An act relating to the Tiger Bay State Forest; providing for use of roads and trails within the forest by certain motor vehicles; requiring the Florida Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to designate an area of the forest for exclusive use of off-highway vehicles; directing the department to set a fee to access such area; providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, the dual purposes of public lands are to provide for environmental conservation and public recreation in equal measure, and the lack of off-road motorized recreation opportunities in Florida and opportunities on public land in Volusia County is a burden on local residents as well as tourism and job growth efforts, and

WHEREAS, off-road recreation is an appropriate and healthy use due to minimal impact upon the already disturbed lands and in no way impacts the former tree farm's primary value as an aquifer recharge area, and

WHEREAS, in an effort to position east central Florida and Volusia County as a unique and primary destination for off-road enthusiasts in the southeastern United States, to tap the benefits of increased sales tax collections and retail spending, to increase year-round tourism especially in the traditionally slow winter months, and to provide a true competitive

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. (1) All on-highway vehicles, including, but not limited to, four-wheel-drive trucks, jeeps, and sports utility vehicles or suburban utility vehicles, shall have unrestricted access to all existing roads and trails within the Tiger Bay State Forest, including, but not limited to, primary and secondary roads, tertiary roads, two-track trails, fire trails, and access roads, with the exception of those trails currently designated as equestrian trails and any roads and trails within the forest set aside for the exclusive use of off-highway vehicles such as dirt bikes, all-terrain vehicles, and side-by-side off-road vehicles.

(2) The Florida Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall designate at least 5 percent but no more than 10 percent of Tiger Bay State Forest land as an exclusive area for off-highway vehicle recreational use. The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall set, by rule, an entry fee to access the recreational off-highway vehicle exclusive area.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2015.
