2 An act relating to swimming pool safety; amending s.
3 514.0115, F.S.; requiring certain public pools to be
4 subject to underwater lighting inspections; amending
5 s. 514.025, F.S.; requiring inspections of underwater
6 lighting in public pools; amending ss. 515.21, 515.33,
7 and 515.35, F.S.; conforming provisions to changes
8 made by the act; creating s. 515.51, F.S.; providing a
9 short title; creating s. 515.52, F.S.; providing
10 legislative findings and intent; creating s. 515.53,
11 F.S.; requiring disclosure upon sale of certain
12 residential property of the dangers associated with
13 underwater lighting in swimming pools; amending s.
14 553.73, F.S.; requiring the Florida Building Code to
15 contain underwater lighting standards for residential
16 and public swimming pools; creating s. 553.881, F.S.;
17 requiring the Florida Building Code to prohibit the
18 installation or replacement of underwater lights of
19 greater than a specified voltage in new or existing
20 residential or public swimming pools; providing an
21 effective date.

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23 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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25 Section 1. Subsections (1), (2), and (4) of section
26 514.0115, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

27 514.0115 Exemptions from supervision or regulation;
28 variances.—

29 (1) Private pools and water therapy facilities connected
30 with facilities connected with hospitals, medical doctors'
31 offices, and licensed physical therapy establishments shall be
32 exempt from supervision under this chapter, except for
33 underwater electrical lighting inspections.

34 (2) (a) Pools serving no more than 32 condominium or
35 cooperative units which are not operated as a public lodging
36 establishment shall be exempt from supervision under this
37 chapter, except for water quality and underwater electrical
38 lighting inspections.

39 (b) Pools serving condominium or cooperative associations
40 of more than 32 units and whose recorded documents prohibit the
41 rental or sublease of the units for periods of less than 60 days
42 are exempt from supervision under this chapter, except that the
43 condominium or cooperative owner or association must file
44 applications with the department and obtain construction plans
45 approval and receive an initial operating permit. The department
46 shall inspect the swimming pools at such places annually, at the
47 fee set forth in s. 514.033(3), or upon request by a unit owner,
48 to determine compliance with department rules relating to water
49 quality and lifesaving equipment. However, such pools are
50 subject to underwater electrical lighting inspections. The
51 department may not require compliance with rules relating to
52 swimming pool lifeguard standards.

53 (4) Any pool serving a residential child care agency
54 registered and exempt from licensure pursuant to s. 409.176
55 shall be exempt from supervision or regulation under this
56 chapter related to construction standards if the pool is used
57 exclusively by the facility's residents and if admission may not
58 be gained by the public. However, such pool is subject to
59 underwater electrical lighting inspections.

60 Section 2. Subsection (3) of section 514.025, Florida
61 Statutes, is renumbered as subsection (4), and a new subsection
62 (3) is added to that section, to read:

63 514.025 Assignment of authority to county health
64 departments.—

65 (3) County health departments shall inspect each public
66 pool every 5 years to ensure the safety of electrical underwater
67 lighting, including voltage, grounding, and wiring.

68 Section 3. Section 515.21, Florida Statutes, is amended to
69 read:

70 515.21 Short title.—~~Sections 515.21-515.37~~ ~~This chapter~~
71 may be cited as the "Preston de Ibern/McKenzie Merriam
72 Residential Swimming Pool Safety Act."

73 Section 4. Section 515.33, Florida Statutes, is amended to
74 read:

75 515.33 Information required to be furnished to buyers.—A
76 licensed pool contractor, on entering into an agreement with a
77 buyer to build a residential swimming pool, or a licensed home
78 builder or developer, on entering into an agreement with a buyer

79 to build a house that includes a residential swimming pool, must
 80 give the buyer a document containing the requirements of ss.
 81 515.27-515.31 ~~this chapter~~ and a copy of the publication
 82 produced by the department under s. 515.31 that provides
 83 information on drowning prevention and the responsibilities of
 84 pool ownership.

85 Section 5. Section 515.35, Florida Statutes, is amended to
 86 read:

87 515.35 Rulemaking authority.—The department shall adopt
 88 rules pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act establishing
 89 the fees required to attend drowning prevention education
 90 programs and setting forth the information required under ss.
 91 515.27-515.33 ~~this chapter~~ to be provided by licensed pool
 92 contractors and licensed home builders or developers.

93 Section 6. Section 515.51, Florida Statutes, is created to
 94 read:

95 515.51 Short title.—Sections 515.51-515.53 may be cited as
 96 the "Calder Sloan Swim in Safety Act."

97 Section 7. Section 515.52, Florida Statutes, is created to
 98 read:

99 515.52 Legislative findings and intent.—The Legislature
 100 recognizes that this state has the second highest number of
 101 residential swimming pools per capita in the United States. The
 102 Legislature further recognizes that, according to the United
 103 States Consumer Product Safety Commission, electrical incidents
 104 involving underwater pool lighting are more numerous than those

105 involving any other consumer product used in or around pools.
 106 The Legislature finds that serious bodily injury and death by
 107 electrocution can occur when underwater lighting in residential
 108 pools is faulty. Therefore, it is the intent of the Legislature
 109 that owners of residential swimming pools be adequately informed
 110 about the potential dangers associated with underwater lighting.

111 Section 8. Section 515.53, Florida Statutes, is created to
 112 read:

113 515.53 Notification on real estate documents.—A
 114 prospective purchaser of residential property that contains a
 115 swimming pool, before the purchaser's execution of the contract
 116 for sale and purchase, must be presented with a disclosure
 117 summary in substantially the following form:

118 UNDERWATER POOL LIGHTING

119 Faulty underwater pool lighting has caused and can
 120 cause grave bodily injury or death. In particular,
 121 pools may have 120 volts of electricity going to their
 122 lights, may not be sufficiently grounded, or may have
 123 faulty wiring. Newer pools may need to be inspected to
 124 ensure proper voltage, wiring, and grounding.

125 Additional information regarding underwater pool
 126 lighting may be obtained from your county health
 127 department or licensed electrician.

128 If the disclosure summary is not included in the contract for
 129 sale and purchase, a separate disclosure summary must be
 130 attached to the contract.

131 Section 9. Subsection (2) of section 553.73, Florida
132 Statutes, is amended to read:

133 553.73 Florida Building Code.—

134 (2) The Florida Building Code shall contain provisions or
135 requirements for public and private buildings, structures, and
136 facilities relative to structural, mechanical, electrical,
137 plumbing, energy, and gas systems, existing buildings,
138 historical buildings, manufactured buildings, elevators, coastal
139 construction, lodging facilities, food sales and food service
140 facilities, health care facilities, including assisted living
141 facilities, adult day care facilities, hospice residential and
142 inpatient facilities and units, and facilities for the control
143 of radiation hazards, public or private educational facilities,
144 swimming pools, and correctional facilities and enforcement of
145 and compliance with such provisions or requirements. The Florida
146 Building Code must contain installation standards for underwater
147 electrical lighting in residential and public swimming pools as
148 defined in s. 515.25. Further, the Florida Building Code must
149 provide for uniform implementation of ss. 515.25, 515.27, and
150 515.29 by including standards and criteria for residential
151 swimming pool barriers, pool covers, latching devices, door and
152 window exit alarms, and other equipment required therein, which
153 are consistent with the intent of s. 515.23. Technical
154 provisions to be contained within the Florida Building Code are
155 restricted to requirements related to the types of materials
156 used and construction methods and standards employed in order to

157 meet criteria specified in the Florida Building Code. Provisions
158 relating to the personnel, supervision or training of personnel,
159 or any other professional qualification requirements relating to
160 contractors or their workforce may not be included within the
161 Florida Building Code, and subsections (4), (6), (7), (8), and
162 (9) are not to be construed to allow the inclusion of such
163 provisions within the Florida Building Code by amendment. This
164 restriction applies to both initial development and amendment of
165 the Florida Building Code.

166 Section 10. Section 553.881, Florida Statutes, is created
167 to read:

168 553.881 Underwater swimming pool lighting.—The Florida
169 Building Code must prohibit the installation or replacement of
170 underwater electrical lights of greater than 15 volts in new or
171 existing residential or public swimming pools.

172 Section 11. This act shall take effect July 1, 2015.
