An act relating to education; creating s. 1003.432, F.S.; defining terms; establishing the State Seal of Biliteracy Program to recognize a high school graduate who has attained a high level of competency in a world language; providing the purpose of the program; specifying criteria to earn a State Seal of Biliteracy; requiring the Commissioner of Education and school districts to perform specific duties to administer the State Seal of Biliteracy Program; prohibiting a school district or the Department of Education from charging fees to a student who earns the State Seal of Biliteracy; requiring the State Board of Education to adopt certain rules; amending s. 1009.534, F.S.; revising eligibility for the Florida Academic Scholars award to include a student who has been awarded an Advanced Placement Capstone diploma; amending s. 1011.62, F.S.; requiring a specified calculation of additional full-time equivalent student membership for a student who receives an Advanced Placement Capstone diploma in determining the annual operating allocation for each school district; providing a directive to the Division of Law Revision and Information; providing an effective date.

1003.432 State Seal of Biliteracy for high school graduates.—

- (1) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Biliteracy" means attainment of a high level of competency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in one or more languages in addition to English.
- (b) "World language" means a language other than English which is spoken internationally and is acquired by many people as a second language.
- (2) The State Seal of Biliteracy Program is established to recognize a high school graduate who has attained a high level of competency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in one or more languages in addition to English. The Commissioner of Education shall award the State Seal of Biliteracy upon graduation to a high school student who meets the qualifications in this section.
 - (3) The purpose of the State Seal of Biliteracy is to:
 - (a) Encourage students to study world languages;
 - (b) Certify attainment of biliteracy;
- (c) Provide employers with a method of identifying an individual with biliteracy skills;
- (d) Provide a postsecondary institution with a method to recognize an applicant with biliteracy skills who is seeking admission to the postsecondary institution and to grant postsecondary credit to a student with biliteracy skills who is attending the institution;
- (e) Recognize and promote world language instruction in public schools; and
 - (f) Affirm the value of diversity, honor multiple cultures

and world languages, and strengthen the relationships between multiple cultures in a community.

- (4) The State Seal of Biliteracy shall be awarded upon graduation to a high school student who:
- (a) Completed the English requirements for graduation in the courses required under s. 1003.4281, s. 1003.4282, or s. 1003.4295 with a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or above on a 4.0 scale, or its equivalent;
- (b) Passed a statewide, standardized assessment in English Language Arts administered pursuant to s. 1008.22;
- (c) Completed four credits of sequential instruction in a high school world language course and attained a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or above on a 4.0 scale in such course, or the equivalent of these four credits; and
- (d) Demonstrated competency in a world language through at least one of the following:
- 1. Passing an International Baccalaureate examination in the world language.
- 2. Passing an Advanced Placement Examination in the world language.
- 3. Passing an SAT Subject Test examination in the world language.
- 4. Passing the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma examination.
 - (5) The Commissioner of Education shall:
- (a) Prepare and provide to each school district an appropriate insignia to be affixed to the student's diploma and transcript indicating that the student has been awarded a State Seal of Biliteracy; and

(b) Provide other information that is necessary for a school district to successfully participate in the program.

- (6) Each school district shall:
- (a) Maintain appropriate records in order to identify a student who has met the requirements to receive a State Seal of Biliteracy;
- (b) Provide the Commissioner of Education with the name of each student who has met the requirements to receive a State

 Seal of Biliteracy; and
- (c) Affix the appropriate insignia to the diploma and transcript of each student who earns a State Seal of Biliteracy.
- (7) A school district or the Department of Education may not charge a fee for the State Seal of Biliteracy.
- (8) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules to implement this section. Such rules, at a minimum, must include:
- (a) Evidence of the student's successful completion of four credits of sequential instruction in a high school world language course and attainment of a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or above on a 4.0 scale in such course, or its equivalent as demonstrated by earning a score provided in paragraph (b) on one of the examinations listed in paragraph (4) (d);
- (b) The score that a student must receive on each of the examinations listed in paragraph (4)(d); and
- (c) Alternative means by which a student may demonstrate equivalent world language competency, including the means by which a student whose native language is not English may demonstrate competency in the native language in order to earn the State Seal of Biliteracy.

Section 2. Subsection (1) of section 1009.534, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1009.534 Florida Academic Scholars award.-

- (1) A student is eligible for a Florida Academic Scholars award if the student meets the general eligibility requirements for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program and the student:
- (a) Has achieved a 3.5 weighted grade point average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high school courses that are designated by the State Board of Education as college-preparatory academic courses; and has attained at least the score pursuant to s. 1009.531(6)(a) on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program;
- (b) Has attended a home education program according to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 or has completed the International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma or has completed the Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained at least the score pursuant to s. 1009.531(6)(a) on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program;
 - (c) Has been awarded an Advanced Placement Capstone diploma

from the College Board, an International Baccalaureate Diploma from the International Baccalaureate Office, or an Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma from the University of Cambridge International Examinations Office;

- (d) Has been recognized by the merit or achievement programs of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a scholar or finalist; or
- (e) Has been recognized by the National Hispanic Recognition Program as a scholar recipient.

A student must complete a program of community service work, as approved by the district school board, the administrators of a nonpublic school, or the Department of Education for home education program students, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service work for high school students graduating in the 2010-2011 academic year and 100 hours of service work for high school students graduating in the 2011-2012 academic year and thereafter, and must identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or her experience.

Section 3. Paragraph (n) of subsection (1) of section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1011.62 Funds for operation of schools.—If the annual allocation from the Florida Education Finance Program to each district for operation of schools is not determined in the annual appropriations act or the substantive bill implementing the annual appropriations act, it shall be determined as follows:

(1) COMPUTATION OF THE BASIC AMOUNT TO BE INCLUDED FOR OPERATION.—The following procedure shall be followed in determining the annual allocation to each district for operation:

- (n) Calculation of additional full-time equivalent membership based on college board advanced placement scores of students.—A value of 0.16 full-time equivalent student membership shall be calculated for each student in each advanced placement course who receives a score of 3 or higher on the College Board Advanced Placement Examination. A value of 0.3 full-time equivalent student membership shall be calculated for each student who receives an Advanced Placement Capstone diploma. Such values shall be for the prior year and added to the total full-time equivalent student membership in basic programs for grades 9 through 12 in the subsequent fiscal year. Each district must allocate at least 80 percent of the funds provided to the district for advanced placement instruction, in accordance with this paragraph, to the high school that generates the funds. The school district shall distribute to each classroom teacher who provided advanced placement instruction:
- 1. A bonus in the amount of \$50 for each student taught by the Advanced Placement teacher in each advanced placement course who receives a score of 3 or higher on the College Board Advanced Placement Examination.
- 2. An additional bonus of \$500 to each Advanced Placement teacher in a school designated with a grade of "D" or "F" who has at least one student scoring 3 or higher on the College Board Advanced Placement Examination, regardless of the number

of classes taught or of the number of students scoring a 3 or higher on the College Board Advanced Placement Examination.

Bonuses awarded to a teacher according to this paragraph shall not exceed \$2,000 in any given school year. However, the maximum bonus shall be \$3,000 if at least 50 percent of the students enrolled in a teacher's course earn a score of 3 or higher on the examination in a school with a grade of "A," "B," or "C" or if at least 25 percent of the students enrolled in a teacher's course earn a score of 3 or higher on the examination in a school with a grade of "D" or "F." Bonuses awarded under this paragraph shall be in addition to any regular wage or other bonus the teacher received or is scheduled to receive. For such courses, the teacher shall earn an additional bonus of \$50 for each student who has a qualifying score up to the maximum of
