A bill to be entitled

An act relating to palliative care; defining terms; creating the Palliative Care and Quality of Life Interdisciplinary Advisory Council; specifying the purpose of the council; providing for membership of the council; requiring the Department of Health to provide staff, information, and other assistance as necessary to the council; requiring the department to set regular meeting times for the council; requiring the council to adopt certain internal organization procedures; authorizing reimbursement for certain expenses for council members; requiring the department to establish a palliative care consumer and professional information and education program; requiring the department to publish certain educational information and materials about palliative care on the department website; authorizing the department to develop and implement other services and education initiatives regarding palliative care; requiring the department to consult with the council to implement this act; requiring certain health care practitioners to provide certain patients information about palliative care and information about facilities that offer palliative care; requiring certain health care facilities to comply with palliative care measures ordered by a patient's health care practitioner; providing an effective date.

Section 1. <u>Palliative Care and Quality of Life</u>

<u>Interdisciplinary Advisory Council; palliative care consumer and professional information and education program.—</u>

- (1) DEFINITIONS.—As used in this section:
- (a) "Appropriate" means consistent with applicable legal, health, and professional standards, the patient's clinical and other circumstances, and the patient's reasonably known wishes and beliefs.
- (b) "Medical care" means services provided, requested, or supervised by a physician or advanced registered nurse practitioner.
- (c) "Palliative care" means patient- and family-centered medical care offered throughout the continuum of an illness which optimizes quality of life by anticipating, preventing, and treating suffering caused by serious illness. Palliative care involves addressing physical, emotional, social, and spiritual needs and facilitating patient autonomy, access to information, and choice. The term includes, but is not limited to, discussions of the patient's goals for treatment; discussion of treatment options appropriate to the patient, including, if appropriate, hospice care; and comprehensive pain and symptom management.
- (d) "Serious illness" means a medical illness or physical injury or condition that substantially impacts quality of life for more than a short period of time. The term includes, but is not limited to, cancer, renal or liver failure, heart or lung disease, and Alzheimer's disease and related dementias.
 - (2) PALLIATIVE CARE AND QUALITY OF LIFE INTERDISCIPLINARY

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ADVISORY COUNCIL.—There is established within the Department of Health a Palliative Care and Quality of Life Interdisciplinary Advisory Council, which is an advisory council as defined in s. 20.03, Florida Statutes.

- (a) The primary purpose of the council is to consult with and advise the department on matters relating to the establishment, maintenance, operation, and outcome evaluation of palliative care initiatives in this state.
- (b) The council shall consist of nine members appointed by the Governor in consultation with the State Surgeon General and include professionals who have expertise in various aspects of palliative care, including, but not limited to, interdisciplinary palliative care, medical, nursing, social work, pharmacy, and spiritual expertise; patient and family caregivers or their advocates; and such other members as the State Surgeon General deems appropriate. The Governor in consultation with the State Surgeon General shall ensure that representation on the council reflects a broad perspective of palliative care and includes experience in palliative care in a variety of inpatient, outpatient, and community settings, such as acute care, long-term care, and hospice, and with a variety of populations, including pediatric, youth, and adult. One council member shall be a designee of the American Cancer Society. At least two council members shall be board-certified hospice and palliative medicine physicians or nurses. Members shall serve for a term of 3 years.
- (c) The council shall adopt internal organizational procedures as necessary for its efficient organization which must, at a minimum, require the council to elect a chair and

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vice chair whose duties shall be established by the council.

(d) The department shall provide such staff, information, and other assistance as is reasonably necessary to assist the council in carrying out its responsibilities.

- (e) Members of the council shall serve without compensation, but may receive reimbursement as provided in s. 112.061, Florida Statutes, for travel and other necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties.
- (f) The department shall fix a time and place for regular meetings of the council, which shall meet at least twice a year.
- (3) PALLIATIVE CARE CONSUMER AND PROFESSIONAL INFORMATION AND EDUCATION PROGRAM.—
- (a) The department shall establish a palliative care consumer and professional information and education program. The purpose of the program is to maximize the effectiveness of palliative care initiatives in this state by making comprehensive and accurate information and education about palliative care available to the public, health care practitioners, and health care facilities.
- (b) The department shall publish on its website information and resources, including links to external resources, about palliative care, which shall include, but not be limited to, continuing education opportunities for health care practitioners, information about palliative care delivery in the home and in primary, secondary, and tertiary care settings, best practices for palliative care delivery, and consumer educational materials and referral information for palliative care, including hospice.
 - (c) The department may develop and implement other

(d) The department shall consult with the Palliative Care and Quality of Life Interdisciplinary Advisory Council in implementing this subsection.

Section 2. Palliative care for health care practitioners and facilities.—Health care practitioners regulated under chapter 458, chapter 459, or chapter 464, Florida Statutes, shall, as appropriate, provide patients under their care who have serious illnesses with information about palliative care and, upon request, shall facilitate access to palliative care. Facilities regulated under chapter 395, chapter 400, or chapter 429, Florida Statutes, shall comply with the palliative care measures ordered by the patient's health care practitioner.

Section 3. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
