11 period and may be renewed if the holder meets the qualifications 12 for renewal as established by the department. A certificate that 13 is not renewed at the end of the 2-year period automatically 14 reverts to an inactive status for a period that may not exceed 6 years 180 days. Such certificate may be reactivated and renewed 15 16 within the 6-year 180-day period by if the certificateholder 17 pursuant to paragraph (h). A certificate that has been inactive 18 for more than 6 years automatically expires and may not be renewed meets all other qualifications for renewal and pays a 19 20 \$50 late fee. Reactivation shall be in a manner and on forms 21 prescribed by department rule.

(h) A certificateholder may request that his or her 911 public safety telecommunicator certificate be placed on inactive status by applying to the department before his or her current certification expires and paying a fee set by the department, which may not exceed \$50.

1. A certificateholder whose certificate has been on inactive status for <u>6 years</u> 1 year or less may renew his or her certificate pursuant to the rules adopted by the department and upon payment of a renewal fee set by the department, which may not exceed \$50.

2. A certificateholder whose certificate has been on inactive status for more than 1 year may renew his or her certificate pursuant to rules adopted by the department.

3. A certificate that has been inactive for more than 6 years automatically expires and may not be renewed.
