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discipline and school safety.-The district school board shall provide for the proper accounting for all students, for the attendance and control of students at school, and for proper attention to health, safety, and other matters relating to the welfare of students, including:

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(4) EMERGENCY DRILLS; EMERGENCY PROCEDURES.-

(a) Formulate and prescribe policies and procedures, in
consultation with the appropriate public safety agencies, for
emergency drills and for actual emergencies, including, but not
limited to, fires, natural disasters, active shooter and hostage
situations, and bomb threats, for all students and faculty at
all public schools of the district comprised of grades K-12.

Drills for active shooter and hostage situations shall 38 1. 39 be conducted in accordance with developmentally appropriate and age-appropriate procedures and may include, but not be limited 40 41 to, video trainings, reading materials, and options that are not 42 physical drills at least as often as other emergency drills. 43 However, physical drills for active shooter and hostage 44 situations shall be conducted at least four, but no more than 45 six, times each school year. Procedures relating to drills for 46 active shooter and hostage situations must be developed through consultation with at least one mental health professional and be 47 48 consistent with the best practice considerations provided by the National Association of School Psychologists. 49

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2. District school board policies shall include commonly

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used alarm system responses for specific types of emergencies 51 52 and verification by each school that drills have been provided 53 as required by law and fire protection codes. The emergency 54 response policy shall identify the individuals responsible for 55 contacting the primary emergency response agency and the 56 emergency response agency that is responsible for notifying the 57 school district for each type of emergency.

58 (d) Establish procedures to provide notification of drills 59 for active shooter and hostage situations to a student's parent 60 before a drill occurs and to provide the parent with the option to excuse his or her student from any physical drills that 61 62 exceed the minimum number of physical drills required to be annually conducted as specified in subparagraph (a)1. The 63 64 procedures must also allow a student whose parent has excused 65 him or her from the physical drills to elect to remain on the 66 school premises during a physical drill and remain excused from 67 such physical drill. Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2020.

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
