Section 400.488, Florida Statutes, is amended 25 to read:

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26 400.488 Assistance with self-administration of medication 27 and with other tasks.-

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(1) For purposes of this section, the term:

(a) "Informed consent" means advising the patient, or the patient's surrogate, guardian, or attorney in fact, that the patient may be receiving assistance with self-administration of medication <u>or other tasks</u> from an unlicensed person.

(b) "Unlicensed person" means an individual not currently licensed to practice nursing or medicine who is employed by or under contract to a home health agency and who has received training with respect to assisting with the self-administration of medication or other tasks as provided by agency rule.

Patients who are capable of self-administering their 38 (2) 39 own medications and performing other tasks without assistance shall be encouraged and allowed to do so. However, an unlicensed 40 41 person may, consistent with a dispensed prescription's label or the package directions of an over-the-counter medication, assist 42 43 a patient whose condition is medically stable with the self-44 administration of routine, regularly scheduled medications that 45 are intended to be self-administered. An unlicensed person may 46 also provide assistance with other tasks specified in subsection (6). Assistance with self-administration of medication or such 47 48 other tasks self-medication by an unlicensed person may occur 49 only upon a documented request by, and the written informed consent of, a patient or the patient's surrogate, guardian, or 50

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51 attorney in fact. For purposes of this section, self-32 administered medications include both legend and over-the-33 counter oral dosage forms, topical dosage forms, <u>transdermal</u> 34 <u>patches</u>, and topical ophthalmic, otic, and nasal dosage forms, 35 including solutions, suspensions, sprays, inhalers, and 36 nebulizer treatments.

57 (3) Assistance with self-administration of medication 58 includes:

(a) Taking the medication, in its previously dispensed, properly labeled container, from where it is stored and bringing it to the patient. For purposes of this paragraph, an insulin syringe that is prefilled with the proper dosage by a pharmacist and an insulin pen that is prefilled by the manufacturer are considered medications in previously dispensed, properly labeled containers.

(b) In the presence of the patient, confirming that the medication is intended for that patient, orally advising the patient of the medication name and purpose, opening the container, removing a prescribed amount of medication from the container, and closing the container.

(c) Placing an oral dosage in the patient's hand or placing the dosage in another container and helping the patient by lifting the container to his or her mouth.

(h) (i) Medications for which the time of administration, 114 115 the amount, the strength of dosage, the method of administration, or the reason for administration requires 116 117 judgment or discretion on the part of the unlicensed person. An interfacility transfer must be conducted in 165 a permitted ambulance if it is determined that the patient 166 needs, or is likely to need, medical attention during transport. 167 If the emergency medical technician or paramedic believes the 168 level of patient care required during the transfer is beyond his 169 or her capability, the medical director, or his or her designee, 170 must be contacted for clearance prior to conducting the transfer. If necessary, the medical director, or his or her 171

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172 designee, shall attempt to contact the treating physician for 173 consultation to determine the appropriateness of the transfer.

174 (4) (3) Infants younger less than 28 days old or infants 175 weighing less than 5 kilograms τ who require critical care 176 interfacility transport to a neonatal intensive care unit must τ 177 shall be transported in a permitted advanced life support or 178 basic life support transport ambulance, or in a permitted 179 advanced life support or basic life support ambulance that is 180 recognized by the department as meeting designated criteria for 181 neonatal interfacility critical care transport.

The waiver must identify all of the 288 medications intended for the resident, including names and 289 dosages of such medications, and must immediately be updated 290 each time the resident's medications or dosages change.
