81 (2) (a) Beginning January 1, 2005, the commission, with the 82 advice and assistance of the Florida Wildlife Magazine Advisory 83 Council, shall publish the Florida Wildlife Magazine. The 84 magazine shall be published at least on a quarterly basis in Page 3 of 17

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85 hard-copy format and shall be available to the public by 86 subscription and retail distribution. The primary focus of the 87 magazine shall be to promote the heritage of hunting and fishing 88 in Florida. The magazine shall also disseminate information 89 regarding other outdoor recreational opportunities available to 90 Floridians and visitors.

91 In order to offset the cost of publication and (b) 92 distribution of the magazine, the commission, with the advice 93 and assistance of the Florida Wildlife Magazine Advisory 94 Council, is authorized to sell advertising for placement in the 95 magazine. The commission shall have the right to approve all 96 elements of any advertising placed in the magazine, including 97 the form and content thereof. The magazine shall include a 98 statement providing that the inclusion of advertising in the 99 magazine does not constitute an endorsement by the state or the 100 commission of the products or services so advertised. The 101 commission may charge an annual magazine subscription fee of up 102 to \$25, a 2-year magazine subscription fee of up to \$45, and a 103 3-year magazine subscription fee of up to \$60. The commission 104 may charge a retail per copy fee of up to \$7. The provisions of 105 chapter 287 do not apply to the sale of advertising for 106 placement in the magazine. All revenues generated by the 107 magazine shall be credited to the State Game Trust Fund. 108 (c) The Florida Wildlife Magazine Advisory Council is 109 created within the commission to advise and make recommendations to the commission regarding development, publication, and sale 110 of the Florida Wildlife Magazine.
