23	Section 1. Subsection (4) of section 468.203, Florida
24	Statutes, is amended to read:
25	468.203 Definitions.—As used in this act, the term:
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"Occupational therapy" means the therapeutic use of 26 (4) 27 occupations through habilitation, rehabilitation, and the 28 promotion of health and wellness with individuals, groups, or 29 populations, along with their families or organizations to 30 support participation, performance, and function in the home, 31 school, workplace, community, and other settings for clients who 32 have or are at risk of developing an illness, injury, disease, disorder, condition, impairment, disability, activity 33 limitation, or participation restriction purposeful activity or 34 interventions to achieve functional outcomes. 35 For the purposes of this subsection: 36 (a) 37 1. "Activities of daily living" means functions and tasks for self-care which are performed on a daily or routine basis, 38 39 including functional mobility, bathing, dressing, eating and 40 swallowing, personal hygiene and grooming, toileting, and other similar tasks. "Achieving functional outcomes" means to maximize 41 42 the independence and the maintenance of health of any individual 43 who is limited by a physical injury or illness, a cognitive 44 impairment, a psychosocial dysfunction, a mental illness, a 45 developmental or a learning disability, or an adverse 46 environmental condition. "Assessment" means the use of skilled observation or 47 2. the administration and interpretation of standardized or 48 nonstandardized tests and measurements to identify areas for 49 50 occupational therapy services.

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"Behavioral health services" means the promotion of 51 3. 52 occupational performance through services to support positive 53 mental health by providing direct individual and group 54 interventions to improve the client's participation in daily 55 occupations. 56 4. "Health management" means activities related to developing, managing, and maintaining health and wellness, 57 including self-management, with the goal of improving or 58 59 maintaining health to support participation in occupations. 60 5. "Instrumental activities of daily living" means daily or routine activities a person must perform to live 61 62 independently within the home and community. "Mental health services" means the promotion of 63 6. 64 occupational performance related to mental health, coping, 65 resilience, and well-being by providing individual, group, and 66 population level supports and services to improve the client's 67 participation in daily occupations for those who are at risk of, experiencing, or in recovery from these conditions, along with 68 69 their families and communities. 7. "Occupations" means meaningful and purposeful everyday 70 activities performed and engaged in by individuals, groups, 71 populations, families, or communities which occur in contexts 72 and over time, such as activities of daily living, instrumental 73 74 activities of daily living, health management, rest and sleep, 75 education, work, play, leisure, and social participation. The

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76 term includes more specific occupations and execution of 77 multiple activities that are influenced by performance patterns, 78 performance skills, and client factors, resulting in varied 79 outcomes. 8. "Occupational performance" means the ability to 80 81 perceive, desire, recall, plan, and carry out roles, routines, 82 tasks, and subtasks for the purpose of self-maintenance, selfpreservation, productivity, leisure, and rest, for oneself or 83 others, in response to internal or external demands of 84 85 occupations and contexts. The practice of occupational therapy includes services 86 (b) 87 include, but is are not limited to: Assessment, treatment, education of, and consultation 88 1. 89 with, individuals, groups, and populations whose abilities to 90 participate safely in occupations, including activities of daily 91 living, instrumental activities of daily living, rest and sleep, 92 education, work, play, leisure, and social participation are 93 impaired or at risk for impairment due to issues related, but 94 not limited, to developmental deficiencies, the aging process, 95 learning disabilities, physical environment and sociocultural context, physical injury or disease, cognitive impairments, and 96 psychological and social disabilities The assessment, treatment, 97 98 and education of or consultation with the individual, family, or 99 other persons. 100 2. Methods or approaches to determine abilities and

102	but not limited to, the identification of physical, sensory,
103	cognitive, emotional, or social deficiencies Interventions

107	3. Specific occupational therapy techniques used for

(c) The use of devices subject to 21 C.F.R. s. 801.109 and identified by the board is expressly prohibited except by an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who has received training as specified by the board.
