Subsections (1), (2), and (4) of section 26 514.0115, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: Page 1 of 7

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27 514.0115 Exemptions from supervision or regulation; 28 variances.-

(1) Private pools and water therapy facilities connected with facilities connected with hospitals, medical doctors' offices, and licensed physical therapy establishments shall be exempt from supervision under this chapter, except for underwater electrical lighting inspections.

(2) (a) Pools serving no more than 32 condominium or cooperative units which are not operated as a public lodging establishment shall be exempt from supervision under this chapter, except for water quality <u>and underwater electrical</u> lighting inspections.

39 Pools serving condominium or cooperative associations (b) 40 of more than 32 units and whose recorded documents prohibit the 41 rental or sublease of the units for periods of less than 60 days 42 are exempt from supervision under this chapter, except that the condominium or cooperative owner or association must file 43 44 applications with the department and obtain construction plans 45 approval and receive an initial operating permit. The department 46 shall inspect the swimming pools at such places annually, at the 47 fee set forth in s. 514.033(3), or upon request by a unit owner, to determine compliance with department rules relating to water 48 49 quality and lifesaving equipment. Section 515.51, Florida Statutes, is created to 94 read: 95 515.51 Short title.-Sections 515.51-515.53 may be cited as 96 the "Calder Sloan Swim in Safety Act." 97 Section 7. Section 515.52, Florida Statutes, is created to 98 read: 99 515.52 Legislative findings and intent.-The Legislature recognizes that this state has the second highest number of 100 101 residential swimming pools per capita in the United States. The Legislature further recognizes that, according to the United 102 103 States Consumer Product Safety Commission, electrical incidents 104 involving underwater pool lighting are more numerous than those Page 4 of 7

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105	involving any other consumer product used in or around pools.
106	The Legislature finds that serious bodily injury and death by
107	electrocution can occur when underwater lighting in residential
108	pools is faulty. Therefore, it is the intent of the Legislature
109	that owners of residential swimming pools be adequately informed
110	about the potential dangers associated with underwater lighting.
111	Section 8. Section 515.53, Florida Statutes, is created to

119	Faulty underwater pool lighting has caused and can
120	cause grave bodily injury or death. In particular,

124	ensure proper voltage, wiring, and grounding.
125	Additional information regarding underwater pool

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Section 9. Subsection (2) of section 553.73, FloridaStatutes, is amended to read:

553.73 Florida Building Code.-

The Florida Building Code shall contain provisions or 134 (2)135 requirements for public and private buildings, structures, and 136 facilities relative to structural, mechanical, electrical, 137 plumbing, energy, and gas systems, existing buildings, 138 historical buildings, manufactured buildings, elevators, coastal construction, lodging facilities, food sales and food service 139 facilities, health care facilities, including assisted living 140 facilities, adult day care facilities, hospice residential and 141 inpatient facilities and units, and facilities for the control 142 143 of radiation hazards, public or private educational facilities, 144 swimming pools, and correctional facilities and enforcement of 145 and compliance with such provisions or requirements. The Florida 146 Building Code must contain installation standards for underwater 147 electrical lighting in residential and public swimming pools as 148 defined in s. 515.25. Further, the Florida Building Code must 149 provide for uniform implementation of ss. 515.25, 515.27, and 150 515.29 by including standards and criteria for residential swimming pool barriers, pool covers, latching devices, door and 151 window exit alarms, and other equipment required therein, which 152 are consistent with the intent of s. 515.23. Technical 153 154 provisions to be contained within the Florida Building Code are 155 restricted to requirements related to the types of materials 156 used and construction methods and standards employed in order to Page 6 of 7

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157 meet criteria specified in the Florida Building Code. Provisions 158 relating to the personnel, supervision or training of personnel, 159 or any other professional qualification requirements relating to 160 contractors or their workforce may not be included within the 161 Florida Building Code, and subsections (4), (6), (7), (8), and 162 (9) are not to be construed to allow the inclusion of such 163 provisions within the Florida Building Code by amendment. This 164 restriction applies to both initial development and amendment of 165 the Florida Building Code.

166 Section 10. Section 553.881, Florida Statutes, is created 167 to read:

168 <u>553.881</u> Underwater swimming pool lighting.—The Florida 169 <u>Building Code must prohibit the installation or replacement of</u> 170 <u>underwater electrical lights of greater than 15 volts in new or</u> 171 <u>existing residential or public swimming pools.</u>
