An act relating to continuing chiroprace

An act relating to continuing chiropractic education; amending s. 460.408, F.S.; deleting a requirement that chiropractic continuing education be completed in a classroom setting; prohibiting the board from limiting the number of hours of continuing education courses a chiropractic physician may complete through distance learning; authorizing the board to make exceptions to meet continuing education requirements during a declared state of emergency; specifying who may teach board-approved continuing education courses; requiring the board to adopt rules; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 460.408, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

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460.408 Continuing chiropractic education.-

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(1) The board shall require licensees to periodically demonstrate their professional competence as a condition of renewal of a license by completing up to 40 contact classroom hours of continuing education.

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(a) Continuing education courses sponsored by chiropractic colleges whose graduates are eligible for examination under any provision of this chapter may be approved upon review by the

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board if all other requirements of board rules setting forth criteria for course approval are met.

- (b) The board shall approve those courses that build upon the basic courses required for the practice of chiropractic medicine, and the board may also approve courses in adjunctive modalities. Courses that consist of instruction in the use, application, prescription, recommendation, or administration of a specific company's brand of products or services are not eligible for approval.
- (c) The board may not limit the number of approved continuing education hours that may be completed through distance learning.
- (2) The board may provide exceptions to make exception from the requirements of this section in emergency or hardship cases and during a declared state of emergency in the state.
- (3) Courses shall be taught by a speaker or lecturer with at least one of the following qualifications:
- (a) Holds a post-graduate degree, or bachelor's degree with at least 2 years' experience in the subject matter taught;
- (b) Is a current faculty member of a chiropractic college or school maintaining a standard and reputability approved by the board or is a current faculty member at a medical or osteopathic college or a university accredited by, or having status with, an agency or its successors recognized and approved by the United States Office of Education or the Council on Post-

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- (c) Is a post-graduate level instructor of a chiropractic college or school maintaining a standard and reputability approved by the board, or a post-graduate level instructor at a medical or osteopathic college or a university accredited by, or has status with, an agency or its successor which is recognized and approved by the United States Department of Education or the Office of Post-Secondary Education.
- <u>(4)(3)</u> The board <u>shall</u> <u>may</u> adopt rules <u>required to</u> <u>implement</u> <u>within the requirements of</u> this section <del>that are</del> necessary for its implementation.
  - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2023.
