49 Section 1. Subsection (6) of section 39.201, Florida

50 Statutes, is amended to read:

51 39.201 Mandatory reports of child abuse, abandonment, or

52 neglect; mandatory reports of death; central abuse hotline.—

53 (6) Information in the central abuse hotline may not be
 54 used for employment screening, except as provided in s.
 55 39.202(2) (a) and (h) or s. 402.302(15). Information in the
 56 central abuse hotline and the department's automated abuse
 57 information system may be used by the department, its authorized
 58 agents or contract providers, the Department of Health, or
 59 county agencies as part of the licensure or registration process
 60 pursuant to ss. 402.301-402.319 and ss. 409.175-409.176.

61 Section 2. Paragraph (a) of subsection (2) of section
 62 39.202, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

63 39.202 Confidentiality of reports and records in cases of
 64 child abuse or neglect.—

65 (2) Except as provided in subsection (4), access to such
 66 records, excluding the name of the reporter which shall be
 67 released only as provided in subsection (5), shall be granted
 68 only to the following persons, officials, and agencies:

69 (a) Employees, authorized agents, or contract providers of
 70 the department, the Department of Health, the Agency for Persons
 71 with Disabilities, the Office of Early Learning, or county
 72 agencies responsible for carrying out:

- 73 1. Child or adult protective investigations;
- 74 2. Ongoing child or adult protective services;
- 75 3. Early intervention and prevention services;
- 76 4. Healthy Start services;
- 77 5. Licensure or approval of adoptive homes, foster homes,
- 78 child care facilities, facilities licensed under chapter 393, ~~or~~

79 family day care homes, ~~or informal child care~~ providers who
 80 receive school readiness funding under part VI of chapter 1002,
 81 or other homes used to provide for the care and welfare of
 82 children; or

83 6. Services for victims of domestic violence when provided
 84 by certified domestic violence centers working at the
 85 department's request as case consultants or with shared clients.

87 Also, employees or agents of the Department of Juvenile Justice
 88 responsible for the provision of services to children, pursuant
 89 to chapters 984 and 985.

90 Section 3. Subsection (15) of section 402.302, Florida
 91 Statutes, is amended to read:

92 402.302 Definitions.—As used in this chapter, the term:

93 (15) "Screening" means the act of assessing the background
 94 of child care personnel, in accordance with state and federal
 95 law, and volunteers and includes, but is not limited to:7

96 (a) Employment history checks, including documented
 97 attempts to contact each employer that employed the applicant
 98 within the preceding 5 years and documentation of the findings.

99 (b) A search of the criminal history records, sexual
 100 predator and sexual offender registry, and child abuse and
 101 neglect registry of any state in which the applicant resided
 102 during the preceding 5 years.

 104 An applicant must submit a full set of fingerprints to the

105 department or to a vendor, entity, or agency authorized by s.
106 943.053(13). The department, vendor, entity, or agency shall
107 forward the fingerprints to ~~local criminal records checks~~
108 through ~~local law enforcement agencies, fingerprinting for all~~
109 ~~purposes and checks in this subsection, statewide criminal~~
110 ~~records checks~~ through the Department of Law Enforcement for
111 state processing, and the Department of Law Enforcement shall
112 forward the fingerprints to ~~federal criminal records checks~~
113 ~~through~~ the Federal Bureau of Investigation for national

 162 ensure compliance with ~~the provisions of~~ ss. 402.301-402.319.
 163 The right of entry and inspection shall also extend to any
 164 premises which the department or local licensing agency has
 165 reason to believe are being operated or maintained as a child
 166 care facility without a license, but no such entry or inspection
 167 of any premises shall be made without the permission of the
 168 person in charge thereof unless a warrant is first obtained from
 169 the circuit court authorizing such entry or inspection ~~same~~. Any
 170 application for a license or renewal made pursuant to this act
 171 or the advertisement to the public for the provision of child
 172 care as defined in s. 402.302 shall constitute permission for

 284 to monitor and verify compliance with s. 1002.88 and the health

306 (w) Establish staff-to-children ratios that do not exceed

310 based on income and family assets, in accordance with s. 1002.87

315 and duties.—Each early learning coalition shall:

316 (7) Determine child eligibility pursuant to s. 1002.87 and
317 provider eligibility pursuant to s. 1002.88. ~~At a minimum,~~ Child
318 eligibility must be redetermined annually. ~~Redetermination must~~
319 ~~also be conducted twice per year for an additional 50 percent of~~
320 ~~a coalition's enrollment through a statistically valid random~~
321 ~~sampling.~~ A coalition must document the reason ~~why~~ a child is no
322 longer eligible for the school readiness program according to
323 the standard codes prescribed by the office.

324 (8) Establish a parent sliding fee scale that provides for
325 ~~requires~~ a parent copayment that is not a barrier to families
326 receiving ~~to participate in the~~ school readiness program
327 services. Providers are required to collect the parent's
328 copayment. A coalition may, on a case-by-case basis, waive the
329 copayment for an at-risk child or temporarily waive the
330 copayment for a child whose family's income is at or below the
331 federal poverty level and whose family experiences a natural
332 disaster or an event that limits the parent's ability to pay,
333 such as incarceration, placement in residential treatment, or

350 (a) Priority shall be given first to a child younger than
351 13 years of age from a family that includes a parent who is
352 receiving temporary cash assistance under chapter 414 and
353 subject to the federal work requirements.

354 (b) Priority shall be given next to an at-risk child
355 younger than 9 years of age.

356 (c) Priority shall be given next to a child from birth to
357 the beginning of the school year for which the child is eligible
358 for admission to kindergarten in a public school under s.
359 1003.21(1)(a)2. who is from a working family that is
360 economically disadvantaged, and may include such child's
361 eligible siblings, beginning with the school year in which the
362 sibling is eligible for admission to kindergarten in a public
363 school under s. 1003.21(1)(a)2. until the beginning of the
364 school year in which the sibling is eligible to begin 6th grade,

365 provided that the first priority for funding an eligible sibling
366 is local revenues available to the coalition for funding direct

370 (d) Priority shall be given next to a child of a parent
371 who transitions from the work program into employment as

375 (e) Priority shall be given next to an at-risk child who
376 is at least 9 years of age but younger than 13 years of age. An

378 program within an eligibility priority category listed in
379 paragraphs (a)-(c) shall be given priority over other children
380 who are eligible under this paragraph.

381 (f) Priority shall be given next to a child who is younger
382 than 13 years of age from a working family that is economically
383 disadvantaged. A child who is eligible under this paragraph
384 whose sibling is enrolled in the school readiness program under
385 paragraph (c) shall be given priority over other children who
386 are eligible under this paragraph. ~~However, a child eligible~~
387 ~~under this paragraph ceases to be eligible if his or her family~~
388 ~~income exceeds 200 percent of the federal poverty level.~~

389 (g) Priority shall be given next to a child of a parent
390 who transitions from the work program into employment as

391 described in s. 445.032 who is younger than 13 years of age.

392 (h) Priority shall be given next to a child who has
 393 special needs, has been determined eligible as a student with a
 394 disability, has a current individual education plan with a
 395 Florida school district, and is not younger than 3 years of age.
 396 A special needs child eligible under this paragraph remains
 397 eligible until the child is eligible for admission to
 398 kindergarten in a public school under s. 1003.21(1)(a)2.

468 program with the highest priority of expenditure being direct

469 services for eligible children. However, no more than 5 percent
470 of the funds described in subsection (5) may be used for

509 | 4. Providing, from among the funds provided for the
 510 | activities described in subparagraphs 1.-3., adequate funding
 511 | for infants and toddlers as necessary to meet federal
 512 | requirements related to expenditures for quality activities for
 513 | infant and toddler care.

514 | 5. Improving the monitoring of compliance with, and
 515 | enforcement of, applicable state and local requirements as
 516 | described in and limited by 45 C.F.R. s. 98.40.

517 | 6. Responding to Warm-Line requests by providers and
 518 | parents ~~related to school readiness program children,~~ including
 519 | providing developmental and health screenings to school
 520 | readiness program children.

521 (c) Nondirect services as described in applicable Office
 522 of Management and Budget instructions are those services not
 523 defined as administrative, direct, or quality services that are
 524 required to administer the school readiness program. Such
 525 services include, but are not limited to:

- 526 1. Assisting families to complete the required application
 527 and eligibility documentation.
- 528 2. Determining child and family eligibility.
- 529 3. Recruiting eligible child care providers.
- 530 4. Processing and tracking attendance records.
- 531 5. Developing and maintaining a statewide child care
 532 information system.

 534 As used in this paragraph, the term "nondirect services" does
 535 not include payments to school readiness program providers for
 536 direct services provided to children who are eligible under s.
 537 1002.87, administrative costs as described in paragraph (a), or
 538 quality activities as described in paragraph (b).

539 (7) Funds appropriated for the school readiness program
 540 may not be expended for the purchase or improvement of land; for
 541 the purchase, construction, or permanent improvement of any
 542 building or facility; or for the purchase of buses. However,
 543 funds may be expended for minor remodeling and upgrading of
 544 child care facilities which is necessary for the administration
 545 of the program and to ensure that providers meet state and local
 546 child care standards, including applicable health and safety
