House Resolution

A resolution designating May 2011 as "Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month" in Florida.

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WHEREAS, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), better known as Lou Gehrig's Disease, is a progressive neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord, and

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WHEREAS, the early symptoms of ALS include weakness of the skeletal muscles, especially involving the arms and legs, and difficulty swallowing, talking, and breathing, and

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WHEREAS, ALS eventually causes muscles to atrophy and the patient becomes a functional quadriplegic, and

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WHEREAS, because ALS does not affect a person's mental capacity, a person with ALS remains alert and aware of his or her loss of motor functions and the inevitability of continued deterioration and death, and

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WHEREAS, the average survival rate for a person with ALS is 2 to 5 years after the diagnosis, and

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WHEREAS, research indicates that military veterans are at least twice as likely to develop ALS than those who have not served in the military, and

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WHEREAS, ALS has no known cause, means of prevention, or cure, and

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WHEREAS, the designation of an "Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month" will increase public awareness of the circumstances of ALS patients and the terrible impact of this disease on the patient, the patient's family, and the community

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in which they live and will increase support for biomedical research on ALS to find the cause or causes of ALS, understand the mechanisms involved in the progression of the disease, and develop effective treatment, NOW, THEREFORE,

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Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

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That May 2011 is designated as "Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month" in the State of Florida.
