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7	WHEREAS, former United States Congresswoman Carrie P. Meek
8	was born in Tallahassee, Florida, on April 29, 1926, to Willie
9	and Carrie Pittman who began their lives together as
10	sharecroppers, and
11	WHEREAS, as the granddaughter of "Miss Mandy," a slave born
12	and raised in Lilly, Georgia, Congresswoman Meek grew up during
13	the turbulent Jim Crow era but would overcome many racial,
14	gender, and educational barriers during her lifetime, and
15	WHEREAS, in 1946, Congresswoman Meek earned a Bachelor of
16	Science in Biology and Physical Education from Florida
17	Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU), where she was a
18	member of the esteemed Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and
19	WHEREAS, in the 1940s, a state law prohibited Black
20	students from attending public graduate schools, which forced
21	Congresswoman Meek to enroll out of state at the University of
22	Michigan, where she earned a Master of Science in Public Health
23	and Physical Education, and
24	WHEREAS, upon graduating from the University of Michigan,
25	Congresswoman Meek accepted a position at Bethune-Cookman

26 College as an instructor and became the institution's first 27 female basketball coach, and

28 WHEREAS, Congresswoman Meek later returned to FAMU as a 29 health and physical education instructor, a position she would 30 hold until 1961, and

31 WHEREAS, after leaving FAMU, Congresswoman Meek continued 32 her career in higher education at Miami Dade Community College, 33 where she became the first Black professor, Associate Dean, and 34 Assistant to the Vice President of the college, and

35 WHEREAS, in 1978, Congresswoman Meek ran for the Florida 36 House of Representatives and defeated 12 other candidates to win 37 her place in the Florida Legislature, serving from 1979 to 1983 38 and chairing the Education Appropriations Subcommittee, and

39 WHEREAS, beginning in 1983, Congresswoman Meek served as 40 the first Black woman elected to the Florida Senate and the 41 first Black legislator to serve in that legislative body in more 42 than a century, and

WHEREAS, as a skilled lawmaker who was once called "the conscience of the Florida Senate," Congresswoman Meek passed significant legislation to promote literacy and encourage students to stay in school and was a long-time champion of housing rights, and

WHEREAS, in 1992, Congresswoman Meek continued her
trailblazing political career representing Florida's 17th
Congressional District as a member of the United States House of

51 Representatives and becoming one of the first Black members from 52 the state elected to the United States Congress since the 53 Reconstruction era, and

54 WHEREAS, while serving in the United States Congress, 55 Congresswoman Meek was a member of the powerful House Committee 56 on Appropriations and worked to secure \$100 million in aid to 57 rebuild Dade County as the area recovered from Hurricane Andrew, 58 and

59 WHEREAS, Congresswoman Meek built her legacy on advocating 60 for equal and fair treatment for all individuals, regardless of 61 the color of their skin, stating "I didn't go into politics with 62 a chip on my shoulder, but I let people up there know I expected 63 to get the same results as anybody else," and

64 WHEREAS, after leaving the United States Congress,
65 Congresswoman Meek returned to her community to fully dedicate
66 herself to charitable activities through the Carrie Meek
67 Foundation, which serves as an extension of the public service
68 to which she was committed throughout her lifetime, and

69 WHEREAS, on November 28, 2021, Congresswoman Meek passed 70 away, leaving behind a legacy that will significantly enrich 71 future generations of Florida residents, NOW, THEREFORE,
