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26	Section 1. Section 1003.4551, Florida Statutes, is created

31	(1) Beginning in the 2022-2023 school year, the department
32	shall annually verify that each school district, charter school,
33	and private school implements the instruction required under s.
34	1003.42(2)(h), relating to the history of African Americans,
35	efficiently and faithfully throughout the school district's,
36	charter school's, or private school's entire curriculum, as
37	appropriate. For purposes of this section, the term "private
38	school" means a private school that accepts scholarship students
39	who participate in a state scholarship program under chapter
40	<u>1002.</u>
41	(2) Beginning in the 2022-2023 school year, each school
42	district, charter school, and private school must:
43	(a) Develop, and each school board, charter school
44	governing board, and private school director or similar
45	administrator must adopt, a plan for the implementation of
46	required instruction on the history of African Americans and
47	publicize the plan in the school district's, charter school's,
48	or private school's curriculum guides and on its website.
49	(b) Develop and implement an ongoing professional
50	development plan for training instructional staff in strategies
51	for teaching the history of African Americans. The school
52	district, charter school, or private school must allocate
53	adequate resources to structured professional development
54	programs and for enhancing the instruction of the history of
55	African Americans in an infused format.
56	(c) Integrate curricula for teaching the history of African
57	Americans which meet the requirements of s. 1003.42(2)(h) as
58	part of the school district's, charter school's, or private

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59	school's curriculum. Such curricula must be distributed to
60	curriculum specialists, teachers, media specialists, and other
61	instructional staff. The school district, charter school, or
62	private school must ensure that adequate instructional
63	resources, including, but not limited to, books, compact discs,
64	digital media, and lesson plans, are available to support such
65	instruction.
66	(d) Include content on the history of African Americans in
67	lesson plans for the entire school year, as appropriate.
68	(e) Approve methods for teaching and assessing curricula on
69	the history of African Americans.
70	(f) Include content on the history of African Americans in
71	any preparations for statewide assessments, when appropriate.
72	(g) Include content on the history of African Americans in
73	all appropriate subject areas.
74	(h) Partner with a state university for the development and
75	implementation of professional development, curricula, and
76	instructional support, including jointly seeking external
77	funding and preparing teachers and other instructional staff to
78	teach the history of African Americans.
79	(i) Develop strategies to involve parents in the
80	implementation of the curricula for the history of African
81	Americans, including through awareness information sessions.
82	(j) Partner with community members in the development and
83	ongoing implementation of curricula on the history of African
84	Americans.
85	(3) By August 1, 2022, and annually thereafter, each
86	district school superintendent, charter school principal, and
87	private school director or similar administrator shall provide

93	Section 2. Paragraph (a) of subsection (3) of section
94	1008.22, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
95	1008.22 Student assessment program for public schools
96	(3) STATEWIDE, STANDARDIZED ASSESSMENT PROGRAMThe
97	Commissioner of Education shall design and implement a
98	statewide, standardized assessment program aligned to the core
99	curricular content established in the Next Generation Sunshine
100	State Standards. The commissioner also must develop or select
101	and implement a common battery of assessment tools that will be
102	used in all juvenile justice education programs in the state.
103	These tools must accurately measure the core curricular content
104	established in the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards.
105	Participation in the assessment program is mandatory for all
106	school districts and all students attending public schools,
107	including adult students seeking a standard high school diploma
108	under s. 1003.4282 and students in Department of Juvenile
109	Justice education programs, except as otherwise provided by law.
110	If a student does not participate in the assessment program, the
111	school district must notify the student's parent and provide the
112	parent with information regarding the implications of such
113	nonparticipation. The statewide, standardized assessment program

115	(a) Statewide, standardized comprehensive assessments.—The

The statewide, standardized 118 Writing assessment shall be administered annually at least once at the elementary, middle, and high school levels. When the 119 120 Reading and Writing assessments are replaced by English Language 121 Arts (ELA) assessments, ELA assessments shall be administered to 122 students in grades 3 through 10. Retake opportunities for the 123 grade 10 Reading assessment or, upon implementation, the grade 124 10 ELA assessment must be provided. Students taking the ELA 125 assessments shall not take the statewide, standardized 126 assessments in Reading or Writing. Reading passages and writing prompts for ELA assessments shall incorporate grade-level core 127 curricula content from social studies and, when appropriate, 128 129 curricula content from the history of African Americans. The 130 statewide, standardized Mathematics assessments shall be 131 administered annually in grades 3 through 8. Students taking a 132 revised Mathematics assessment shall not take the discontinued 133 assessment. The statewide, standardized Science assessment shall 134 be administered annually at least once at the elementary and 135 middle grades levels. In order to earn a standard high school 136 diploma, a student who has not earned a passing score on the 137 grade 10 Reading assessment or, upon implementation, the grade 138 10 ELA assessment must earn a passing score on the assessment 139 retake or earn a concordant score as authorized under subsection (9). 140

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Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2021.

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
