SUMMARY ANALYSIS

In cases of domestic violence resulting in death, an autopsy may be conducted to determine the victim's specific cause of death. Under s. 406.135, F.S., a photograph or video or audio recording of an autopsy held by a medical examiner is confidential and exempt from public record requirements. However, current law does not exempt a medical examiner's written autopsy report from public record requirements. As such, an autopsy report containing graphic details about the nature of the deceased's injuries may be obtained and publicly shared without the surviving family member's knowledge or consent.

Under s. 119.071(2)(p), F.S., a photograph or video or audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties or the killing of a victim of mass violence is confidential and exempt from public record requirements.

Both exemptions above provide an exception for a surviving spouse, local government entity, or a state or federal agency, to view and copy a photograph or video recording or to listen to or copy an audio recording of such records if certain requirements are met. Additionally, upon a showing of good cause, a court may issue an order authorizing any other person to view or copy a photograph or video recording or to listen to or copy an audio recording of such records under the supervision of the custodian of records and may order any appropriate restrictions or stipulations on such access. If a petition making such a request is filed, the court must provide the surviving spouse or other family member with notice and a copy of the petition and an opportunity to be present and heard at any hearing on the petition.

CS/CS/HB 273 amends s. 406.135, F.S., creating the Rex and Brody Act, to make an autopsy report of a minor whose death was related to an act of domestic violence confidential and exempt from public records requirements when held by a medical examiner.

The bill further amends s. 119.071(2)(p), F.S., to make a photograph or video or audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a minor confidential and exempt from public records requirements when held by an agency.

The bill includes an exception for both exemptions permitting a surviving parent of the deceased minor to view and copy or to listen to and copy such records. In relation to an autopsy report of a minor the surviving parent must not have committed the domestic violence which caused the minor's death. Additionally, the bill requires, for both exemptions, the surviving parent to be notified of any petition filed to view or copy or listen to or copy such records, to be given a copy of the petition, and to be given an opportunity to be present and heard at any hearing on such a petition. The bill requires any other person who requests to copy, view, or listen to such records to comply with specified requirements.

The bill provides for retroactive application of the newly-created public record exemptions. The bill provides the public record exemptions are subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act and will be repealed on October 2, 2028, unless reviewed and saved from repeal through reenactment by the Legislature.

The bill is effective upon becoming a law.

Article I, section 24(c) of the Florida Constitution requires a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting for final passage of a newly-created or expanded public record or public meeting exemption. The bill creates a public record exemption; thus, it requires a two-thirds vote for final passage.

FULL ANALYSIS

I. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS

A. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Background

Public Records

Article I, section 24(a) of the Florida Constitution sets forth the state's public policy regarding access to government records. This section guarantees every person the right to inspect or copy any public record of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government. The Legislature, however, may provide by general law for exemption from public record requirements provided the exemption passes by two-thirds vote of each chamber, states with specificity the public necessity justifying the exemption, and is no broader than necessary to meet its public purpose.²

The Florida Statutes also address the public policy regarding access to government records. Section 119.07(1), F.S., guarantees every person the right to inspect and copy any state, county, or municipal record, unless the record is exempt.³ Furthermore, the Open Government Sunset Review Act⁴ provides that a public record exemption may be created, revised, or maintained only if it serves an identifiable public purpose and the Legislature finds that the purpose is sufficiently compelling to override the strong public policy of open government and cannot be accomplished without the exemption.⁵ An identifiable public purpose is served if the exemption meets one of the following purposes:

- Allows the state or its political subdivisions to effectively and efficiently administer a governmental program, which administration would be significantly impaired without the exemption;
- Protects sensitive personal information that, if released, would be defamatory or would jeopardize
 an individual's safety; however, only the identity of an individual may be exempted under this
 provision; or
- Protects trade or business secrets.⁶

Pursuant to the Open Government Sunset Review Act, a new public record exemption or substantial amendment of an existing public record exemption is repealed on October 2nd of the fifth year following enactment, unless the Legislature reenacts the exemption.⁷

Furthermore, there is a difference between records the Legislature designates as exempt from public record requirements and those the Legislature deems confidential and exempt. A record classified as exempt from public disclosure may be disclosed under certain circumstances. However, if the Legislature designates a record as confidential and exempt from public disclosure, such record may not be released by the custodian of public records to anyone other than the persons or entities specifically designated in statute.⁸

Confidentiality of Autopsy Photographs and Audio and Video Recordings

Section 406.135, F.S., makes a photograph or video or audio recording of an autopsy held by a medical examiner⁹ confidential and exempt from public records requirements. However, a surviving spouse may view and copy a photograph or video recording or listen to or copy an audio recording of his or her deceased spouse's autopsy. If the deceased has no surviving spouse, then a surviving parent or adult child may have access to such records.¹⁰

A local governmental entity, or a state or federal agency, may make a written request to view or copy a photograph or video recording or to listen to or copy an audio recording of an autopsy for the purpose of performing its official duties. The local governmental entity, or state or federal agency, must keep the identity of the deceased confidential, unless disclosure is otherwise required in the performance of its official duties.¹¹

Any other person wishing to access such photographs or recordings may petition the court for authorization to view or copy a photograph or video recording or to listen to or copy an audio recording of an autopsy. Upon a showing of good cause, a court may issue an order authorizing any person to view, listen to, or copy such photographs or recordings under the supervision of the custodian of records and may order any appropriate restrictions or stipulations on such access. ¹² If a petition making such a request is filed with the court, the surviving spouse or other family member must be given reasonable notice, a copy of the petition, and have the opportunity to be present and heard at any hearing on the petition. ¹³

The court must consider the specified factors to determine if there is good cause relating to a request to view, listen to, or copy an autopsy photograph or recording, including:

- Whether disclosure is necessary for the public evaluation of governmental performance;
- The seriousness of the intrusion into the deceased's family's right to privacy and whether disclosure is the least intrusive means available; and
- The availability of similar information in other public records.¹⁴

A custodian of a photograph or video or audio recording of an autopsy who willfully and knowingly violates s. 406.135, F.S., commits a third-degree felony. Similarly, a person who willfully and knowingly violates a court order regarding any photograph or video or audio recording of an autopsy commits a third-degree felony.¹⁵

Criminal and administrative proceedings are exempt from s. 406.135, F.S., but must comply with all other requirements of ch. 119, F.S., unless exempted. A court may, however, upon good cause shown restrict or otherwise control the disclosure of an autopsy, crime scene, or similar photograph or video or audio recordings in a criminal or administrative proceeding.¹⁶

While the photographs or video or audio recordings of an autopsy are protected from public disclosure, generally a medical examiner's case files and autopsy reports are public records and are open for inspection and copying by any person. As such, an autopsy report containing graphic details about the nature of the deceased's injuries may be obtained and publicly shared without the surviving family member's knowledge or consent.

Domestic Violence

Section 741.28, F.S., defines domestic violence as any assault, aggravated assault, battery, aggravated battery, sexual assault, sexual battery, stalking, aggravated stalking, kidnapping, false imprisonment, or any criminal offense resulting in physical injury or death of one family or household member 19 by another family or household member.²⁰ In cases of domestic violence resulting in death, an autopsy may be conducted to determine the victim's specific cause of death.²¹

Confidentiality of Photographs and Audio and Video Recordings Related to the Killing of Specified Victims

Section 119.071(2)(p), F.S, makes a photograph or video or audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties or the killing of a victim of mass violence confidential and exempt from public records requirements when held by an agency.22

"Killing of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties" means all acts or events that cause or otherwise relate to the death of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties, including any related acts or events immediately preceding or subsequent to the acts or events that were the proximate cause of death.²³

"Killing of a victim of mass violence" means events that depict either a victim being killed or the body of a victim killed in an incident in which three or more persons, not including the perpetrator, are killed by the perpetrator of an intentional act of violence.²⁴

A surviving spouse may view and copy a photograph or video recording or listen to or copy an audio recording of such records. If the deceased has no surviving spouse, then a surviving parent or adult child may have access to such records.25

A local governmental entity, or a state or federal agency, may make a written request to view or copy a photograph or video recording or to listen to or copy an audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties or the killing of a victim of mass violence for the purpose of performing its official duties. The local governmental entity, or state or federal agency, must keep the identity of the deceased confidential, unless disclosure is otherwise required in the performance of its official duties.²⁶

Any other person wishing to access such photographs or recordings may petition the court for authorization to view or copy a photograph or video recording or to listen to or copy an audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties or the killing of a victim of mass violence. Upon a showing of good cause, a court may issue an order authorizing any person to view, listen to, or copy such photographs or recordings under the supervision of the custodian of records and may order any appropriate restrictions or stipulations on such access.²⁷ If a petition making such a request is filed with the court, the surviving spouse or other family member must be given reasonable notice, a copy of the petition, and have the opportunity to be present and heard at any hearing on the petition.²⁸

The court must consider specified factors to determine if there is good cause relating to a request to view, listen to, or copy a photograph or recording that depicts or records the killing of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties or the killing of a victim of mass violence, including:

- Whether disclosure is necessary for the public evaluation of governmental performance;
- The seriousness of the intrusion into the deceased's family's right to privacy and whether disclosure is the least intrusive means available; and
- The availability of similar information in other public records.²⁹

A custodian of a photograph or video or audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a law enforcement officer who was acting in accordance with his or her official duties or the killing of a victim of mass violence who willfully and knowingly violates s. 119.071(2)(p), F.S., commits a third-degree felony.³⁰ Similarly, a person who willfully and knowingly violates a court order regarding any photograph or video or audio recording of an autopsy commits a third-degree felony.³¹

Criminal and administrative proceedings are exempt from s. 119.071(2)(p), F.S., but must comply with all other requirements of ch. 119, F.S., unless exempted. A court may, however, restrict or otherwise control the disclosure of a killing, crime scene, or similar photograph or video or audio recording in a criminal or administrative proceeding upon a showing of good cause.³²

Effect of Proposed Changes

CS/CS/HB 273 amends s. 406.135, F.S., creating the Rex and Brody Act,³³ to make the autopsy report of a minor child whose death was the result of an act of domestic violence confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1), F.S., and art. 1, s. 24(a), Fla. Const., when held by a medical examiner.

The bill defines a minor as a person younger than 18 years of age who has not had the disability of nonage removed pursuant to ss. 743.01³⁴ or 743.015, F.S.³⁵

The bill defines domestic violence as the term is defined s. 741.28, F.S., meaning any assault, aggravated assault, battery, aggravated battery, sexual assault, sexual battery, stalking, aggravated stalking, kidnapping, false imprisonment, or any criminal offense resulting in physical injury or death of one family or household member by another family or household member.

Under the bill, a surviving parent of the deceased minor is authorized to view and copy an autopsy report so long as he or she did not commit the act of domestic violence which caused the minor's death. Additionally, such a surviving parent must be given reasonable notice of a petition filed with the court to view or copy the minor's autopsy report, must be provided a copy of the petition, and must be given reasonable notice and the opportunity to be present and heard at any hearing on the petition.

The bill allows a local governmental entity, or a state or federal agency, to view and copy an autopsy report of a minor victim of domestic violence pursuant to a written request submitted for the purpose of performing an official duty. The government entity must keep the identity of the minor victim of domestic violence confidential unless disclosure is required in the performance of its official duties.

Additionally, the bill authorizes any other person to petition a court to view an autopsy report of a minor victim of domestic violence under the supervision of the custodian of records and upon a showing of good cause to the court. In considering whether to grant such a petition, a court must consider the current factors under s. 406.135(4)(b), F.S., which include balancing the need for disclosure with the minor's family's right to privacy.

Under the bill, a custodian of records who willfully and knowingly violates s. 406.135, F.S., relating to an autopsy report of a minor victim of domestic violence, commits a third-degree felony. Additionally, any other person who willfully and knowingly violates a court order relating to an autopsy report of a minor victim of domestic violence, commits a third-degree felony.

The bill further allows a court, upon good cause being shown, to restrict or otherwise control the disclosure of an autopsy, crime scene, or similar report in a criminal or administrative proceeding.

The bill provides for retroactive application of the newly-created public record exemption. The public record exemption created by the bill is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act and will automatically repeal on October 2, 2028, unless reviewed and saved from repeal by the Legislature. The bill also provides the constitutionally required public necessity statement.³⁶

The bill further amends s. 119.071(2)(p), F.S., to make a photograph or video or audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a minor confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1), F.S., and art. 1, s. 24(a), Fla. Const.

The bill defines "killing of a minor" to mean any of the following as they relate to a victim under the age of eighteen:

- All acts or events that cause or otherwise relate to the death;
- Any related acts or events immediately preceding or subsequent to the acts or events that were the proximate cause of the death;
- · Events that depict a victim being killed; and
- Events that depict the body of a victim who has been killed.

Under the bill, a surviving parent of the deceased minor is authorized to view and copy any such photograph or video recording or listen to or copy any such audio recording. A surviving parent must be given reasonable notice of a petition filed with the court to view or copy a photograph or video recording or listen to or copy an audio recording that depicts or records the killing of the minor, must be provided a copy of the petition, and must be given reasonable notice and the opportunity to be present and heard at any hearing on the petition.

The bill allows a local governmental entity, or a state or federal agency, to view or copy a photograph or video recording or listen to or copy an audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a minor pursuant to a written request submitted for the purpose of performing an official duty. The government entity must keep the identity of the minor victim confidential unless disclosure is required in the performance of its official duties.

The bill authorizes any other person to petition a court to view or copy a photograph or video recording or listen to or copy an audio recording that depicts or records the killing of a minor under the supervision of the custodian of records and upon a showing of good cause to the court. In considering whether to grant such a petition, a court must consider the current factors under s. 119.071(2)(p)4.b., F.S., which include balancing the need for disclosure with the minor's family's right to privacy.

Under the bill, a custodian of records who willfully and knowingly violates s. 119.071(2)(p), F.S., relating to a photograph or audio or video recording that depicts or records the killing of a minor, commits a third-degree felony. Additionally, any other person who willfully and knowingly violates a court order relating to a photograph or audio or video recording that depicts or records the killing of a minor, commits a third-degree felony.

The bill provides an effective date of upon becoming a law.

C. DIRECT ECONOMIC IMPACT ON PRIVATE SECTOR:

D. FISCAL COMMENTS:

The bill may have an insignificant negative fiscal impact on entities holding photographs or video or audio recordings that depict or record the killing of a minor or holding autopsy reports of minor victims of domestic violence, as staff responsible for complying with public record requests may require training related to the newly-created public record exemptions. However, any additional costs will likely be absorbed within existing resources.

III. COMMENTS

A. CONSTITUTIONAL ISSUES:

1. Applicability of Municipality/County Mandates Provision:

Not Applicable. This bill does not appear to require counties or municipalities to spend funds or take action requiring the expenditures of funds; reduce the authority that counties or municipalities have to raise revenues in the aggregate; or reduce the percentage of state tax shared with counties or municipalities.

Vote Requirement

Article I, section 24(c) of the Florida Constitution requires a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting for final passage of a newly-created or expanded public record or public meeting exemption. The bill creates two public record exemptions; thus, it requires a two-thirds vote for final passage.

Public Necessity Statement

Article I, section 24(c) of the Florida Constitution requires a public necessity statement for a newly created or expanded public record or public meeting exemption. The bill creates a public record exemption; thus, it includes a public necessity statement. The public necessity statement regarding photographs or video or audio recordings of the killing of a minor states that the Legislature finds, in part, that based on the highly sensitive representations of the deceased in such photographs and recordings, the release and publication of such materials could cause trauma, humiliation, and emotional injury to the immediate family of the deceased. Additionally, the Legislature finds that release and publication of such photographs and recordings may be harmful to the public and may educe violent acts by persons. The public necessity statement regarding an autopsy report of a minor victim of domestic violence states that the Legislature finds, in part, that based on the graphic and sensitive nature of autopsy reports, the release and publication of such reports of minors could cause emotional injury to the minor victim's immediate family and friends.

Breadth of Exemption

Article I, section 24(c) of the Florida Constitution requires a newly created or expanded public record or public meeting exemption to be no broader than necessary to accomplish the stated purpose of the law. The bill creates a public record exemption for a photograph or video or audio recording of the killing of a minor and for the autopsy report of minor victim of domestic violence, neither of which appears to be broader than necessary to accomplish its purpose.

IV. AMENDMENTS/COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE CHANGES

On February 15, 2023, the Criminal Justice Subcommittee adopted two amendments and reported the bill favorably as a committee substitute. The amendments removed Rex and Brody's surname from the bill's short title and made other clarifying technical changes.

On March 23, 2023, the Judiciary Committee adopted a strike-all amendment and reported the bill favorably as a committee substitute. The amendment:

- Amended s. 119.071(2)(p), F.S., to add an additional public records exemption, making a photograph
 or audio or video recording that depicts or records the killing of a minor confidential and exempt from
 public records requirements and provided exceptions to the exemption.
- Provided a definition for "killing of a minor" and "domestic violence."
- Required any other person who requests to copy, view, or listen to such records to comply with specified requirements.
- Required notice, a copy of the petition, and an opportunity to be heard be provided to any surviving parents when a petition is filed to view or copy such photographs or recordings.
- Prohibited a custodian or any other person from willfully and knowingly violating this exemption.
- Provided retroactive application of this new exemption.
- Subjected the new exemption to the OGSR Act and provided a public necessity statement.
- Made other technical clarifying changes.

This analysis is drafted to the committee substitute as passed by the Judiciary Committee.
