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26	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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Section 1. Paragraph (c) of subsection (2) and subsection (6) of section 1009.531, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 1009.531 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; student eligibility requirements for initial awards.-A student graduating from high school in the 2012-2013

academic year and thereafter is eligible to accept an initial 34 award for 2 years following high school graduation and to accept 35 36 a renewal award for 5 years following high school graduation. A 37 student who applies for an award by high school graduation and 38 who meets all other eligibility requirements, but who does not 39 accept his or her award, may reapply during subsequent application periods up to 2 years after high school graduation. 40 41 For a student who enlists in the United States Armed Forces 42 immediately after completion of high school, the 2-year 43 eligibility period for his or her initial award and the 5-year 44 renewal period shall begin upon the date of separation from 45 active duty. For a student who is receiving a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship award and discontinues his or her education 46 47 to enlist in the United States Armed Forces, the remainder of 48 his or her 5-year renewal period shall commence upon the date of 49 separation from active duty. For a student who is unable to 50 accept an initial award immediately after completion of high 51 school due to a full-time religious or service obligation 52 lasting at least 18 months, the 2-year eligibility period for

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53 his or her initial award and the 5-year renewal period shall begin upon the completion of his or her religious or service 54 55 obligation. The full-time religious or service obligation must 56 be documented in writing and verified by the entity for which 57 the student completed such obligation. If a course of study is 58 not completed after 5 academic years, an exception of 1 year to 59 the renewal timeframe may be granted due to a verifiable illness or other documented emergency pursuant to s. 1009.40(1)(b)4. 60 The State Board of Education shall publicize the 61 (6) (a) 62 examination score required for a student to be eligible for a Florida Academic Scholars award, pursuant to s. 1009.534(1)(a) 63 64 or (b)., as follows: 65 For high school students graduating in the 2010-2011 1. and 2011-2012 academic years, the student must earn an SAT score 66 67 of 1270 or a concordant ACT score of 28. 68 2. For high school students graduating in the 2012-2013 69 academic year, the student must earn an SAT score of 1280 which 70 corresponds to the 88th SAT percentile rank or a concordant ACT 71 score of 28. 72 3. For High school students graduating in the 2013-2014 73 academic year and thereafter, the student must earn an SAT score 74 of 1290 which corresponds to the 89th SAT percentile rank or a

1009.536 Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award.—The Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award is created within the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program to recognize and reward academic achievement and career preparation by high school students who wish to continue their education.

(1) A student is eligible for a Florida Gold Seal
Vocational Scholars award if <u>he or she</u> the student meets the
general eligibility requirements for the Florida Bright Futures
Scholarship Program and the student:

(a) Completes the secondary school portion of a sequential
program of studies that requires at least three secondary school
career credits. On-the-job training may not be substituted for
any of the three required career credits.

(b) Demonstrates readiness for postsecondary education by
earning a passing score on the Florida College Entry Level
Placement Test or its equivalent as identified by the Department
of Education.

(c) Earns a minimum cumulative weighted grade point average of 3.0, as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, on all subjects required for a standard high school diploma, excluding elective courses.

(d) Earns a minimum unweighted grade point average of 3.5
on a 4.0 scale for secondary career courses <u>that compose</u>
comprising the career program.

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(e) Beginning with high school students graduating in the

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261 2011-2012 academic year and thereafter, completes at least 30 262 hours a program of volunteer community service work approved by 263 the district school board, the administrators of a nonpublic school, or the Department of Education for home education 264 265 program students. The student must identify, which shall include a minimum of 30 hours of service work, and identifies a social 266 267 or civic issue or a professional area problem that interests him 268 or her, develop develops a plan for his or her personal 269 involvement in addressing the issue or learning about the area 270 problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate 271 evaluates and reflect reflects upon his or her experience. 272 Except for credit earned through service-learning courses 273 adopted pursuant to s. 1003.497, the student may not receive 274 remuneration or academic credit for the volunteer service.
