21	Section 1. Paragraph (b) of subsection (5) of section

25	(5) PRESERVICE FIELD EXPERIENCE.—All postsecondary
26	instructors, school district personnel and instructional
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27 personnel, and school sites preparing instructional personnel 28 through preservice field experience courses and internships 29 shall meet special requirements. District school boards may pay 30 student teachers during their internships.

(b)1. All school district personnel and instructional 31 32 personnel who supervise or direct teacher preparation students 33 during field experience courses or internships taking place in 34 this state in which candidates demonstrate an impact on student 35 learning growth must have evidence of "clinical educator" training, a valid professional certificate issued pursuant to s. 36 37 1012.56, and at least 3 years of teaching experience in prekindergarten through grade 12 and must have earned an 38 39 effective or highly effective rating on the prior year's 40 performance evaluation under s. 1012.34 or be a peer evaluator 41 under the district's evaluation system approved under s. 42 1012.34. The State Board of Education shall approve the training 43 requirements.

School districts are encouraged to provide mechanisms for those middle grades school teachers holding only a K-6 teaching certificate to obtain a subject area coverage for middle grades through postsecondary coursework or district add-on certification.

6. Required achievement of passing scores on the subject area and professional education competency examination required by State Board of Education rule. Mastery of general knowledge must be demonstrated as described in subsection (3).

242 (b)1. Each school district must and a state supported 243 public school or a private school may develop and maintain a system by which members of the instructional staff may 244 demonstrate mastery of professional preparation and education 245 246 competence as required by law. Each program must be based on 247 classroom application of the Florida Educator Accomplished 248 Practices and instructional performance and, for public schools, 249 must be aligned with the district's evaluation system approved 250 under s. 1012.34.

251 2. The Commissioner of Education shall determine the 252 continued approval of programs implemented under this paragraph, 253 based upon the department's review of performance data. The 254 department shall review the performance data as a part of the 255 periodic review of each school district's professional 256 development system required under s. 1012.98.

257 Section 3. <u>Subsection (17) of section 1012.56, Florida</u> 258 <u>Statutes, is repealed.</u>

259 Section 4. Subsections (3) and (5) of section 1012.585, 260 Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

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261 1012.585 Process for renewal of professional 262 certificates.-

263 (3) For the renewal of a professional certificate, the264 following requirements must be met:

265 The applicant must earn a minimum of 6 college credits (a) 266 or 120 inservice points or a combination thereof. For each area 267 of specialization to be retained on a certificate, the applicant 268 must earn at least 3 of the required credit hours or equivalent 269 inservice points in the specialization area. Education in "clinical educator" training pursuant to s. 1004.04(5)(b) and 270 credits or points that provide training in the area of 271 272 scientifically researched, knowledge-based reading literacy and 273 computational skills acquisition, exceptional student education, 274 normal child development, and the disorders of development may 275 be applied toward any specialization area. Credits or points 276 that provide training in the areas of drug abuse, child abuse 277 and neglect, strategies in teaching students having limited 278 proficiency in English, or dropout prevention, or training in 279 areas identified in the educational goals and performance 280 standards adopted pursuant to ss. 1000.03(5) and 1008.345 may be 281 applied toward any specialization area. Credits or points earned 282 through approved summer institutes may be applied toward the 283 fulfillment of these requirements. Inservice points may also be 284 earned by participation in professional growth components 285 approved by the State Board of Education and specified pursuant 286 to s. 1012.98 in the district's approved master plan for

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inservice educational training, including, but not limited to, serving as a trainer in an approved teacher training activity, serving on an instructional materials committee or a state board or commission that deals with educational issues, or serving on an advisory council created pursuant to s. 1001.452.

(b) In lieu of college course credit or inservice points,
the applicant may renew a <u>subject area</u> specialization <del>area</del> by
passage of a state board approved <u>Florida-developed</u> subject area
<u>examination or, if a Florida subject area examination has not</u>
<u>been developed, a standardized examination specified in state</u>
board rule <del>test</del>.

(c) If an applicant wishes to retain more than two specialization areas on the certificate, the applicant shall be permitted two successive validity periods for renewal of all specialization areas, but must earn no fewer than 6 college course credit hours or the equivalent in any one validity period.

(d) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules for the expanded use of training for renewal of the professional certificate for educators who are required to complete training in teaching students of limited English proficiency <u>or students</u> <u>with disabilities</u> and training in the teaching of reading as follows:

allow the reinstatement of expired professional certificates.
