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Senate Concurrent Resolution

A concurrent resolution to the Congress of the United States, urging Congress to pass the Share Your Spare Act, H.R. 2755, and the Comprehensive Immunosuppressive Drug Coverage for Kidney Transplant Patients Act, H.R. 2969 and S. 1454.

WHEREAS, kidney transplantation is superior to dialysis for improving patient survival rates and quality of life in patients who have end-stage renal disease, and immunosuppressive medications play an integral role in decreasing the rate at which a transplant recipient's body rejects the transplanted organ, and

WHEREAS, without these immunosuppressive medications, the transplanted organ can be rejected within days or weeks, threatening a person's life and dramatically increasing overall health care spending, and

WHEREAS, in an article published in the February 1, 2012, issue of the New England Journal of Medicine, physicians John S. Gill and Marcello Tonelli report that premature transplant failure is the fifth leading cause of initiation of dialysis in the United States, with about one in four patients whose transplants fail dying within 2 years after returning to dialysis, and

WHEREAS, the article goes on to state that this outcome is worse than the 2-year mortality rate among patients who have a functioning transplant from a deceased donor (6 percent) and still worse than that among age-matched dialysis patients who have never received a transplant (20 percent), and

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WHEREAS, the 2011 annual report from the United States Renal Data System shows that Medicare spends an average of \$82,285 per person, per year, on hemodialysis patients and \$61,588 per person, per year, on peritoneal dialysis patients, and covers these costs indefinitely, and

WHEREAS, the American Transplant Foundation reports that Medicare spends more than \$100,000 during the first year after a person receives an organ transplant and an average of only \$19,100 per year thereafter, including the cost of immunosuppressive medications, and

WHEREAS, under current Medicare rules, coverage for immunosuppressive drugs abruptly ceases 36 months after kidney transplantation for all Medicare patients, except those who are 65 years of age or older or have work-related disabilities, and

WHEREAS, extending immunosuppressive coverage beyond the current 36-month limit would decrease the risk of allograft failure attributable to a patient's inability to afford immunosuppressive medications following loss of drug coverage under Medicare, and

WHEREAS, when a renal allograft fails, a patient requires costly dialysis and may be a candidate for retransplantation, both of which are covered by Medicare, and

WHEREAS, the Comprehensive Immunosuppressive Drug Coverage for Kidney Transplant Patients Act, H.R. 2969 and S. 1454, would finally eliminate this 36-month time limitation for patients with end-stage renal disease and extend immunosuppressive drug coverage to all transplant recipients for the life of the transplanted organ, and

WHEREAS, economic analyses confirm that providing lifetime

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funding for immunosuppressive medications would lower overall costs to Medicare, saving an estimated \$200 million annually, and

WHEREAS, transplantable kidneys are lifesaving gifts made possible by living donors or by the family of an individual who is deceased, and are of an immeasurable benefit to society, and

WHEREAS, the Share Your Spare Act, H.R. 2755, would change current public policy that devalues this gift by amending the Internal Revenue Code to allow a nonrefundable, one-time, personal credit for a donation of a life-saving organ from one living person to another, and

WHEREAS, encouraging volunteers to donate their organs and ensuring lifetime access to immunosuppressive medications for all Americans who have kidney transplants would save lives and reduce the total cost of treating persons who have end-stage renal disease, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Florida, the House of Representatives Concurring:

That the Congress is encouraged to pass the Share Your Spare Act, H.R. 2755, and the Comprehensive Immunosuppressive Drug Coverage for Kidney Transplant Patients Act, H.R. 2969 and S. 1454, thus taking a necessary step toward promoting quality of life for all kidney transplant recipients and providing an incentive to encourage organ donation in this country.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this concurrent resolution be dispatched to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of
