14	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

16	Section 1. Section 403.945, Florida Statutes, is created
17	to read:
18	403.945 Carbon Sequestration Task Force
19	(1) As used in this section, the term:
20	(a) "Blue carbon" means carbon sequestered by marine and
21	coastal ecosystems.
22	(b) "Carbon sequestration" means the long-term storage of
23	carbon in plants, soils, geologic formations, and the ocean
24	through land and aquatic habitat management.
25	(2) The Legislature finds that:

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26 Maintaining coastal and freshwater wetlands, nearshore (a) 27 and offshore aquatic ecosystems, conservation lands, healthy and 28 sustainable agriculture, shellfish aquaculture, and timber and 29 silvicultural industries is vital to the state's economy, 30 environment, and natural resources, including significant environmental contributions to water quality and quantity, air 31 32 purification, carbon sequestration, blue carbon, coastal 33 resilience, and habitat for threatened and endangered wildlife. 34 (b) The continued expansion of urban sprawl and the 35 development of coastal areas have led to losses of the state's 36 natural and agricultural lands and decreases in water quality 37 and quantity that have harmed coastal ecosystems and industries, including imperiled wetlands, coral reefs, seagrasses, and 38 39 shellfish aquaculture. (c) To ensure healthy and sustainable agriculture, 40 41 shellfish aquaculture and silvicultural industries, and natural 42 and working lands and waters, a statewide program is necessary 43 to provide incentives for landowners and managers to continue 44 activities and land uses that <u>sequester carbon</u>. 45 (3) The Carbon Sequestration Task Force, a task force as defined in s. 20.03, is created adjunct to the department to 46 47 provide recommendations for the development of a statewide 48 carbon sequestration program. The task force shall operate in a 49 manner consistent with the requirements of s. 20.052. 50 (4) (a) The task force shall be composed of the following Page 2 of 6

52	1. The Secretary of Environmental Protection, or his or
53	her designee.
54	2. The Commissioner of Agriculture, or his or her
55	designee.
56	3. The executive director of the Fish and Wildlife
57	Conservation Commission, or his or her designee.
58	4. The Chief Resilience Officer, or his or her designee.
59	5. A representative from the National Estuary Program,
60	appointed by the Secretary of Environmental Protection.
61	6. A member of an environmental not-for-profit, appointed
62	by the Secretary of Environmental Protection.
63	7. A landowner of working agricultural lands, appointed by
64	the Commissioner of Agriculture.
65	8. A representative from a state university with expertise
66	in energy or sustainability, appointed by the Secretary of
67	Environmental Protection.
68	9. A representative from the University of Florida
69	Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, appointed by the
70	Commissioner of Agriculture.
71	10. A representative from the Florida Sea Grant Program,
72	appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture.
73	(b) Appointments to the task force must be made by August
74	<u>1, 2024.</u>
75	(c) Each appointed member serves at the pleasure of the
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76	appointing official.								
77	(d) A vacancy on the task force must be filled in the same								
78	manner as the original appointment.								
79	(e) The task force shall elect a chair from among the								
80	members.								
81	(f) The task force shall convene no later than September								
82	1, 2024. The task force shall meet quarterly or upon the call of								
83	the chair. The task force shall hold its meetings in person or								
84	through teleconference or other electronic means.								
85	(5) The duties of the task force shall include all of the								
86	following:								
87	(a) Identify and inventory terrestrial and aquatic								
88	environments suitable for carbon sequestration in this state.								
89	(b) Consider possible methods of increasing carbon								
90	sequestration within the natural environment through state land								
91	and marine resource use policies; agricultural, aquacultural,								
92	and silvicultural practices; and other practices to achieve								
93	restoration of natural resources and long-term conservation.								
94	(c) Develop a standardized methodology, including								
95	appropriate technology and existing research, to establish								
96	baseline carbon levels and account for increases in carbon								
97	sequestration over time.								
98	(d) Evaluate additional ecosystem services and benefits of								
99	terrestrial and aquatic environments that may promote								
100	conservation and ecosystem restoration success, including water								
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101 recharge, stormwater filtration, threatened or endangered 102 wildlife habitat, nutrient reduction, flood mitigation and 103 protection, coastal resilience, air quality, soil health, and 104 food security. 105 (e) Recommend short-term and long-term benchmarks for 106 increasing carbon sequestration in terrestrial and aquatic 107 ecosystems. (f) Identify existing carbon markets and other 108 109 considerations relevant to participation by the state in such 110 markets. (q) Identify potential funding mechanisms to encourage 111 112 carbon sequestration practices and activities in this state. 113 (6) By October 1, 2025, the task force shall submit to the 114 Secretary of Environmental Protection a report summarizing the 115 task force activities and findings in its first year, including 116 a nonrecurring budget request for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. 117 (7) By October 1, 2026, the task force shall submit to the 118 Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the 119 House of Representatives a report that compiles the findings and 120 recommendations of the task force. The task force shall 121 terminate on April 30, 2027. Section 2. For the 2024-2025 fiscal year, the sum of 122 123 \$350,000 in nonrecurring funds is appropriated from the 124 Operating Trust Fund to the Department of Environmental 125 Protection for the purpose of providing administrative and
