21	Section 1. Section 1004.6494, Florida Statutes, is created
22	to read:

24	Center
25	(1) There is established the Florida State University
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26	Election Law Center within the Florida State University College
27	of Law.
28	(2) For purposes of this section, the term "election law"
29	means any issues relating to voting rights; election
30	administration; election emergencies; election integrity; voter
31	registration and voter registration databases; cyber issues or
32	other technical issues relating to elections; federal, state,
33	and local legal provisions governing the electoral process;
34	election contests for any federal, state, or local office;
35	matters relating to the electoral college or the casting,
36	counting, or validity of electoral votes; federal and state
37	campaign finance law; election audits; apportionment and
38	redistricting; doctrines relating to justiciability, civil
39	procedure, and remedies which may arise in election-related
40	cases; and the historical, empirical, and comparative aspects of
41	these topics, as well as philosophical and theoretical issues
42	relating to democracy, democratic theory, and republicanism more
43	broadly.
44	(3) The goals of the center are to:
45	(a) Conduct and promote rigorous, objective, nonpartisan,
46	evidence-based research concerning important constitutional,
47	statutory, and regulatory issues relating to election law.
48	(b) Plan and host events to allow students, scholars,
49	legislators, judges, election administrators, attorneys, and
50	members of the public to learn about the electoral process and
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51	election law.
52	(c) Develop and sponsor publicly accessible materials and
53	resources concerning elections and election law.
54	(d) Assist students in learning about, gaining practical
55	experience with, and pursuing career opportunities relating to
56	election law.
57	(e) Enhance the Florida State University College of Law's
58	reputation as a nationally respected source for cutting-edge
59	legal scholarship and technical legal expertise.
60	(f) Serve as a credible, objective, nonpartisan resource
61	to address election law inquiries from federal, state, and local
62	election officials and the Florida Legislature and its staff.
63	(g) Bolster understanding of the electoral process and
64	promote public confidence in the state's electoral system.
65	(h) Develop objective, evidence-based analysis, best
66	practices, and potential reforms for statutes, regulations, and
67	policies governing elections to:
68	1. Enable electoral systems to deal more effectively with
69	natural disasters and other emergencies which can impede or
70	undermine an election.
71	2. Bolster public confidence in the electoral process.
72	3. Ensure that United States citizens who meet the state's
73	voter qualification requirements have a reasonable, adequate,
74	and safe opportunity to exercise their right to vote.
75	4. Minimize the possibility of mistake, fraud, violations,
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76	accidents, or other irregularities impacting elections.
77	(4) In order to carry out the goals set forth in this
78	section, the center is authorized to:
79	(a) Hire necessary faculty and staff pursuant to s.
80	1001.741 and develop and teach courses relating to election law.
81	(b) Hold events, including workshops, symposia,
82	roundtables, interviews, public discussions, lectures, and
83	conferences.
84	(c) Conduct, facilitate, and sponsor research relating to
85	election law in order to publish or otherwise make publicly
86	available articles, reports, analyses, databases, or websites
87	relating to election law issues.
88	(d) Provide training and continuing education for the
89	federal and state judiciaries and judicial organizations,
90	attorneys, Department of State personnel, supervisors of
91	elections and their employees, and other election
92	administrators.
93	(e) Provide formal or informal assistance to the
94	Legislature, as well as government entities or officials at the
95	federal, state, or county levels, concerning elections or
96	election law, including, but not limited to, research, reports,
97	public comments, testimony, or briefs.
98	(f) Provide scholarships and research assistantships to
99	outstanding students interested in election law and sponsor
100	fellowships to pay for qualified students to work with the

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101	center or at any local, state, or federal government office or
102	nonpartisan entity that deals with election law.
103	(g) Partner with other centers, programs, institutes, and
104	associations, as appropriate, to promote the center's goals.
105	(5) The Department of State, supervisors of elections,
106	State Library, and Florida State Archives may and are encouraged
107	to cooperate and share with the center electronic copies of
108	information or data in their possession, custody, or control
109	upon request of the center's director to further the goals
110	established in subsection (3), provided that the center and its
111	employees are subject to, and store such information or data
112	consistent with, comparable confidentiality and security
113	requirements as apply to the Department of State, supervisors of
114	elections, and their employees.
115	(6) Funding for the center is as provided in the General
116	Appropriations Act. The center may also accept charitable
117	donations, grants, and other university funds.
118	(7) The center shall be led by a faculty director who
119	shall be a tenured member of the faculty at the Florida State
120	University College of Law. The faculty director shall be
121	appointed by the dean of the College of Law. The center's day-
122	to-day operations shall be conducted by an executive director.
123	The faculty director, in consultation with the executive
124	director, shall:
125	(a) Establish programs that promote the center's goals.
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126 Develop the budget and disburse the funds (b) 127 appropriated, donated, or provided to the center. 128 Hire employees for the center. (C) 129 Oversee the center's research, education, and training (d) 130 programs, events, and work product. 131 (8) The center's research, work, activities, filings, 132 speakers, events, and operations are subject to academic freedom 133 protections. The center and its faculty and staff may not be 134 compelled to conduct, consult on, or otherwise assist in any 135 research or initiatives by any outside federal, state, or local 136 official or agency or private person or entity. The center shall 137 seek to promote intellectual freedom and viewpoint diversity, as 138 defined in s. 1001.706(13)(a). 139 Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2025.

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
