To receive benefits as a 24 wartime veteran, a veteran must have served in a campaign or 25 expedition for which a campaign badge has been authorized or a 26 veteran must have served during one of the following periods of 27 wartime service: 28 Spanish-American War: April 21, 1898, to July 4, 1902, (a)

29 and including the Philippine Insurrection and the Boxer 30 Rebellion.

(b) Mexican Border Period: May 9, 1916, to April 5, 1917, in the case of a veteran who during such period served in Mexico, on the borders thereof, or in the waters adjacent thereto.

(c) World War I: April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918; extended to April 1, 1920, for those veterans who served in Russia; also extended through July 1, 1921, for those veterans who served after November 11, 1918, and before July 2, 1921, provided such veterans had at least 1 day of service between April 5, 1917, and November 12, 1918.

World War II: December 7, 1941, to December 31, 1946. 41 (d) 42 (e) Korean Conflict: June 27, 1950, to January 31, 1955. Vietnam Era: February 28, 1961, to May 7, 1975. 43 (f) 44 (q) Persian Gulf War: August 2, 1990, to January 2, 1992. Operation Enduring Freedom: October 7, 2001, and 45 (h) ending on the date thereafter prescribed by presidential 46 47 proclamation or by law.

85 paragraph (a) are eligible for educational benefits: 86 1. A certified copy of a death certificate; -2. A valid identification card issued in accordance with 87 the provisions of s. 295.17; $\tau$ 88 89 3. A letter certifying the service-connected 100-percent 90 total and permanent disability rating for compensation from the 91 United States Department of Veterans Affairs; - or 92 4. A letter certifying the service-connected total and permanent disability rating of 100 percent for retirement pay 93 from any branch of the United States Armed Services is prima 94 facie evidence that the dependent children of such military 95 96 personnel are eligible for educational benefits. 97 Sections 295.03, 295.04, 295.05, and 1009.40 apply. (2) 98 Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2011.
