16	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

18	Section 1. Community schools initiative; Reigniting								
19	Education Achievement with Coordinated Help (REACH) Program								
20	(1) The Department of Education shall establish a 4-year								
21	community schools initiative by implementing the Reigniting								
22	Education Achievement with Coordinated Help (REACH) Program in								
23	three to five of the state's lowest-performing traditional								
24	public schools with a large population of low-income, at-risk								
25	students beginning in the 2014-2015 school year. Program funding								
26	may not exceed \$900,000 for the initial year of the program and								
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27	each subsequent year unless increased by act of the Legislature.							
28	The Commissioner of Education shall establish criteria for							
29	participation in the program, including the school, health, and							
30	community services to be offered. To qualify for participation							
31	in the program, a school must have earned a school grade of "F"							
32	for 2 consecutive years and be categorized as a Title I school,							
33	with at least 95 percent of its student population eligible for							
34	the free or reduced-price school lunch program. A school							
35	interested in participating in the program shall submit a letter							
36	of interest to the Commissioner of Education by July 15, 2014.							
37	(2) The program shall consist of a public-private							
38	partnership to supply "wrap-around services" to students							
39	attending the schools, including, but not limited to, tutorial							
40	and after-school programs, student counseling, nutrition							
41	education, health and dental services, parental counseling, and							
42	adult education.							
43	(3) The program shall focus attention on improving							
44	academic achievement through a holistic approach through which							
45	students receive the academic, medical, nutritional, and social							
46	supports that they need to develop strong literacy and							
47	mathematical skills, as well as the qualities of responsibility,							
48	self-control, attention, and cooperation. The program shall make							
49	available support services that encourage healthy family							
50	dynamics and home-school connections by providing parents with							
51	skills and opportunities to get involved in their children's							
52	education and help their children succeed in school. The program							
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53	shall be based on the following research-driven elements that
54	lead to student success: improving student achievement and
55	learning, leveraging community assets and improving school and
56	community collaboration, improving staff capacity and
57	effectiveness, and developing family and community partnerships.
58	(4) The program shall be implemented as follows:
59	(a) During the first year of operation, a school shall
60	build partnerships, which include the school district, the local
61	teachers union, parents, social service agencies, medical and
62	dental professionals, community and civic groups, and
63	businesses. The school shall also plan services, advertise the
64	program, establish baseline data, begin offering the services,
65	and report costs and benefits.
66	(b) During the second, third, and fourth years of
67	operation, a school shall continue partnerships; seek input and
68	refine services; continue offering the services; monitor the
69	academic, health, and nutritional progress of students and
70	families; and report progress, costs, and benefits.
71	(5) At the conclusion of the program, the Department of
72	Education shall submit to the President of the Senate and the
73	Speaker of the House of Representatives a review of the program,
74	including successful practices and the impact on student
75	performance and success, and make a recommendation for
76	continuing or terminating the program.
77	(6) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules to
78	implement this section.

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Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

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
