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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Paragraph (g) is added to subsection (2) of section 316.066, Florida Statutes, as amended by HB 863, 2014 Regular Session, to read:

316.066 Written reports of crashes.-

Radio and television stations licensed by the Federal Communications Commission, newspapers qualified to publish legal notices under ss. 50.011 and 50.031, and free newspapers of general circulation published once a week or more often, available and of interest to the public generally for the dissemination of news, which request crash reports before 60 days have elapsed after the report is filed must request such crash reports on an individual basis and may not have access to the home, cellular, employment, or other telephone number or the home or employment address of any of the parties involved in the

through reenactment by the Legislature.

information contained in a motor vehicle crash report is confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1), Florida Statutes, and s. 24(a), Article I of the State Constitution for 60 days after the report is filed and that it is a public necessity that access to such information during that 60-day period by newspapers and radio and television stations be restricted to combat widespread insurance fraud that occurs when the information is unlawfully used to contact the parties involved in a crash. The exemption prohibits access by newspapers and television and radio stations to the addresses and telephone numbers of the parties involved in a crash to protect the parties from those who would unlawfully solicit the parties to make claims against their personal injury protection insurance policies.

Section 3. This act shall take effect on the same date that HB 863 or similar legislation takes effect, if such legislation is adopted in the same legislative session or an extension thereof and becomes law.
