14	or fire prevention standards are required; amending s.
15	633.208, F.S.; authorizing a local fire official to
16	consider a specified publication when identifying an
17	alternative to a firesafety code; providing an
18	effective date.

20	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

22	Section 1. Subsection (16) of section 633.202, Florida
23	Statutes, is amended to read:
24	633.202 Florida Fire Prevention Code
25	(16)(a) As used in this subsection, the term:
26	1. "Agricultural pole barn" means a nonresidential farm
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27	building in which 90 percent or more of the perimeter walls are
28	permanently open and allow free ingress and egress.
29	2. "Nonresidential farm building" has the same meaning as
30	provided in s. 604.50.
31	(b) A nonresidential farm building structure, located on
32	property that is classified for ad valorem purposes as
33	agricultural, which is part of a farming or ranching operation,
34	in which the occupancy is limited by the property owner to no
35	more than 35 persons $_{ au}$ and which is not used by the public $rac{ extsf{for}}{ extsf{for}}$
36	direct sales or as an educational outreach facility $_{ au}$ is exempt
37	from the Florida Fire Prevention Code, including the national
38	codes and Life Safety Code incorporated by reference. This
39	paragraph does not include structures used for residential or
40	assembly occupancies, as defined in the Florida Fire Prevention
41	Code.
42	(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a
43	nonresidential farm building is exempt from the Florida Fire
44	Prevention Code, including the national codes and the Life
45	Safety Code incorporated by reference, if all of the following
46	conditions are met:
47	1. The nonresidential farm building is used by the owner
48	only for the secondary purposes of assembly, business, or
49	mercantile occupancy, as defined in the Florida Fire Prevention
50	Code, and is not used for lodging purposes.
51	2. At each event, fewer than 100 persons occupy the
52	building at one time.
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53 There are at least two means of egress or openings of 3. at least 36 inches in width and 80 inches in height. 54 55 4. The nonresidential farm building provides at least 7 56 square feet per person in attendance if the building is not 57 concentrated with chairs, tables, or other obstacles and 15 58 square feet per person in attendance if the building is 59 concentrated with chairs, tables, or other obstacles. 5. The storage of combustible or flammable liquids inside 60 61 the nonresidential farm building during each event is not 62 permitted. 63 (d) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an agricultural pole barn is exempt from the Florida Fire 64 65 Prevention Code, including the national fire codes and the Life Safety Code incorporated by reference. 66 67 (e) The State Fire Marshal shall conduct a study on the 68 secondary use of nonresidential farm buildings as assembly, 69 business, or mercantile occupancies with 100 persons or more in 70 attendance and on the development of a fire safety evaluation 71 system for nonresidential farm buildings used for those 72 occupancies. 73 1. The State Fire Marshal shall convene a workgroup on or 74 before September 1, 2015, to assist with the study. The 75 workgroup must include a representative of the Florida 76 Agritourism Association, the Florida Farm Bureau, the Department 77 of Agriculture and Consumer Services, the Florida Fire Chiefs 78 Association, the Florida Professional Firefighters Association,

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79	the Florida Fire Marshals and Inspectors Association, and the
80	Florida Volunteer Firefighters Association. The workgroup may
81	include other interested parties.
82	2. Based on the study, if the State Fire Marshal
83	determines that the secondary use of nonresidential farm
84	buildings as described in this paragraph requires alternative
85	life safety or fire prevention standards instead of those
86	currently specified in the Florida Fire Prevention Code, the
87	State Fire Marshal shall, in coordination with the Department of
88	Agriculture and Consumer Services, adopt the alternative
89	standards by rule. Rulemaking shall be initiated on or before
90	December 1, 2015.
91	<u>(17)</u> A tent up to <u>900 square</u> 30 feet by 30 feet is
92	exempt from the Florida Fire Prevention Code, including the
93	national codes incorporated by reference.
94	Section 2. Subsection (5) of section 633.208, Florida
95	Statutes, is amended to read:
96	633.208 Minimum firesafety standards
97	(5) With regard to existing buildings, the Legislature
98	recognizes that it is not always practical to apply any or all
99	of the provisions of the Florida Fire Prevention Code and that
100	physical limitations may require disproportionate effort or
101	expense with little increase in fire or life safety. <u>Before</u>
102	Prior to applying the minimum firesafety code to an existing
103	building, the local fire official shall determine whether that a
104	threat to lifesafety or property exists. If a threat to
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105 lifesafety or property exists, the fire official shall apply the 106 applicable firesafety code for existing buildings to the extent 107 practical to ensure assure a reasonable degree of lifesafety and safety of property or the fire official shall fashion a 108 109 reasonable alternative that which affords an equivalent degree of lifesafety and safety of property. The local fire official 110 111 may consider the fire safety evaluation systems found in NFPA 112 101A, Guide on Alternative Solutions to Life Safety, adopted by 113 the State Fire Marshal, as acceptable systems for the 114 identification of low-cost, reasonable alternatives. The 115 decision of the local fire official may be appealed to the local administrative board described in s. 553.73. 116 117 Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2015.

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
