Subsection (1) of section 1002.33, Florida 59 Statutes, is amended to read: 60 1002.33 Charter schools.-AUTHORIZATION.-All charter schools in Florida are 61 (1)62 public schools and shall be part of the state's program of 63 public education. A charter school may be formed by creating a 64 new school or converting an existing public school to charter status. A charter school may operate a virtual charter school 65 pursuant to s. 1002.45(1)(d) to provide full-time or part-time 66 67 online instruction to students, pursuant to s. 1002.455, in 68 kindergarten through grade 12. The school district in which the 69 student enrolls in the virtual charter school shall report the 70 student for funding pursuant to s. 1011.61(1)(c)1.b.(VI), and 71 the home school district shall not report the student for 72 funding. The mission of the Florida Virtual School is to 93 (b) 94 provide students with technology-based educational opportunities 95 to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to succeed. The 96 school shall serve any student in the state who meets the 97 profile for success in this educational delivery context and 98 shall give priority to:

Students who are in an alternative setting or a 113 Department of Juvenile Justice program. 114 115 The board of trustees of the Florida Virtual School shall identify appropriate performance measures and standards based on 116 117 student achievement that reflect the school's statutory mission 118 and priorities, and shall implement an accountability system for 119 the school that includes assessment of its effectiveness and efficiency in providing quality services that encourage high 120 121 student achievement, seamless articulation, and maximum access. 122 (2) (a) The Florida Virtual School shall be governed by a board of trustees comprised of five seven members appointed by 123 124 the Governor to 4-year staggered terms. A member may not serve 125 more than two consecutive 4-year terms on the board. The board
