12	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

14	Section 1. Section 97.0585, Florida Statutes, is amended to
15	read:
16	97.0585 Public records exemption; information regarding
17	voters and voter registration; confidentiality
18	(1) The following information held by an agency, as defined
19	in s. 119.011, and obtained for the purpose of voter
20	registration is confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s.
21	24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution and may be used only for
22	purposes of voter registration, unless disclosure is authorized
23	under subsection (2):
24	(a) All declinations to register to vote made pursuant to
25	ss. 97.057 and 97.058.
26	(b) Information relating to the place where a person
27	registered to vote or where a person updated a voter
28	registration.
29	(c) The social security number, driver license number, and
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30	Florida identification number of a voter registration applicant
31	or voter.
32	(d) Information related to a voter registration applicant's
33	or voter's prior felony conviction and whether such person has
34	had his or her voting rights restored by the Board of Executive
35	Clemency or pursuant to s. 4, Art. VI of the State Constitution.
36	(e) All information concerning preregistered voter
37	registration applicants who are 16 or 17 years of age.
38	(f) The address of legal residence, date of birth,
39	telephone number, and e-mail address of a voter registration
40	applicant or voter.
41	<u>(g)<del>(f)</del> Paragraphs (d) and (e) are subject to the Open</u>
42	Government Sunset Review Act in accordance with s. 119.15 and
43	shall stand repealed on October 2, 2024, unless reviewed and
44	saved from repeal through reenactment by the Legislature.
45	(h) Paragraph (f) is subject to the Open Government Sunset
46	Review Act in accordance with s. 119.15 and shall stand repealed
47	on October 2, 2026, unless reviewed and saved from repeal
48	through reenactment by the Legislature.
49	(2) A person's information made confidential and exempt
50	under paragraph (1)(f) shall only be made available to or
51	reproduced for:
52	(a) The individual whose information was made confidential
53	and exempt.
54	(b) A canvassing board or an election official in his or
55	her official capacity.
56	(c) A political party or an official thereof, a candidate
57	who has filed qualification papers, an elected official, or a
58	registered political committee, for political purposes only.

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59	(3)(2) The signature of a voter registration applicant or a
60	voter is exempt from the copying requirements of s. 119.07(1)
61	and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution.
62	(4) (3) This section applies to information held by an
63	agency before, on, or after the effective date of this
64	exemption.
65	Section 2. (1) The Legislature finds it a public necessity
66	that the address of legal residence, date of birth, telephone
67	number, and e-mail address of a voter registration applicant or
68	voter held by an agency, and obtained for the purpose of voter
69	registration, be confidential and exempt from public records
70	requirements and used only for purposes of voter registration.
71	(2) Information such as a voter registration applicant's or
72	a voter's address of legal residence, date of birth, telephone
73	number, and e-mail address are personal and sensitive and could
74	be misused by a dishonest person if placed in the public domain
75	with the applicant's or the voter's name. By matching a name and
76	address of legal residence, date of birth, telephone number, or
77	e-mail address, a dishonest person could commit identity theft,
78	which could result in financial harm to a voter registration
79	applicant or a voter. The potential for harm that results from
80	unfettered access to a voter registration applicant's or a
81	voter's address of legal residence, date of birth, telephone
82	number, and e-mail address, accompanied by the person's name,
83	exceeds any public benefit that may be derived from disclosure
84	of such information. In addition, such information may be used
85	for consumer scams, unwanted solicitations, or other forms of
86	invasive contacts.
87	(3) The Legislature also finds that e-mail addresses are

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88	personal information that could be misused and could result in
89	voter fraud if released. A voter may request a vote-by-mail
90	ballot using an e-mail address. Unrestricted access to such e-
91	mail addresses may enable others to determine which voters are
92	intending to vote by vote-by-mail ballot and result in the
93	confiscation and misuse of a mailed vote-by-mail ballot by a
94	person other than the requesting voter. In addition, collection
95	of the e-mail address of a voter registration applicant or a
96	voter would give supervisors of elections the opportunity to
97	employ the cost-saving measure of electronically transmitting
98	sample ballots. If a voter registration applicant or a voter
99	knows that his or her e-mail address is subject to public
100	disclosure, he or she may be less willing to provide the e-mail
101	address to the supervisor of elections. Accordingly, the
102	effective and efficient administration of a government program
103	would be significantly impaired.
104	Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2021.

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
