interest relating to the public interest in prompt and adequate response to provide for the safety of the public unique to first responders.
 - Section 3. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
