19	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

21	Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Infectious
22	Disease Elimination Act (IDEA)."
23	Section 2. Subsection (4) of section 381.0038, Florida
24	Statutes, is amended to read:
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25 381.0038 Education; sterile needle and syringe exchange 26 <u>programs</u> pilot program.—The Department of Health shall establish 27 a program to educate the public about the threat of acquired 28 immune deficiency syndrome.

29 A county commission The University of Miami and its (4) 30 affiliates may authorize establish a single sterile needle and 31 syringe exchange pilot program to operate within the boundaries 32 of the in Miami-Dade county. The exchange pilot program may 33 operate at one or more fixed locations a fixed location or through a mobile health units unit. The exchange pilot program 34 35 shall offer the free exchange of clean, unused needles and 36 hypodermic syringes for used needles and hypodermic syringes as a means to prevent the transmission of HIV, AIDS, viral 37 38 hepatitis, or other blood-borne diseases among intravenous drug 39 users and their sexual partners and offspring. Prevention of 40 disease transmission must be the goal of the exchange program. 41 For the purposes of this subsection, the term "exchange program" 42 means a sterile needle and syringe exchange program established 43 by a county commission under this subsection. A sterile needle 44 and syringe exchange program may not operate unless it is 45 authorized and approved by a county commission in accordance 46 with this subsection. 47 (a) Before an exchange program may be established, a 48 county commission must:

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49	1. Authorize the program under the provisions of a county

51	2. Enter into a letter of agreement with the department in				
52	which the county commission agrees that any exchange program				
53	authorized by the county commission will operate in accordance

55	3. Enlist the local county health department to provide

58	4. Contract with one of the following entities to operate

68	e. A nonprofit HIV/AIDS service organization that meets

70	<u>(b)(a)</u> An exchange The pilot program must:				
71	1. Develop an oversight and accountability system to				
72	ensure the program's compliance with statutory and contractual				
73	requirements. The system must include measurable objectives for				

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74 meeting the goal of the program and must track the progress in 75 achieving those objectives. The system must require the program 76 operator to routinely report its progress in achieving the 77 objectives and the goal of the program. The system must also 78 incorporate mechanisms to track the program operator's 79 compliance or noncompliance with contractual obligations and to 80 apply consequences for noncompliance. The program must receive 81 the county commission's approval of the oversight and 82 accountability system before commencing operations.

83 <u>2.1</u>. Provide for maximum security of exchange sites <u>at</u> 84 <u>which needles and syringes are exchanged</u> and <u>of any</u> equipment 85 <u>used under the program</u>, including, <u>at a minimum</u>, an accounting 86 of the number of needles and syringes in use, the number of 87 needles and syringes in storage, safe disposal of returned 88 needles, and any other measure that may be required to control 89 the use and dispersal of sterile needles and syringes.

90 <u>3.2.</u> Operate a one-to-one exchange, whereby <u>a</u> the 91 participant shall receive one sterile needle and syringe unit in 92 exchange for each used one.

93 <u>4.3.</u> Make available educational materials and referrals to 94 education regarding the transmission of HIV, viral hepatitis, 95 and other blood-borne diseases. The program operator must offer 96 <u>such materials to program participants whenever needles or</u> 97 syringes are exchanged; provide referrals for drug abuse

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98	prevention and treatment; and provide or refer for HIV and viral
99	hepatitis screening.
100	5. Provide onsite counseling or referrals for drug abuse
101	prevention, education, and treatment, and provide onsite HIV and
102	viral hepatitis screening or referrals for such screening. If
103	such services are offered solely by referral, they must be made
104	available to participants within 72 hours after referral. A
105	county commission in a rural county may, under its contract with
106	the program operator, adjust the 72-hour requirement if the
107	commission finds that the availability of providers warrants an
108	extended timeframe.
109	6. Provide kits containing an emergency opioid antagonist,
110	as defined in s. 381.887, or provide referrals to a program that
111	can provide such kits.
112	7. Collect data for annual reporting purposes. The data
113	must include the number of participants served; the number of
114	used needles and syringes received and the number of clean,
115	unused needles and syringes distributed through exchange with
116	participants; the demographic profiles of the participants
117	served; the number of participants entering drug counseling or
118	treatment; the number of participants receiving testing for HIV,
119	AIDS, viral hepatitis, or other blood-borne diseases; and other
120	data that may be required under department rule. However, a
121	participant's personal identifying information may not be
122	
	collected for any purpose. Each exchange program must submit a

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123	report to its county commission and to the department annually			
124	by August 1. The department must submit a compilation report			
125	encompassing data from all exchange programs annually by October			
126	1 to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker			
127	of the House of Representatives. The department may adopt rules			
128	to implement this subparagraph.			
129	(c) (b) The possession, distribution, or exchange of			
130	needles or syringes as part of <u>an exchange</u> the pilot program			
131	established under this subsection is not a violation of any part			
132	of chapter 893 or any other law.			
133	<u>(d) (c)</u> An exchange A pilot program staff member,			
134	volunteer, or participant is not immune from criminal			
135	prosecution for:			
136	1. The possession of needles or syringes that are not a			
137	part of the <u>exchange</u> pilot program; or			
138	2. The redistribution of needles or syringes in any form,			
139	if acting outside the <u>exchange</u> pilot program.			
140	(e) A law enforcement officer acting in good faith who			
141	arrests or charges a person who is thereafter determined to be			
142	immune from prosecution under this section shall be immune from			
143	civil liability that might otherwise be incurred or imposed by			
144	reason of the officer's actions.			
145	(d) The pilot program must collect data for quarterly,			
146	annual, and final reporting purposes. The annual report must			
147	include information on the number of participants served, the			
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number of needles and syringes exchanged and distributed, the 148 149 demographic profiles of the participants served, the number of 150 participants entering drug counseling and treatment; the number 151 of participants receiving testing for HIV, AIDS, viral 152 hepatitis, or other blood-borne diseases; and other data 153 necessary for the pilot program. However, personal identifying 154 information may not be collected from a participant for any 155 purpose. Quarterly reports must be submitted to the Department 156 of Health in Miami-Dade County by October 15, January 15, April 157 15, and July 15 of each year. An annual report must be submitted 158 to the Department of Health by August 1 every year until the 159 program expires. A final report is due on August 1, 2021, to the 160 Department of Health and must describe the performance and 161 outcomes of the pilot program and include a summary of the 162 information in the annual reports for all pilot program years. 163 (f) (e) State, county, or municipal funds may not be used 164 to operate an exchange the pilot program. Exchange programs The 165 pilot program shall be funded through grants and donations from 166 private resources and funds. 167 (f) The pilot program shall expire July 1, 2021. 168 Section 3. Notwithstanding s. 381.0038(4), Florida 169 Statutes, as amended by this act, the pilot program established in Miami-Dade County under chapter 2016-68, Laws of Florida, may 170 171 continue to operate under that chapter until the Miami-Dade County Board of County Commissioners establishes an exchange 172

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173	program as defined in s. 381.0038, as amended by this act, or
174	until July 1, 2021, whichever occurs first.
175	Section 4. If any provision of this act or its application
176	to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity
177	does not affect other provisions or applications of the act
178	which can be given effect without the invalid provision or
179	application, and to this end the provisions of this act are
180	severable.
181	Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 2019.

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
