11	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

13	Section 1. Paragraph (h) of subsection (2) of section
14	1003.42, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
15	1003.42 Required instruction
16	(2) Members of the instructional staff of the public
17	schools, subject to the rules of the State Board of Education
18	and the district school board, shall teach efficiently and
19	faithfully, using the books and materials required that meet the
20	highest standards for professionalism and historical accuracy,
21	following the prescribed courses of study, and employing
22	approved methods of instruction, the following:
23	(h) The history of African Americans, including the
24	history of African peoples before the political conflicts that
25	led to the development of slavery $_{: au}$ the passage to America $_{: au}$ the
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26 enslavement experience; a comprehensive account of the 27 sociopolitical circumstances surrounding slavery, including 28 which political parties supported slavery by adopting pro-29 slavery tenets to their party platform;  $\tau$  abolition;  $\tau$  and the 30 history and contributions of Americans of the African diaspora 31 to society. Students shall develop an understanding of the 32 ramifications of prejudice, racism, and stereotyping on individual freedoms, and examine what it means to be a 33 34 responsible and respectful person, for the purpose of encouraging tolerance of diversity in a pluralistic society and 35 36 for nurturing and protecting democratic values and institutions. Instruction shall include the roles and contributions of 37 individuals from all walks of life and their endeavors to learn 38 39 and thrive throughout history as artists, scientists, educators, businesspeople, influential thinkers, members of the faith 40 41 community, and political and governmental leaders and the courageous steps they took to fulfill the promise of democracy 42 43 and unite the nation. Instructional materials shall include the vital contributions of African Americans to build and strengthen 44 45 American society and celebrate the inspirational stories of 46 African Americans who prospered, even in the most difficult 47 circumstances. Instructional personnel may facilitate 48 discussions and use curricula to address, in an age-appropriate 49 manner, how the individual freedoms of persons have been infringed by slavery, racial oppression, racial segregation, and 50

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51 racial discrimination, as well as topics relating to the 52 enactment and enforcement of laws resulting in racial 53 oppression, racial segregation, and racial discrimination and 54 how recognition of these freedoms has overturned these unjust 55 laws. However, classroom instruction and curriculum may not be 56 used to indoctrinate or persuade students to a particular point 57 of view inconsistent with the principles enumerated in 58 subsection (3) or the state academic standards. Each school 59 district must annually certify and provide evidence to the department, in a manner prescribed by the department, that the 60 61 requirements of this paragraph are met. The department shall prepare and offer standards and curriculum for the instruction 62 63 required by this paragraph and may seek input from the 64 Commissioner of Education's African American History Task Force 65 or from any state or nationally recognized African-American 66 educational organizations. The department may contract with any state or nationally recognized African-American educational 67 68 organizations to develop training for instructional personnel 69 and grade-appropriate classroom resources to support the 70 developed curriculum.

The State Board of Education is encouraged to adopt standards and pursue assessment of the requirements of this subsection. Instructional programming that incorporates the values of the recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor and that is
