1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to Alzheimer's disease and dementia-3 related disorders; amending s. 430.501, F.S.; 4 requiring state agencies to assist the Alzheimer's 5 Disease Advisory Committee; amending s. 430.502, F.S.; 6 revising the name of the memory disorder clinic 7 established in Orange County; establishing an additional memory disorder clinic in Palm Beach 8 9 County; revising the criteria that a memory disorder clinic must meet to be eligible for certain incentive 10 11 funding; revising provisions relating to an allocation 12 formula for the funding of respite care; creating s. 430.505, F.S.; creating the Office of Alzheimer's 13 14 Disease within the Department of Elderly Affairs; 15 providing for the appointment of a director of such office by the Secretary of Elderly Affairs; providing 16 17 duties of the office; authorizing the director of the office to request the assistance of relevant state 18 19 agencies to perform such duties; requiring that the 20 office be administratively housed within the Executive 21 Office of the Governor effective upon a specified 22 future date; providing an effective date. 23 24 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Paragraph (b) of subsection (3) of section 430.501, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

430.501 Alzheimer's Disease Advisory Committee; research grants.—

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- (b)1. The Governor shall appoint members from a broad cross-section of public, private, and volunteer sectors. All nominations shall be forwarded to the Governor by the Secretary of Elderly Affairs in accordance with this subsection.
- 2. Members shall be appointed to 4-year staggered terms in accordance with s. 20.052, except for the sitting members of the Senate and House of Representatives, who shall be appointed to a term corresponding to their term of office.
- 3. The Secretary of Elderly Affairs shall serve as an ex officio member of the committee.
- 4. The committee shall elect one of its members to serve as chair for a term of 1 year.
- 5. The committee may establish subcommittees as necessary to carry out the functions of the committee.
- 6. The committee shall meet quarterly, or as frequently as needed.
- 7. The committee shall submit an annual report to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the Secretary of Elderly Affairs on or before September 1 of each year. The annual report shall include

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information and recommendations on Alzheimer's disease policy; all state-funded efforts, including in Alzheimer's disease research, clinical care, institutional care, home-based and community-based programs, and the outcomes of such efforts; and any proposed updates to the Alzheimer's disease state plan submitted under subparagraph 8.

- 8. Beginning in 2020, and every third year thereafter, on or before November 1, the Department of Elderly Affairs shall review the Alzheimer's disease state plan and submit an updated state plan to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Department of Elderly Affairs shall utilize the annual reports submitted by the committee and collaborate with state Alzheimer's disease organizations and professionals when considering such updates to the Alzheimer's disease state plan. The state plan shall:
- a. Assess the current and future impact of Alzheimer's disease and related forms of dementia on the state.
- b. Examine the existing industries, services, and resources addressing the needs of persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia and their family caregivers.
- c. Examine the needs of persons of all cultural backgrounds having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia and how their lives are affected by the disease from younger-onset, through mid-stage, to late-stage.

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d. Develop a strategy to mobilize a state response to this public health crisis.

e. Provide information regarding:

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- (I) State trends with respect to persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia and their needs, including, but not limited to:
- (A) The role of the state in providing community-based care, long-term care, and family caregiver support, including respite, education, and assistance to persons who are in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease, who have younger-onset Alzheimer's disease, or who have a related form of dementia.
- (B) The development of state policy with respect to persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia.
- (C) Surveillance of persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia for the purpose of accurately estimating the number of such persons in the state at present and projected population levels.
- (II) Existing services, resources, and capacity, including, but not limited to:
- (A) The type, cost, and availability of dementia-specific services throughout the state.
- (B) Policy requirements and effectiveness for dementiaspecific training for professionals providing care.
 - (C) Quality care measures employed by providers of care,

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including providers of respite, adult day care, assisted living facility, skilled nursing facility, and hospice services.

- (D) The capability of public safety workers and law enforcement officers to respond to persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia, including, but not limited to, responding to their disappearance, search and rescue, abuse, elopement, exploitation, or suicide.
- (E) The availability of home and community-based services and respite care for persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia and education and support services to assist their families and caregivers.
- (F) An inventory of long-term care facilities and community-based services serving persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia.
- (G) The adequacy and appropriateness of geriatric-psychiatric units for persons having behavior disorders associated with Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia.
- (H) Residential assisted living options for persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia.
- (I) The level of preparedness of service providers before, during, and after a catastrophic emergency involving a person having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia and their caregivers and families.
 - (III) Needed state policies or responses, including, but

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not limited to, directions for the provision of clear and coordinated care, services, and support to persons having Alzheimer's disease or a related form of dementia and their caregivers and families and strategies to address any identified gaps in the provision of services.

- 9. Upon request, all state agencies shall assist the committee in the performance of its duties.
- $\underline{10.9.}$ The Department of Elderly Affairs shall provide staff support to assist the committee in the performance of its duties.
- 11.10. Members of the committee and subcommittees <u>may not</u> shall receive <u>a</u> no salary, but are entitled to reimbursement for travel and per diem expenses, as provided in s. 112.061, while performing their duties under this section.
- Section 2. Paragraphs (n) and (o) of subsection (1), paragraph (a) of subsection (4), and subsection (8) of section 430.502, Florida Statutes, are amended, and paragraph (p) is added to subsection (1) of that section, to read:
- 430.502 Alzheimer's disease; memory disorder clinics and day care and respite care programs.—
 - (1) There is established:

- (n) A memory disorder clinic at <u>AdventHealth Orlando</u>

 Florida Hospital in Orange County; and
- (o) A memory disorder clinic at Miami Jewish Health System in Miami-Dade County; and

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(p) A memory disorder clinic at Palm Beach Habilitation

Center Memory Care Group Home in Palm Beach County that

addresses the needs of adults with disabilities,

for the purpose of conducting research and training in a diagnostic and therapeutic setting for persons suffering from Alzheimer's disease and related memory disorders. However, memory disorder clinics shall not receive decreased funding due solely to subsequent additions of memory disorder clinics in this subsection.

- (4) The department shall develop performance goals that exceed the minimum performance standards developed under subsection (3), which goals must be achieved in order for a memory disorder clinic to be eligible for incentive funding above the base level, subject to legislative appropriation. Incentive funding shall be based on criteria including, but not limited to:
- (a) Significant increase in the volume of clinical services and family care planning services.
- (8) Pursuant to s. 287.057, the department shall contract for the provision of respite care. All funds appropriated for the provision of respite care shall be distributed annually by the department to each funded county according to an allocation formula. In developing the formula, the department shall consider the number and proportion of the county population of

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individuals who are 70 75 years of age and older. Each respite care program shall be used as a resource for research and statistical data by the memory disorder clinics established in this part. In consultation with the memory disorder clinics, the department shall specify the information to be provided by the respite care programs for research purposes.

Section 3. Section 430.505, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

430.505 Office of Alzheimer's Disease.—

- (1) There is created within the Department of Elderly
 Affairs the Office of Alzheimer's Disease. The director of the
 office shall be appointed by the Secretary of Elderly Affairs.
 The office shall:
- (a) Facilitate, support, and coordinate policies and programs relating to Alzheimer's disease and other dementia-related disorders within the department, other state agencies, the Executive Office of the Governor, and the Legislature.
- (b) Facilitate and support the Alzheimer's Disease

 Advisory Committee in the performance of its duties and assist
 the committee in submitting and implementing the Alzheimer's
 disease state plan under s. 430.501(3)(b)8.
- (c) Support memory disorder clinics in meeting the performance goals developed by the department pursuant to s. 430.502(4).
 - (d) Facilitate, support, and coordinate outreach programs

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and services between state agencies, memory disorder clinics, area agencies on aging, and other interested groups for the purpose of fostering public awareness and education of Alzheimer's disease and other dementia-related disorders.

- (e) Facilitate, support, and coordinate programs, services, and activities between groups interested in research relating to Alzheimer's disease and other dementia-related disorders, including, but not limited to, area agencies on aging, service providers, advocacy groups, legal services organizations, emergency personnel, law enforcement, Florida College System institutions, and state universities.
- (f) Compile and monitor data related to the impact of Alzheimer's disease and other dementia-related disorders throughout the state.
- (2) The director of the office may request the assistance of relevant state agencies as necessary to perform the duties of the office pursuant to subsection (1).
- (3) Effective July 1, 2021, the office shall be administratively housed within the Executive Office of the Governor.
- Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2020.

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
