14.2031 Statewide Office of Resilience.-

9 (1) The Statewide Office of Resilience is established 10 within the Executive Office of the Governor for the purpose of reviewing all flood resilience and mitigation activities in the 11 state and coordinating flood resilience and mitigation efforts 12 with federal, state, and local governmental entities and other 13 14 stakeholders. The office shall be headed by a Chief Resilience 15 Officer, who is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the 16 Governor. 075025 - h7053.line41.docx

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17	(2) The Chief Resilience Officer shall:
18	(a) Serve as a subject-matter expert for the state on
19	issues related to flood resilience and mitigation.
20	(b) Be responsible for promoting and coordinating flood

23	(c) Provide strategic direction for interagency and cross-
24	disciplinary initiatives to minimize the flood vulnerability of
25	critical assets as defined in s. 380.093(2).
26	(d) Work with federal, state, regional, and local

28	flood resilience and mitigation priorities.
29	(e) Collaborate with the Florida Flood Hub for Applied
