7	(2) The program is composed of all of the following
8	corridors:
9	(a) Southwest-Central Florida Connector, extending from
10	Collier County to Polk County.
11	(b) Suncoast Connector, extending from Citrus County to
12	Jefferson County.
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13	(c) Northern Turnpike Connector, extending from the
14	northern terminus of the Florida Turnpike northwest to the
15	Suncoast Parkway.
16	(3)(a) Projects undertaken in the corridors identified in
17	subsection (2) are tolled facilities and approved turnpike
18	projects that are part of the turnpike system, and are
19	considered as Strategic Intermodal System facilities.
20	(b) During the project development phase, the department
21	shall identify opportunities to accommodate or colocate multiple
22	types of infrastructure-addressing issues, such as those
23	identified in subsection (1), within or adjacent to the
24	corridors.
25	(c)1. During the project development phase, the department
26	shall utilize an inclusive, consensus-building mechanism for
27	each proposed multi-use corridor identified in subsection (2).
28	For each multi-use corridor identified in subsection (2), the
29	department shall convene a corridor task force composed of
30	appropriate representatives of:
31	a. The Department of Environmental Protection;
32	b. The Department of Economic Opportunity;
33	c. The Department of Education;
34	d. The Department of Health;
35	e. The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission;
36	f. The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services;
37	g. The local water management district or districts;
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38	h. A local government official from each local government
39	within a proposed corridor;
40	i. Metropolitan planning organizations;
41	j. Regional planning councils;
42	k. The community, who may be an individual or a member of
43	a nonprofit community organization, as determined by the
44	department; and
45	1. Appropriate environmental groups, such as 1000 Friends
46	of Florida, Audubon Florida, the Everglades Foundation, The
47	Nature Conservancy, the Florida Sierra Club, and the Florida
48	Wildlife Corridor, as determined by the department.
49	2. The secretary of the department shall appoint the
50	members of the respective corridor task forces by August 1,
51	<u>2019.</u>
52	3. Each corridor task force shall coordinate with the
53	department on pertinent aspects of corridor analysis, including
54	accommodation or colocation of multiple types of infrastructure,
55	addressing issues such as those identified in subsection (1),
56	within or adjacent to the corridor.
57	4. Each corridor task force shall evaluate the need for,
58	and the economic and environmental impacts of, hurricane
59	evacuation impacts of, and land use impacts of, the related
60	corridor as identified in subsection (2).

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61	5. Each corridor task force shall evaluate the extent and
62	health of wetlands in any county included within or adjacent to
63	a corridor. The project shall not impact any existing wetlands.
64	6. Each corridor task force shall hold a public meeting in
65	accordance with chapter 286 in each local government
66	jurisdiction in which a project within an identified corridor is
67	being considered.
68	7. To the maximum extent feasible, the department shall
69	adhere to the recommendations of the task force created for each
70	corridor in the design of the multiple modes of transportation
71	and multiple types of infrastructure associated with the
72	corridor. The task force for each corridor may consider and
73	recommend innovative concepts to combine right-of-way
74	acquisition with the acquisition of lands or easements to
75	facilitate environmental mitigation or ecosystem, wildlife
76	habitat, or water quality protection or restoration. The
77	department, in consultation with the Department of Environmental
78	Protection, may incorporate those features into each corridor
79	during the project development phase.
80	8. The Southwest-Central Florida Connector corridor task
81	force shall:
82	a. Address the impacts of the construction of a project
83	within the corridor on panther and other critical wildlife
84	habitat and evaluate in its final report the need for
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85	acquisition of lands for state conservation or as mitigation for
86	project construction; and
87	b. Evaluate wildlife crossing design features to protect
88	panther and other critical wildlife habitat corridor
89	connections.
90	9. The Suncoast Connector corridor task force and the
91	Northern Turnpike Connector corridor task force shall evaluate
92	design features and the need for acquisition of state
93	conservation lands that mitigate the impact of project
94	construction within the respective corridors on:
95	a. The water quality and quantity of springs, rivers, and
96	aquifer recharge areas;
97	b. Agricultural land uses; and
98	c. Wildlife habitat.
99	10. Each corridor task force shall issue its evaluations
100	in a final report that must be submitted to the Governor, the
101	President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of
102	Representatives by October 1, 2020.
