HR 8057 2021

House Resolution

A resolution designating the week of April 11-17, 2021, as "Black Maternal Health Awareness Week" in Florida.

WHEREAS, the national Black Maternal Health Week campaign, founded and led by the Black Mamas Matter Alliance, is a week of awareness and community building, and

WHEREAS, Black Maternal Health Week is intended to increase attention to the state of Black maternal health in the United States; the root causes of poor maternal health outcomes; and community-driven policy, programs, and care solutions, and

WHEREAS, while the United States spends more on health care than any other country, it has the worst disparities in maternal health outcomes and experienced an increase in the maternal mortality rate between 1990 and 2013, and

WHEREAS, in 2018, Black women in Florida experienced pregnancy-related mortality at a rate nearly three times that of white women, with 32 deaths per 100,000 live births as compared to 12.9 deaths per 100,000 deaths, respectively, and

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Black women in the United States are three to four times more likely than white women to die from pregnancy-related causes, and

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WHEREAS, Black women in the United States suffer from life threatening pregnancy complications, known as "maternal morbidities," twice as often as white women, and

WHEREAS, maternal mortality rates in the United States are among the highest in the world and increasing rapidly, and

WHEREAS, the United States has the highest maternal mortality rate among affluent countries, in part because of the disproportionate mortality rate of Black mothers, and

WHEREAS, these deaths have devastating effects on Black children and families, and the vast majority of these deaths are preventable through efforts to ensure that Black birthing people can access information, services, and support to make their own health care decisions, particularly around pregnancy and childbearing, and

WHEREAS, high rates of maternal mortality among Black women occur across income levels, educational levels, and socioeconomic status, and

WHEREAS, even as there is growing concern about improving access to mental health services, Black birthing people are the least likely to have access to mental health screenings, treatment, and support before, during, and after pregnancy, and

WHEREAS, greater equitable access to prevention, early identification, and effective treatment services that are delivered in appropriate care settings can improve Black

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birthing people's chronic health conditions and maternal health, and

WHEREAS, Black Maternal Health Awareness Week serves to raise awareness of the state of Black maternal health and amplify the voices of Black women and birthing persons, families, and communities and is an opportunity to fight to end maternal mortality locally and globally, NOW, THEREFORE,

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Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

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That the week of April 11-17, 2021, is designated as "Black Maternal Health Awareness Week" in Florida.

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
