This act may be cited as the "Dorothy L. Hukill 32 Financial Literacy Act." 33 Section 2. Paragraph (b) of subsection (1) and subsection (5) of section 1002.3105, Florida Statutes, are amended to read: 34 35 1002.3105 Academically Challenging Curriculum to Enhance 36 Learning (ACCEL) options.-37 (1)ACCEL OPTIONS.-38 At a minimum, each school must offer the following (b) 39 ACCEL options: whole-grade and midyear promotion; subject-matter acceleration; virtual instruction in higher grade level 40 subjects; and the Credit acceleration options Program under s. 41 42 1003.4295. The United States History 90 EOC assessment constitutes 30 percent of the student's final course grade. Beginning with students entering grade 9 in the 91 92 2019-2020 school year, a student must earn one-half credit in 93 financial literacy. Students must earn the one-half credit in 94 financial literacy in grades 11 or 12. The State Board of 95 Education shall identify in rule one or more financial literacy 96 assessments that are aligned to the state's financial literacy 97 standards for the purposes of credit acceleration under s. 98 1003.4295(3). A high school student who transfers into the 99 state's public school system from another country, another 100 state, a private school, or a home education program is not

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101	required to meet the financial literacy requirement to earn a
102	standard high school diploma if the student's transcript
103	documents passage of a course for financial literacy.
104	(g) <u>Seven and one-half</u> Eight credits in electives.—School
105	districts must develop and offer coordinated electives so that a
106	student may develop knowledge and skills in his or her area of
107	interest, such as electives with a STEM or liberal arts focus.

109	college credit, including industry-certified career education
