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An act relating to the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; amending s. 1009.53, F.S.; revising the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program beginning with initial awards to students for the 2011 fall term; amending s. 1009.531, F.S., relating to student eligibility requirements for initial awards, to conform to changes made by the act; updating a cross-reference to high school graduation requirements; creating s. 1009.5315, F.S.; providing that, for students receiving initial awards beginning with the 2011 fall term, the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program shall consist of five levels of awards; specifying student eligibility requirements and award amounts for each level of award; defining the term "tuition and fees" for purposes of award amounts; providing requirements for renewal of awards; amending s. 1009.532, F.S., relating to student eligibility requirements for renewal awards, to conform to changes made by the act; amending s. 1009.538, F.S., relating to the calculation of awards for students attending nonpublic institutions, to conform to changes made by the act; amending s. 1009.24, F.S., relating to state university student fees, to conform to changes made by the act; providing that the tuition differential shall be included in the calculation of Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program award amounts beginning with initial awards to students for the 2011 fall term; providing an

effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsections (2) and (3), paragraph (a) of subsection (4), and subsection (7) of section 1009.53, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

1009.53 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program.-

- (2) The Bright Futures Scholarship Program consists of three types of awards: the Florida Academic Scholarship, the Florida Medallion Scholarship, and the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship. Beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term, the Bright Futures Scholarship Program consists of five levels of Florida Bright Futures Scholarships.
- (3) The Department of Education shall administer the Bright Futures Scholarship Program according to rules and procedures established by the State Board of Education. A single application must be sufficient for a student to apply for any of the three types of awards or for any of the five levels of awards beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term. The department must advertise the availability of the scholarship program and must notify students, teachers, parents, guidance counselors, and principals or other relevant school administrators of the criteria and application procedures. The department must begin this process of notification no later than January 1 of each year.
- (4) Funding for the Bright Futures Scholarship Program must be allocated from the Education Enhancement Trust Fund and must be provided before allocations from that fund are calculated for

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disbursement to other educational entities.

- (a) If funds appropriated are not adequate to provide the maximum allowable award to each eligible applicant, awards in all three components of the program or in all five levels of the program beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term must be prorated using the same percentage reduction.
- (7) A student may receive only one type or level of award from the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program at a time, but may transfer from one type or level of award to another through the renewal application process, if the student's eligibility status changes. However, a student is not eligible to transfer from a Florida Medallion Scholarship or a Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship to a Florida Academic Scholarship. A student who receives an award from the program may also receive a federal family education loan or a federal direct loan, and the value of the award must be considered in the certification or calculation of the student's loan eligibility.

Section 2. Subsections (1), (4), and (5) of section 1009.531, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

1009.531 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; student eligibility requirements for initial awards.—

- (1) Effective January 1, 2008, In order to be eligible for an initial award from any of the three types of scholarships or for an initial award beginning with the 2011 fall term from any of the five levels of scholarships under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program, a student must:
- (a) Be a Florida resident as defined in s. 1009.40 and rules of the State Board of Education.

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(b) Earn a standard Florida high school diploma or its equivalent as described in $\underline{s.\ 1003.428}$, $\underline{s.\ 1003.429}$, $\underline{s.\ 1003.435}$ unless:

- 1. The student completes a home education program according to s. 1002.41; or
- 2. The student earns a high school diploma from a non-Florida school while living with a parent or guardian who is on military or public service assignment away from Florida.
- (c) Be accepted by and enroll in an eligible Florida public or independent postsecondary education institution.
- (d) Be enrolled for at least 6 semester credit hours or the equivalent in quarter hours or clock hours.
- (e) Not have been found guilty of, or entered a plea of nolo contendere to, a felony charge, unless the student has been granted clemency by the Governor and Cabinet sitting as the Executive Office of Clemency.
- (f) Apply for a scholarship from the program by high school graduation.
- (4) Each school district shall annually provide to each high school student a complete and accurate Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Evaluation Report and Key. The report shall be disseminated at the beginning of each school year. The report must include all high school coursework attempted, the number of credits earned toward each type or level of award, and the calculation of the grade point average for each type or level of award. The report must also identify all requirements not met per type or level of award, including the grade point average requirement, as well as identify the types or levels of awards for which the student has met the academic requirements. The

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student report cards must contain a disclosure that the grade point average calculated for purposes of the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program may differ from the grade point average on the report card.

(5) A student who wishes to qualify for a particular type or level of award within the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program, but who does not meet all of the requirements for that type or level of award, may, nevertheless, receive the award for that type or level if the principal of the student's school or the district superintendent verifies that the deficiency is caused by the fact that school district personnel provided inaccurate or incomplete information to the student. The school district must provide a means for the student to correct the deficiencies and the student must correct them, either by completing comparable work at the postsecondary institution or by completing a directed individualized study program developed and administered by the school district. If the student does not complete the requirements by December 31 immediately following high school graduation, the student is ineligible to participate in the program.

Section 3. Section 1009.5315, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

1009.5315 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program awards.—

(1) For students receiving initial awards beginning with the 2011 fall term, the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship

Program shall consist of five levels of awards. A student is eligible for one of the five levels of awards if the student meets the general eligibility requirements for the program under

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s. 1009.531 and the requirements for one of the five levels as follows:

- (a) A Level I award requires that the student:
- 1.a. Has achieved at least a 3.0 weighted grade point average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high school courses that are designated by the State Board of Education as college preparatory academic courses and has attained a score of at least 970 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or
- b. Has completed a college preparatory curriculum in a home education program pursuant to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 that has been documented through a transcript approved by the Department of Education, has completed the International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma, or has completed the Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained a score of at least 970 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program.
- 2. Has completed a program of community service work, as approved by the district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic school, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service work and require the student to identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or her experience.

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(b) A Level II award requires that the student:

1.a. Has achieved at least a 3.5 weighted grade point average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high school courses that are designated by the State Board of Education as college preparatory academic courses and has attained a score of at least 1100 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or

b. Has completed a college preparatory curriculum in a home education program pursuant to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 that has been documented through a transcript approved by the Department of Education, has completed the International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma, or has completed the Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained a score of at least 1100 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program.

2. Has completed a program of community service work, as approved by the district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic school, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service work and require the student to identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or her experience.

- (c) A Level III award requires that the student:
- 1.a. Has achieved at least a 3.5 weighted grade point

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average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its
equivalent, in high school courses that are designated by the
State Board of Education as college preparatory academic courses
and has attained a score of at least 1200 on the combined
reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an
equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or

- b. Has completed a college preparatory curriculum in a home education program pursuant to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 that has been documented through a transcript approved by the Department of Education, has completed the International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma, or has completed the Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained a score of at least 1200 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program.
- 2. Has completed a program of community service work, as approved by the district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic school, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service work and require the student to identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or her experience.
 - (d) A Level IV award requires that the student:
- 1.a. Has achieved at least a 3.5 weighted grade point average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high school courses that are designated by the

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State Board of Education as college preparatory academic courses
and has attained a score of at least 1300 on the combined
reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an
equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program;

- b. Has completed a college preparatory curriculum in a home education program pursuant to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 that has been documented through a transcript approved by the Department of Education, has completed the International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma, or has completed the Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained a score of at least 1300 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program;
- c. Has been awarded an International Baccalaureate Diploma from the International Baccalaureate Office or an Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma from the University of Cambridge International Examinations Office;
- d. Has been recognized by the merit or achievement programs of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a scholar or finalist; or
- $\underline{\text{e. Has been recognized by the National Hispanic Recognition}}\\ \text{Program as a scholar recipient.}$
- 2. Has completed a program of community service work, as approved by the district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic school, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service work and require the student to identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her

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personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through
papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or
her experience.

- (e) A Level V award requires that the student:
- 1.a. Has achieved at least a 3.5 weighted grade point average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high school courses that are designated by the State Board of Education as college preparatory academic courses and has attained a score of at least 1400 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program;
- b. Has completed a college preparatory curriculum in a home education program pursuant to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 that has been documented through a transcript approved by the Department of Education, has completed the International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma, or has completed the Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained a score of at least 1400 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program;
- c. Has been awarded an International Baccalaureate Diploma from the International Baccalaureate Office or an Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma from the University of Cambridge International Examinations Office and has attained a score of at least 1400 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program;

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d. Has been recognized by the merit or achievement programs of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a scholar or finalist and has attained a score of at least 1400 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or

- e. Has been recognized by the National Hispanic Recognition
 Program as a scholar recipient and has attained a score of at
 least 1400 on the combined reading and mathematics sections of
 the SAT Reasoning Test or an equivalent score on the ACT
 Assessment Program.
- 2. Has completed a program of community service work, as approved by the district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic school, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service work and require the student to identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or her experience.
- (2) (a) For purposes of this section, the term "tuition and fees" includes the following fees to the extent assessed by a community college or state university:
 - 1. Tuition.
 - 2. Financial aid fee.
- 3. Activity and service fee.
- 315 4. Health fee.
- 316 5. Athletic fee.
- 317 6. Capital improvement fee.
 - 7. Building fee.
- 319 8. Transportation access fee.

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9. Student affairs facility use fee.

- 10. Tuition differential fee.
- (b) Beginning with Florida Bright Futures Scholarships initially awarded for the 2011 fall term, the amount of awards pursuant to subsection (1) shall be as follows:
- 1. A Level I award shall pay 100 percent of the cost of tuition and fees that a student incurs while enrolled in a certificate, diploma, or associate degree program at a community college or career center. A student who completes an associate degree program is eligible for a Level II award for the cost of tuition and fees for a baccalaureate degree program at a community college, a state university, or a comparable eligible independent postsecondary education institution pursuant to s. 1009.533.
- 2. A Level II award shall pay 25 percent of the cost of tuition and fees that a student incurs while enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program at a state university or a fixed amount calculated according to s. 1009.538 at a comparable eligible independent postsecondary education institution pursuant to s. 1009.533. A student who is eligible for a Level II award is eligible for a Level I award if the student enrolls at a community college or career center.
- 3. A Level III award shall pay 50 percent of the cost of tuition and fees that a student incurs while enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program at a state university or a fixed amount calculated according to s. 1009.538 at a comparable eligible independent postsecondary education institution pursuant to s. 1009.533. A student who is eligible for a Level III award is eligible for a Level I award if the student enrolls

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at a community college or career center.

- 4. A Level IV award shall pay 75 percent of the cost of tuition and fees that a student incurs while enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program at a state university or a fixed amount calculated according to s. 1009.538 at a comparable eligible independent postsecondary education institution pursuant to s. 1009.533. A student who is eligible for a Level IV award is eligible for a Level I award if the student enrolls at a community college or career center.
- 5. A Level V award shall pay 100 percent of the cost of tuition and fees that a student incurs while enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program at a state university or a fixed amount calculated according to s. 1009.538 at a comparable eligible independent postsecondary education institution pursuant to s. 1009.533. A student who is eligible for a Level V award is eligible for a Level I award if the student enrolls at a community college or career center.
- (3) To be eligible to renew any of the five levels of awards, a student must maintain the equivalent of a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale and meet the eligibility requirements for renewal under s. 1009.532.
- Section 4. Subsection (1) of section 1009.532, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
- 1009.532 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; student eligibility requirements for renewal awards.—
- (1) To be eligible to renew a scholarship from any of the three types of scholarships or, beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term, from any of the five levels of scholarships under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship

378 Program, a student must:

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- (a) Effective for students funded in the 2009-2010 academic year and thereafter, earn at least 24 semester credit hours or the equivalent in the last academic year in which the student earned a scholarship if the student was enrolled full time, or a prorated number of credit hours as determined by the Department of Education if the student was enrolled less than full time for any part of the academic year. If a student fails to earn the minimum number of hours required to renew the scholarship, the student shall lose his or her eligibility for renewal for a period equivalent to 1 academic year. Such student is eligible to restore the award the following academic year if the student earns the hours for which he or she was enrolled at the level defined by the department and meets the grade point average for renewal. A student is eligible for such restoration one time. The department shall notify eligible recipients of the provisions of this paragraph. Each institution shall notify award recipients of the provisions of this paragraph during the registration process.
- (b) Maintain the cumulative grade point average required by the scholarship program, except that:
- 1. If a recipient's grades fall beneath the average required to renew a Florida Academic Scholarship, but are sufficient to renew a Florida Medallion Scholarship or a Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship, the Department of Education may grant a renewal from one of those other scholarship programs, if the student meets the renewal eligibility requirements;
 - 2. If, at any time during the eligibility period, a

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student's grades are insufficient to renew the scholarship, the student may restore eligibility by improving the grade point average to the required level. A student is eligible for such a restoration one time. The Legislature encourages education institutions to assist students to calculate whether or not it is possible to raise the grade point average during the summer term. If the institution determines that it is possible, the education institution may so inform the department, which may reserve the student's award if funds are available. The renewal, however, must not be granted until the student achieves the required cumulative grade point average. If the summer term is not sufficient to raise the grade point average to the required renewal level, the student's next opportunity for renewal is the fall semester of the following academic year; or

- 3. If a student is receiving a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship, is a servicemember of the Florida National Guard or United States Reserves while attending a postsecondary institution, is called to active duty or state active duty, as defined in s. 250.01, prior to completing his or her degree, and meets all other requirements for the scholarship, the student shall be eligible to continue the scholarship for 2 years after completing active duty or state active duty.
- (c) Reimburse or make satisfactory arrangements to reimburse the institution for the award amount received for courses dropped after the end of the drop and add period or courses from which the student withdraws after the end of the drop and add period unless the student has received an exception pursuant to s. 1009.53(11).
 - Section 5. Section 1009.538, Florida Statutes, is amended

436 to read:

1009.538 Bright Futures Scholarship recipients attending nonpublic institutions; calculation of awards.—

(1) Notwithstanding ss. 1009.53, 1009.534, 1009.535, and 1009.536, a student who receives any award under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program, who is enrolled in a nonpublic postsecondary education institution, and who is assessed tuition and fees that are the same as those of a full-time student at that institution, shall receive a fixed award calculated by using the average tuition and fee calculation as prescribed by the Department of Education for full-time attendance at a public postsecondary education institution at the comparable level. If the student is enrolled part-time and is assessed tuition and fees at a reduced level, the award shall be either one-half of the maximum award or three-fourths of the maximum award, depending on the level of fees assessed.

(2) Notwithstanding ss. 1009.53 and 1009.5315, a student who receives an initial award under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program beginning with the 2011 fall term, who is enrolled in a nonpublic postsecondary education institution, and who is assessed tuition and fees that are the same as those of a full-time student at that institution shall receive a fixed award calculated by using the average tuition and fee calculation pursuant to s. 1009.5315 as prescribed by the Department of Education for full-time attendance at a public postsecondary education institution at the comparable level. If the student is enrolled part-time and is assessed tuition and fees at a reduced level, the award shall be either one-half of the maximum award,

depending on the level of fees assessed.

Section 6. Paragraph (d) of subsection (4) and paragraph (b) of subsection (16) of section 1009.24, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

1009.24 State university student fees.-

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(d) The sum of the activity and service, health, and athletic fees a student is required to pay to register for a course shall not exceed 40 percent of the tuition established in law or in the General Appropriations Act. No university shall be required to lower any fee in effect on the effective date of this act in order to comply with this subsection. Within the 40 percent cap, universities may not increase the aggregate sum of activity and service, health, and athletic fees more than 5 percent per year unless specifically authorized in law or in the General Appropriations Act. A university may increase its athletic fee to defray the costs associated with changing National Collegiate Athletic Association divisions. Any such increase in the athletic fee may exceed both the 40 percent cap and the 5 percent cap imposed by this subsection. Any such increase must be approved by the athletic fee committee in the process outlined in subsection (12) and cannot exceed \$2 per credit hour. Notwithstanding the provisions of ss. 1009.534, 1009.535, and 1009.536, that portion of any increase in an athletic fee pursuant to this subsection that causes the sum of the activity and service, health, and athletic fees to exceed the 40 percent cap or the annual increase in such fees to exceed the 5 percent cap shall not be included in calculating the amount a student receives for a Florida Academic Scholars award,

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a Florida Medallion Scholars award, or a Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award. Notwithstanding the provisions of s. 1009.5315, that portion of any increase in an athletic fee pursuant to this subsection which causes the sum of the activity and service, health, and athletic fees to exceed the 40 percent cap or the annual increase in such fees to exceed the 5 percent cap shall not be included in calculating the amount a student receives for a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program award.

- (16) Each university board of trustees may establish a tuition differential for undergraduate courses upon receipt of approval from the Board of Governors. The tuition differential shall promote improvements in the quality of undergraduate education and shall provide financial aid to undergraduate students who exhibit financial need.
- (b) Each tuition differential is subject to the following conditions:
- 1. The tuition differential may be assessed on one or more undergraduate courses or on all undergraduate courses at a state university.
- 2. The tuition differential may vary by course or courses, campus or center location, and by institution. Each university board of trustees shall strive to maintain and increase enrollment in degree programs related to math, science, high technology, and other state or regional high-need fields when establishing tuition differentials by course.
- 3. For each state university that has total research and development expenditures for all fields of at least \$100 million per year as reported annually to the National Science Foundation, the aggregate sum of tuition and the tuition

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differential may not be increased by more than 15 percent of the total charged for the aggregate sum of these fees in the preceding fiscal year. For each state university that has total research and development expenditures for all fields of less than \$100 million per year as reported annually to the National Science Foundation, the aggregate sum of tuition and the tuition differential may not be increased by more than 15 percent of the total charged for the aggregate sum of these fees in the preceding fiscal year.

- 4. The aggregate sum of undergraduate tuition and fees per credit hour, including the tuition differential, may not exceed the national average of undergraduate tuition and fees at 4-year degree-granting public postsecondary educational institutions.
- 5. The tuition differential may not be calculated as a part of the scholarship programs established in ss. 1009.53-1009.538. However, beginning with initial awards for the 2011 fall term under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program, the tuition differential shall be included in the calculation for an award pursuant to ss. 1009.5315 and 1009.538.
- 6. Beneficiaries having prepaid tuition contracts pursuant to s. 1009.98(2)(b) which were in effect on July 1, 2007, and which remain in effect, are exempt from the payment of the tuition differential.
- 7. The tuition differential may not be charged to any student who was in attendance at the university before July 1, 2007, and who maintains continuous enrollment.
- 8. The tuition differential may be waived by the university for students who meet the eligibility requirements for the Florida public student assistance grant established in s.
