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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to certification for prescriptive authority; creating s. 490.017, F.S.; defining terms; requiring the Board of Psychology to certify certain psychologists to exercise prescriptive authority; requiring the board to develop and implement specified procedures to review requirements for certification; requiring the board to adopt rules; specifying application requirements for certification; requiring the board to establish a method for certification renewal; authorizing certified psychologists to use their prescriptive authority in accordance with rules adopted by the board; specifying requirements and prohibitions for prescribing psychologists; requiring prescribing psychologists who are authorized to prescribe controlled substances to file specified information with the board within a specified timeframe; requiring the board to maintain a record of such information; requiring the board to submit a list of prescribing psychologists, including specified information, to the Board of Pharmacy; requiring the board to notify the Board of Pharmacy of any changes to the list; requiring the board to establish an interim panel by a specified date to provide recommendations for rules governing prescriptive authority for psychologists; providing for membership of the panel; requiring the panel to submit its recommendations to the board by a specified date; providing for future expiration of the panel;

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providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 490.017, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

- 490.017 Certification for prescriptive authority.-
- (1) DEFINITIONS.—As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Clinical experience" means a period of training and practice in which a person, under the supervision of a psychologist licensed under this chapter, learns and conducts diagnoses and interventions.
- (b) "Controlled substance" has the same meaning as in s. 893.02.
 - (c) "Drug" has the same meaning as in s. 499.003.
- (d) "Prescribing psychologist" means a psychologist

 licensed under this chapter who has received a certificate for

 prescriptive authority from the board which has not been

 modified, suspended, or revoked.
- (e) "Prescription" has the same meaning as in s. 465.003(14).
- (f) "Prescriptive authority" means the authorization to prescribe, administer, discontinue, or distribute without charge drugs or controlled substances recognized or customarily used in the diagnosis, treatment, or management of an individual with a psychiatric, mental, cognitive, nervous, emotional, developmental, or behavioral disorder. The term includes the authorization to order necessary laboratory tests, diagnostic examinations, and procedures necessary to obtain laboratory

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tests or diagnostic examinations or other procedures directly related thereto within the scope of the practice of psychology.

- (2) DUTIES OF THE BOARD.—The board shall do all of the following:
- (a) Certify psychologists who meet the requirements listed in subsection (3) to exercise prescriptive authority.
- (b) Develop and implement procedures to review education and training requirements for certification.
- (c) Adopt rules to deny, modify, suspend, or revoke prescriptive authority certification. The board may require a prescribing psychologist to undergo remediation of deficiencies in his or her training or practice upon a determination that such deficiencies could reasonably be expected to jeopardize the health, safety, or welfare of the public.
 - (3) APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS.—
- (a) A psychologist licensed under this chapter who applies for prescriptive authority certification must provide, through an official transcript or other official document deemed satisfactory by the board, proof of all of the following:
 - 1. A valid and current license to practice psychology.
 - 2. Graduation from a doctoral program in psychology.
- 3. A passing score on an examination developed by a nationally recognized body, such as the Psychopharmacology Examination for Psychologists offered by the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards, and approved by the board to establish competency in prescriptive authority.
- 4.a. An organized sequence of study in a program offering intensive didactic education consistent with established policies of the American Psychological Association for education

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of psychologists in preparation for prescriptive authority. The program must include coursework in the specific areas of basic sciences, neurosciences, physical examination, interpretation of laboratory tests, pathological basis of disease, clinical medicine, clinical neurotherapeutics, systems of care, pharmacology, clinical pharmacology, psychopharmacology, psychopharmacology, psychopharmacology research, and professional, ethical, and legal issues. The program must consist of an appropriate number of hours of didactic instruction, as determined by the board, to ensure the knowledge and skills required to prescribe drugs in a safe and effective manner.

- b. Relevant clinical experience sufficient to attain competency in the psychopharmacological treatment of a diverse patient population consistent with established policies of the American Psychological Association for training of psychologists in preparation for prescriptive authority.
- c. The educational and training requirements under this subparagraph may be met as part of a doctoral program in psychology or postdoctoral training or fellowship in psychology.
- (b) A psychologist is exempt from the educational and training requirements under paragraph (a) if he or she:
- 1. Is a physician licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459, a nurse practitioner licensed under chapter 464, or another health care practitioner licensed under chapter 458, chapter 459, or chapter 464 who holds comparable prescriptive authority.
- 2. Has completed the United States Department of Defense Psychopharmacology Demonstration Project.
 - (4) CERTIFICATION RENEWAL. -
 - (a) The board shall establish by rule a method for the

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renewal of prescriptive authority certification, which must occur in conjunction with licensure renewal pursuant to s. 490.007.

- (b) Each applicant for renewal must present satisfactory evidence to the board demonstrating the completion of 20 hours of continuing education instruction relevant to prescriptive authority during the previous 2-year licensure period.
 - (5) PRESCRIPTIVE AUTHORITY.-
- (a) A prescribing psychologist may use his or her prescriptive authority certification in accordance with rules adopted by the board.
 - (b) A prescribing psychologist shall:
- 1. Maintain a record of all prescribed drugs for each patient.
 - 2. Comply with all rules adopted pursuant to this section.
- 3. Consult and collaborate with a patient's primary care physician and concur with the physician before prescribing a drug, altering a drug treatment plan, or terminating a drug.
 - (c) A prescribing psychologist may not:
- 1. Issue a prescription without a valid and current prescriptive authority certification.
 - 2. Delegate prescriptive authority to another person.
- 3. Prescribe drugs to a patient who does not have a primary care physician.
 - (d) A prescription issued by a prescribing psychologist
 must:
- 143 <u>1. Be written in a manner determined by the board to be</u> 144 <u>sufficient.</u>
 - 2. Comply with all applicable state and federal laws.

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- (6) CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE PRESCRIPTIVE AUTHORITY.-
- (a) When authorized to prescribe controlled substances, a prescribing psychologist must file with the board, within 10 days after such authorization, his or her federal Drug Enforcement Administration registration number.
- (b) The board shall maintain a current record of every prescribing psychologist authorized to prescribe controlled substances.
 - (7) NOTIFICATION TO THE BOARD OF PHARMACY.-
- (a) The board shall submit to the Board of Pharmacy an initial list of prescribing psychologists containing all of the following:
 - 1. The psychologist's name.
 - 2. The psychologist's certification number.
- 3. The effective date of the psychologist's prescriptive authority certification.
- (b) The board shall promptly notify the Board of Pharmacy of any changes to the list, including changes relating to certification, revocation, suspension, modification, denial, or reinstatement of a psychologist's prescriptive authority.
- (8) INTERIM PANEL.—The board shall establish an interim panel by October 1, 2022, to provide recommendations for proposed rules governing prescriptive authority for psychologists.
- (a) The interim panel shall be composed of all of the following:
- 1. One psychiatrist licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459, selected by the Board of Medicine.
 - 2. One physician licensed under chapter 458 who is a board-

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certified pediatrician, selected by the Board of Medicine.

3. One pharmacist licensed under chapter 465 who holds a doctor of pharmacy degree, selected by the Board of Pharmacy.

4. Two psychologists licensed under chapter 490 who currently serve on the board or hold postdoctoral master's degrees in clinical psychopharmacology, to be selected by the board.

(b) The panel shall submit its recommendations for proposed rules to the board by May 1, 2023.

(c) This subsection expires May 1, 2023.

Section 2. This act shall take effect October 1, 2022.
