House Memorial

A memorial to the President of the United States, urging the President to limit engagement in diplomatic relations with the Cuban government to measures specifically designed to strengthen civil society in Cuba, opposing the opening of a Cuban consulate or other diplomatic office of the Cuban government in Miami-Dade County, and requesting the President to coordinate with state and local governments in negotiating any repatriation or migration agreements.

WHEREAS, the interests of Floridians deserve the utmost consideration by the United States Government as it restores diplomatic relations with Cuba, an action announced by the President of the United States on December 17, 2014, and

WHEREAS, restoring diplomatic relations with Cuba will impact the people of this state in significant ways, and

WHEREAS, the freedom of the Cuban people to choose their own future is foremost among the interests of the people of Florida, home to more than 1.2 million Cuban Americans intimately familiar with the inhumanity of the Castro regime and the unnecessary misery endured by a people who, for more than 55 years, have suffered under a totalitarian communist dictatorship responsible for an extensive and well-documented litany of human rights abuses and for ruinous economic policies, and

WHEREAS, a democratic Cuba would better serve the security, economic activity, and cultural life of Florida and, for this reason, the freedom of the Cuban people to choose their own future is also in the interest of the people of Florida, and

WHEREAS, trade and tourism alone will not lead to democracy in Cuba, and, accordingly, if the restoration of diplomatic relations is to be something other than an economic and political "life raft" for the Castro regime, every aspect of the United States Government's engagement with Cuba must be specifically designed to strengthen the ability of individuals, businesses, investors, religious congregations, political parties and organizations, artists, journalists, minority groups, and other actors in the private sector to operate independently of the state, to enjoy basic democratic freedoms and human rights, and to advocate for their own interests, and

WHEREAS, change in United States Government policy toward the Cuba government must not, without evidence, be necessarily equated with progress and, as negotiations begin, immediate progress is not yet apparent, and

WHEREAS, although the announcement of December 17, 2014, to restore full diplomatic relations with Cuba resulted in the release of United States contractor Alan Gross after 5 years of detention, it also resulted in the United States releasing three Cuban spies fairly tried, convicted, and sentenced for their crimes, including the murder of four humanitarian workers, without informing the families of these victims, and

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WHEREAS, although the Cuba government, in connection with the December 17, 2014, announcement, released 53 Cuban citizens wrongfully held as political prisoners, many others remain unjustly imprisoned and, with the Cuban laws and practices that led to their detention firmly in place, many of those released remain subject to further detention or imprisonment for peaceful political activity, made clear by the re-arrest of Ronaldo Reyes Rabanal, Luís Enrique Labrador, and Marcelino Abreu Bonora within one month of the President's announcement and the detention of Cuban performance artist Tania Bruguera less than two weeks after the normalization of diplomatic relations was announced, and

WHEREAS, although increased trade and remittances from Americans to their relatives in Cuba may alleviate economic hardships suffered by Cubans, these measures may also serve to support a ruinous Cuban economic system and provide financial support to the Cuban regime at the expense of the Cuban diaspora, and

WHEREAS, the presence of a Cuban diplomatic office in Miami-Dade County will come at the expense of taxpayers and residents due to increased costs of law enforcement, public safety, traffic control, and other local resources required to maintain the security, tranquility, quality of life, and the flow of commerce in the face of the protests, disturbances, and general unrest that the Cuban government would willingly provoke

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with the presence of such a diplomatic office in Miami-Dade County, and

WHEREAS, in negotiating repatriation and migration agreements, the United States Government must consider the disruptive impact on individuals, families, and communities, as well as on state and local resources, posed by the thousands of Floridians potentially subject to deportation, who acquired such status under a wide variety of circumstances, to a totalitarian state with a well-documented history of human rights abuses, and

WHEREAS, any such repatriation and migration agreements must be developed in consultation with state and local governments, and

WHEREAS, such repatriation and migration agreements must address the return to the United States of fugitives currently living in Cuba, and

WHEREAS, in negotiating repatriation and migration agreements, the United States Government must also review and revise policies that were intended to help Cubans resettle in the United States and freely and safely travel between the two countries but that have also been exploited by criminal enterprises involved in the drug trade and fraudulent schemes at the expense of Floridians, NOW, THEREFORE,

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Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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(1) That the President of the United States is respectfully urged to limit engagement in diplomatic relations with the Cuban government to measures specifically designed to strengthen civil society in Cuba.

- (2) That the opening in Miami-Dade County of a Cuban consulate or any other diplomatic office of the Cuban government is respectfully opposed.
- (3) That the President of the United States is respectfully requested to coordinate with state and local governments in negotiating any repatriation or migration agreements, to minimize hardships on families and communities and in taking action to disrupt criminal pipelines enabled by the current United States policy regarding Cuba.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be dispatched to the President of the United States, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the Florida delegation to the United States Congress.
