Subsection (1) of section 465.014, Florida 16 Statutes, is amended to read: 17 465.014 Pharmacy technician.-A person other than a licensed pharmacist or pharmacy 18 (1)intern may not engage in the practice of the profession of 19 20 pharmacy, except that a licensed pharmacist may delegate to 21 pharmacy technicians who are registered pursuant to this section 22 those duties, tasks, and functions that do not fall within the 23 purview of s. 465.003(13). All such delegated acts shall be 24 performed under the direct supervision of a licensed pharmacist 25 who shall be responsible for all such acts performed by persons 26 under his or her supervision. A registered pharmacy registered 27 technician, under the supervision of a pharmacist, may initiate 28 or receive communications with a practitioner or his or her

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29 agent, on behalf of a patient, regarding refill authorization 30 requests. A licensed pharmacist may not supervise more than six 31 one registered pharmacy technicians technician unless otherwise 32 permitted by the quidelines adopted by the board. However, a 33 licensed pharmacist in a class II institutional pharmacy, as 34 defined in s. 465.019(2)(b), may not supervise more than one 35 registered pharmacy technician unless otherwise permitted by the 36 guidelines adopted by the board. The board shall establish 37 quidelines to be followed by licensees or permittees in determining the circumstances under which a licensed pharmacist 38 39 in a class II institutional pharmacy may supervise more than one 40 but not more than three registered pharmacy technicians.

Section 2. Subsection (2) of section 456.42, Florida
Statutes, is amended to read:

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456.42 Written prescriptions for medicinal drugs.-

44 A written prescription for a controlled substance (2) listed in chapter 893 must have the quantity of the drug 45 prescribed in both textual and numerical formats, must be 46 legibly dated on the face of the prescription in numeric 47 48 month/day/year format or with the abbreviated month written out 49 on the face of the prescription, and must be either written on a 50 standardized counterfeit-proof prescription pad produced by a 51 vendor approved by the department or electronically prescribed as that term is used in s. 408.0611. As a condition of being an 52 53 approved vendor, a prescription pad vendor must submit a monthly 54 report to the department that which, at a minimum, documents the 55 number of prescription pads sold and identifies the purchasers. 56 The department may, by rule, require the reporting of additional

58 Section 3. Paragraph (d) of subsection (2) of section 59 893.04, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

60 893.04 Pharmacist and practitioner.-

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62 (d) Each written prescription prescribed by a practitioner in this state for a controlled substance listed in Schedule II, 63 64 Schedule III, or Schedule IV must include on the face of the 65 prescription both a written and a numerical notation of the quantity of the controlled substance prescribed on the face of 66 the prescription and a legible notation of the date in numeric 67 68 month/day/year format or $_{\boldsymbol{\tau}}$ with the abbreviated month written out 69 on the face of the prescription. A pharmacist may, upon 70 verification by the prescriber, document any information 71 required by this paragraph. If the prescriber is not available to verify a prescription, the pharmacist may dispense the 72 73 controlled substance but may insist that the person to whom the controlled substance is dispensed provide valid photographic 74 75 identification. If a prescription includes a numerical notation 76 of the quantity of the controlled substance or date, but does 77 not include the quantity or date written out in textual format, 78 the pharmacist may dispense the controlled substance without 79 verification by the prescriber of the quantity or date if the 80 pharmacy previously dispensed another prescription for the 81 person to whom the prescription was written.

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Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2013.

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
