19 E	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

21	Section 1. Section 259.20, Florida Statutes, is created to
22 1	read:
23	259.20 Florida Wildlife Corridor.—
24	(1) SHORT TITLEThis section may be cited as the "Florida
25 <u>v</u>	Wildlife Corridor Act."

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26 (2) DEFINITIONS.-As used in this section, the term: 27 "Conserved lands" means federal, state, or local lands (a) 28 owned or managed for conservation purposes. Such lands include, but are not limited to, federal, state, and local parks; federal 29 30 and state forests; wildlife management areas; wildlife refuges; military bases and airports with conservation lands; and 31 32 privately owned land with a conservation easement, which 33 includes, but is not limited to, ranches, forestry operations, 34 and groves. (b) 35 "Florida Ecological Greenways Network" means the model developed to delineate large connected areas of ecological 36 37 significance statewide, which is periodically updated. 38 "Florida Wildlife Corridor" means those conserved (C) 39 lands and opportunity areas defined by the department as Priority Level One, Two, or Three in the Florida Ecological 40 41 Greenways Network. 42 "Opportunity area" means those lands and waters within (d) 43 the Florida Wildlife Corridor that are not conserved lands, but 44 are green spaces lacking conservation status that are contiguous 45 to or between conserved lands and that provide the opportunity 46 to develop the Florida Wildlife Corridor into a statewide 47 conservation network. (e) "Wildlife" has the same meaning as provided in s. 48 49 379.2255(15). "Wildlife corridor" means the network of connected 50 (f) Page 2 of 7

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51 wildlife habitats required for long-term survival and genetic 52 exchange amongst regional wildlife populations, serving to 53 prevent fragmentation by providing ecological connectivity of 54 the lands needed to furnish adequate habitat and allow safe 55 movement and dispersal. 56 (g) "Wildlife crossing" means a landscape design element 57 that connects two or more patches of wildlife habitat meant to 58 function as a safe conduit for wildlife over or beneath roads, 59 waters, and other barriers to wildlife movement. The term 60 includes design elements used to protect panther and other critical wildlife habitat corridor connections and reduce motor 61 62 vehicle collisions with wildlife, consequently reducing the 63 likelihood of injuries and mortalities to humans and wildlife, 64 as well as reducing the potential for damage to motor vehicles. 65 (3) LEGISLATIVE INTENT.-66 (a) The Legislature recognizes that the state population 67 is growing rapidly and that lands and waters that provide 68 Florida's green infrastructure and vital habitat for wide-69 ranging wildlife, such as the Florida panther, need to be preserved and protected. 70 71 The Legislature recognizes that the Florida Wildlife (b) 72 Corridor is an existing physical, geographically defined area 73 comprised of over 18 million acres, of which 10 million acres 74 are conservation lands. 75 The Legislature declares that the Florida Wildlife (C)

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76 Corridor has no regulatory powers or duties and that the purpose 77 of the Florida Wildlife Corridor is to create incentives for 78 conservation and sustainable development while sustaining and 79 conserving the green infrastructure that is the foundation for 80 Florida's economy and quality of life. Objectives of the Florida 81 Wildlife Corridor include: 82 1. Maintaining wildlife access to the habitats needed to 83 allow for migration and genetic exchange amongst regional 84 wildlife populations. 85 2. Preventing fragmentation of wildlife habitats. 3. Protecting the headwaters of major watersheds, 86 87 including the Everglades and the St. Johns River. 4. Providing ecological connectivity of the lands needed 88 89 for large-scale ecosystem functions, such as water and 90 prescribed burns that are essential for land management and 91 restoration. 92 5. Preserving and protecting land and waters that are not 93 only vital to wildlife, but are critical to the state's 94 groundwater recharge and serve as watersheds that provide 95 drinking water to most Floridians as well as help maintain the 96 health of downstream coastal estuaries. 97 6. Providing wildlife crossings for the protection and 98 safety of wildlife and the traveling public. 99 7. Helping to sustain Florida's working ranches, farms, 100 and forests that provide compatible wildlife habitat while

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101 sustaining rural prosperity and agricultural production. 102 DEPARTMENT DUTIES.-In support of the Florida Wildlife (4) 103 Corridor, the department shall: 104 Encourage all state, regional, and local agencies, (a) 105 including, but not limited to, the Fish and Wildlife 106 Conservation Commission and the Department of Transportation, 107 that acquire lands to include in their land-buying efforts the 108 acquisition of sufficient legal interest in the lands that are 109 opportunity areas within the Florida Wildlife Corridor to ensure 110 its continued viability. 111 Encourage investment in voluntary conservation (b) 112 easements with private landowners to achieve conservation of 113 Florida Wildlife Corridor opportunity areas. 114 (c) Encourage state land-buying and land-management agencies to consider the opportunity areas within the Florida 115 116 Wildlife Corridor a multi-phased project for the purpose of 117 listing, acquisition, and management. 118 (d) Consider the inclusion of private funds to supplement 119 the state's contribution in its efforts to acquire fee or less-120 than-fee interests in lands that contain recognized conserved 121 lands and opportunity areas in the Florida Wildlife Corridor. 122 Seek opportunities to attract new federal funding and (e) strengthen existing federal funding programs to protect and 123 124 conserve the Florida Wildlife Corridor. 125 Encourage private landowners to continue to allow the (f)

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126 use of private property for Florida Wildlife Corridor 127 preservation and enhancement through existing and future 128 incentives and liability protection. 129 Encourage new approaches and novel financing (g) 130 mechanisms for long-term protection of the Florida Wildlife 131 Corridor; payments for ecosystem services; blended financing for 132 growth, resilience, and green infrastructure; support for 133 sustainable intensification of agriculture; and other innovative 134 approaches. 135 (h) Encourage state and local agencies with economic and ecotourism development responsibilities to recognize the 136 137 importance of the Florida Wildlife Corridor in encouraging 138 public access and bringing nature-based tourism to local 139 communities and to support acquisition and development 140 activities for preservation and enhancement of the corridor. 141 (i) Encourage the protection, preservation, and 142 enhancement of the natural value of the Florida Wildlife 143 Corridor for the citizens of the state, both present and future. 144 Section 2. The St. Johns River Water Management District, 145 in consultation with Seminole County, the Department of 146 Environmental Protection, the Fish and Wildlife Conservation 147 Commission, and the Department of Transportation, shall issue a report by December 31, 2021, that includes information and 148 149 updates regarding the implementation of recommendations from the 150 Little Wekiva River Watershed Management Plan Final Report dated

151	November 2005. The report shall include, but not be limited to,
152	the following information: a description of all projects or
153	recommendations included in the report that have been
154	implemented and the completion dates, an analysis of how the
155	projects or recommendations achieved the results included in the
156	report, an analysis of costs for ongoing operation and
157	maintenance of completed construction projects, an analysis of
158	any new projects that may benefit the watershed, and
159	recommendations and cost estimates for future studies or
160	projects that may be necessary to identify new or potentially
161	significant contributors of sediment accumulation in the Little
162	Wekiva River. Appropriate action to resolve compliance issues
163	shall be taken pursuant to chapter 373, Florida Statutes, if the
164	Department of Environmental Protection or the water management
165	district discovers a violation of any permit condition.
166	Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2021.

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
