A bill to be entitled

An act relating to reinstatement of a revoked health care practitioner license; amending s. 456.072, F.S.; requiring, rather than authorizing, health care boards under the Department of Health to establish rules for applications for reinstatement of a revoked license; requiring the boards to grant applicants opportunities at reasonable intervals to demonstrate certain competencies; requiring the board to grant an applicant such initial opportunity within a specified timeframe; providing examples of evidence the board may require of an applicant to demonstrate certain competencies; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (6) of section 456.072, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

456.072 Grounds for discipline; penalties; enforcement.-

(6) If the board, or the department when there is no board, determines that revocation of a license is the appropriate penalty, the revocation shall be permanent. However, the board shall may establish by rule requirements for reapplication by applicants whose licenses have been permanently revoked. The board shall provide a licensee or certificate holder affected under this subsection an opportunity at reasonable intervals to demonstrate that he or she can resume the competent practice of his or her profession with reasonable skill and safety to patients. The board shall grant an applicant an initial

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opportunity to demonstrate such competence within 10 years of the date of the revocation, if requested within that timeframe. The requirements may include, but are not limited to, satisfying current requirements for an initial license, completing 500 or more hours of practice under the supervision of a health care professional regulated by the same board as the applicant prior to revocation, and completing additional continuing education hours as determined by the board to ensure the competency of the applicant.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2020.
