Subsections (1) and (3), paragraphs (a) and (b) 32 of subsection (5), subsection (8), and paragraph (f) of subsection (11) of section 464.019, Florida Statutes, are 33 34 amended, paragraph (e) is added to subsection (2), and paragraph (e) is added to subsection (5) of that section, to read: 35 36 464.019 Approval of nursing education programs. -PROGRAM APPLICATION. - An educational institution that 37 (1)38 wishes to conduct a program in this state for the prelicensure 39 education of professional or practical nurses must submit to the department a program application and review fee of \$1,000 for 40 41 each prelicensure nursing education program to be offered at the institution's main campus, branch campus, or other instructional 42 43 site. The program application must include the legal name of the educational institution, the legal name of the nursing education 44 45 program, the legal name of the nursing education program 46 director, and, if such institution is accredited, the name of 47 the accrediting agency. The application must also document that: 48 (a)1. For a professional nursing education program, the program director and at least 50 percent of the program's 49 faculty members are registered nurses who have a master's or 50

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51 higher degree in nursing or a bachelor's degree in nursing and a 52 master's or higher degree in a field related to nursing. 53 2. For a practical nursing education program, the program 54 director and at least 50 percent of the program's faculty members are registered nurses who have a bachelor's or higher 55 56 degree in nursing. 57 The educational degree requirements of this paragraph must may 58 59 be documented by an official transcript or by a written statement from the program director of the educational 60 institution verifying that the institution conferred the degree. 61 The program director shall certify the official transcript or 62 written statement as true and accurate. 63 64 The program's nursing major curriculum consists of at (b) 65 least: 66 1. Fifty percent clinical training in the United States, the District of Columbia, or a possession or territory of the 67 68 United States for a practical nursing education program, an 69 associate degree professional nursing education program, or a

71 2. Forty percent clinical training in the United States, the District of Columbia, or a possession or territory of the 72 73 United States for a bachelor's degree professional nursing education program. 74

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No more than 50 percent of the program's clinical (C)

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76 training consists of clinical simulation.

(d) The program has signed agreements with each agency, facility, and organization included in the curriculum plan as clinical training sites and community-based clinical experience sites.

81 (e) The program has written policies for faculty which 82 include provisions for direct or indirect supervision by program 83 faculty or clinical preceptors for students in clinical training 84 consistent with the following standards:

1. The number of program faculty members equals at least one faculty member directly supervising every 12 students unless the written agreement between the program and the agency, facility, or organization providing clinical training sites allows more students, not to exceed 18 students, to be directly supervised by one program faculty member.

91 2. For a hospital setting, indirect supervision may occur 92 only if there is direct supervision by an assigned clinical 93 preceptor, a supervising program faculty member is available by 94 telephone, and such arrangement is approved by the clinical 95 facility.

96 3. For community-based clinical experiences that involve 97 student participation in invasive or complex nursing activities, 98 students must be directly supervised by a program faculty member 99 or clinical preceptor and such arrangement must be approved by 100 the community-based clinical facility.

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101 4. For community-based clinical experiences not subject to 102 subparagraph 3., indirect supervision may occur only when a 103 supervising program faculty member is available to the student 104 by telephone.

A program's policies established under this paragraph must require that a clinical preceptor who is supervising students in a professional nursing education program be a registered nurse or, if supervising students in a practical nursing education program, be a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse.

The professional or practical nursing curriculum plan 111 (f) documents clinical experience and theoretical instruction in 112 medical, surgical, obstetric, pediatric, and geriatric nursing. 113 114 A professional nursing curriculum plan shall also document 115 clinical experience and theoretical instruction in psychiatric 116 nursing. Each curriculum plan must document clinical training 117 experience in appropriate settings that include, but are not 118 limited to, acute care, long-term care, and community settings.

(g) The professional or practical nursing education program provides theoretical instruction and clinical application in personal, family, and community health concepts; nutrition; human growth and development throughout the life span; body structure and function; interpersonal relationship skills; mental health concepts; pharmacology and administration of medications; and legal aspects of practice. A professional

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126 nursing education program must also provide theoretical 127 instruction and clinical application in interpersonal 128 relationships and leadership skills; professional role and 129 function; and health teaching and counseling skills. 130 The professional or practical nursing education (h) 131 program has established evaluation and standardized admission 132 criteria. The admission criteria must, at a minimum, identify 133 those students who are likely to need additional preparation and 134 educational support to be successful program graduates. The 135 program shall maintain documentation of the individualized 136 student academic support plan for those students identified as 137 in need of additional preparation and educational support. (i) The professional or practical nursing education 138 139 program has an established comprehensive examination to prepare 140 students for the National Council of State Boards of Nursing 141 Licensing Examination (NCLEX). This type of comprehensive 142 examination must be termed an exit examination that all programs 143 will administer and may not be the sole exclusion to graduation 144 if the student has otherwise successfully completed all 145 coursework required by the program. The program director is responsible for ensuring that the average exit examination 146 147 results of the program are posted on the program's website and 148 reported in the program's annual report to the board as 149 required under subsection (3). 150 (j) The program shall submit to the board established Page 6 of 13

159	(e) The board shall deny an application from a program				
160	which has had adverse action taken against it by another				
161	regulatory jurisdiction in the United States. The board may also				
162	revoke the approval of an existing approved program that has had				
163	adverse action taken against it by another regulatory				
164	jurisdiction in the United States.				
165	(3) ANNUAL REPORT.—By November 1 of each year, each				
166	approved <u>program's director</u> program shall submit to the board an				
167	annual report comprised of an affidavit certifying continued

The program 183 director is also subject to discipline under s. 456.072(1)(k). 184 (5) ACCOUNTABILITY.-185 (a)1. An approved program must achieve a graduate passage rate for first-time test takers which is not more than 10 186 187 percentage points lower than the average passage rate during the 188 same calendar year for graduates of comparable degree programs 189 who are United States educated, first-time test takers on the 190 National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing 191 Examination, as calculated by the contract testing service of 192 the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. For purposes of 193 this subparagraph, an approved program is comparable to all 194 degree programs of the same program type from among the 195 following program types: 196 a. Professional nursing education programs that terminate 197 in a bachelor's degree. 198 b. Professional nursing education programs that terminate 199 in an associate degree. 200 c. Professional nursing education programs that terminate

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201 in a diploma.

d. Practical nursing education programs.

203 2. If an approved program's graduate passage rates do not equal or exceed the required passage rates for 1 2 consecutive 204 205 calendar year years, the board shall place the program on 206 probationary status pursuant to chapter 120 and the program 207 director shall submit a written remediation plan to the board. 208 The program director shall appear before the board to present 209 then a plan for remediation, which shall include specific 210 nationally recognized benchmarks to identify progress toward a graduate passage rate goal. The board shall terminate a program 211 212 pursuant to chapter 120 if the program director fails to submit 213 a written remediation plan or fails to appear before the board 214 and present the remediation plan no later than 6 months after the date of the program being placed on probation. The program's 215 216 director is also subject to disciplinary action under s. 217 456.072(1)(k) for such failure. The program must remain on 218 probationary status until it achieves a graduate passage rate 219 that equals or exceeds the required passage rate for any 1 220 calendar year. The board shall deny a program application for a 221 new prelicensure nursing education program submitted by an educational institution if the institution has an existing 222 223 program that is already on probationary status.

3. Upon the program's achievement of a graduate passagerate that equals or exceeds the required passage rate, the

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226 board, at its next regularly scheduled meeting following release 227 of the program's graduate passage rate by the National Council 228 of State Boards of Nursing, shall remove the program's 229 probationary status. If the program, during the 2 calendar year 230 years following its placement on probationary status, does not 231 achieve the required passage rate for any 1 calendar year, the 232 board must may extend the program's probationary status for 1 233 additional year, provided the program has demonstrated adequate 234 progress toward the graduate passage rate goal by meeting a 235 majority of the benchmarks established in the remediation plan. 236 If the program is not granted the 1-year extension or fails to 237 achieve the required passage rate by the end of such extension, 238 the board shall terminate the program pursuant to chapter 120.

239 If an approved program fails to submit the annual (b) 240 report required in subsection (3), the board must shall notify 241 the program director and president or chief executive officer of 242 the educational institution in writing within 15 days after the 243 due date of the annual report. The program director shall appear 244 before the board at the board's next regularly scheduled meeting 245 to explain the reason for the delay. The board shall terminate 246 the program pursuant to chapter 120 if the program director 247 fails to appear before the board, as required under this 248 paragraph, or if the program does not submit the annual report 249 within 6 months after the due date.

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(e) Duly authorized agents or employees of the department

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2.51 may conduct onsite evaluations or inspections at all reasonable 252 hours to ensure that approved programs or accredited programs 253 are in full compliance with this chapter, or to determine 254 whether this chapter or s. 456.072 is being violated. The 255 department may collect any necessary evidence needed to ensure 256 compliance with this chapter or for prosecution as deemed 257 necessary. A failure of a program to refuse to allow an onsite 258 evaluation or inspection is deemed a violation of a legal 259 obligation imposed by the board or the department.

260 RULEMAKING.-The board does not have rulemaking (8) 261 authority to administer this section, except that the board 262 shall adopt rules that prescribe the format for submitting 263 program applications under subsection (1) and annual reports 264 under subsection (3), to enforce and administer subsection (5), 265 and to administer the documentation of the accreditation of 266 nursing education programs under subsection (11). The board may 267 adopt rules relating to the nursing curriculum, including rules 268 relating to the uses and limitations of simulation technology, 269 and rules relating to the criteria to qualify for an extension 270 of time to meet the accreditation requirements under paragraph 271 (11) (f). The board may not impose any condition or requirement 272 on an educational institution submitting a program application, 273 an approved program, or an accredited program, except as 274 expressly provided in this section.

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(11) ACCREDITATION REQUIRED.-

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276	(f) An approved nursing education program may, no sooner
277	than 90 days before the deadline for meeting the accreditation
278	requirements of this subsection, apply to the board for an
279	extension of the accreditation deadline for a period which does
280	not exceed 2 years. An additional extension may not be granted.
281	In order to be eligible for the extension, the approved program
282	must establish that it has a graduate passage rate of 60 percent
283	or higher on the National Council of State Boards of Nursing
284	Licensing Examination for the most recent calendar year and must
285	meet a majority of the board's additional criteria, including,
286	but not limited to, all of the following:
287	1. A student retention rate of 60 percent or higher for
288	the most recent calendar year.
289	2. A graduate work placement rate of 70 percent or higher
290	for the most recent calendar year.
291	3. The program has applied for approval or been approved
292	by an institutional or programmatic accreditor recognized by the
293	United States Department of Education.
294	4. The program is in full compliance with subsections (1)
295	and (3) and paragraph (5) (b).
296	5. The program is not currently in its second year of
297	probationary status under subsection (5).

299	The applicable deadline under this paragraph is tolled from the
300	date on which an approved program applies for an extension until
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301	the date on which the board issues a decision on the requested
302	extension.
303	Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2024.

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
