19	act; amending s. 409.903, F.S.; requiring the agency
20	to seek federal approval and implement federal waivers
21	and state plan amendments for specified purposes;
22	providing an effective date.

24	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

26	Section 1. Section 400.54, Florida Statutes, is amended to
27	read:
28	400.54 Annual assessment of the home health aide for
29	medically fragile children program

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30	(1) The agency shall conduct an annual assessment of the
31	home health aide for medically fragile children program. The
32	assessment must report caregiver satisfaction with the program,
33	report data on adverse incidents, and identify additional
34	support that may be needed by the home health aide for medically
35	fragile children, and assess the rate and extent of
36	hospitalization of children in home health services who are
37	attended by a home health aide for medically fragile children
38	compared to those in home health services provided by a
39	registered nurse or a licensed practical nurse without a home
40	health aide for medically fragile children. <u>Medicaid managed</u>
41	care plans shall provide to the agency data necessary to perform
42	this assessment.
43	(2) The home health agency must report all adverse
44	incidents occurring under the care of a home health aide for
45	medically fragile children to the agency and managed care plan
46	within 48 hours of the incident. For purposes of reporting to
47	the agency under this section, the term "adverse incident"
48	means:
49	(a) Death.
50	(b) Brain or spinal damage.
51	(c) Permanent disfigurement.
52	(d) Fracture or dislocation of bones or joints.
53	(e) A limitation of neurological, physical, or sensory
54	function.
55	(f) An event that is reported to law enforcement or its
56	personnel for investigation.
57	
58	By January 1 of each year, beginning January 1, 2025, the agency
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59	shall report its findings to the Governor, the President of the
60	Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
61	Section 2. Paragraph (a) of subsection (3) and subsection
62	(9) of section 400.4765, Florida Statutes, are amended, and
63	subsection (10) is added to that section, to read:
64	400.4765 Home health aide for medically fragile children

66	(3) TRAINING
67	(a) Before providing services to an eligible relative, a
68	home health aide for medically fragile children must complete an
69	agency-approved training program. The employing home health
70	agency must provide validation of competency by a registered
71	nurse, and maintain documentation of training completion and
72	competency validation. The employing home health agency must
73	provide additional training and competency validation as the
74	medically fragile child's care needs change, consistent with any
75	changes to the plan of care. The employing home health agency
76	must provide training on HIV infections and AIDS and must ensure
77	that each home health aide for medically fragile children holds
78	and maintains a certification in cardiopulmonary resuscitation.
79	<u>(b)</u> The agency, in consultation with the Board of
80	Nursing, shall approve home health aide for medically fragile
81	children training programs developed by home health agencies in
82	accordance with 42 C.F.R. ss. 483.151-483.154 and 484.80 to
83	train family caregivers as home health aides for medically
84	fragile children to increase the health care provider workforce
85	and to authorize persons to provide trained nursing services as
86	delegated by a registered nurse to eligible relatives. The
87	<u>training programs</u> program must consist of at least <u>76</u> 85 hours
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88	of training, including, but not limited to, all of the
89	following:
90	1. Successful completion of at least 40 hours of home
91	health aide training pursuant to s. 400.497. A minimum of 40
92	hours of theoretical instruction in nursing, including, but not
93	limited to, instruction on all of the following:
94	a. Person-centered care.
95	b. Communication and interpersonal skills.
96	c. Infection control.
97	d. Safety and emergency procedures.
98	e. Assistance with activities of daily living.
99	f. Mental health and social service needs.
100	g. Care of cognitively impaired individuals.
101	h.—Basic restorative care and rehabilitation.
102	i. Patient rights and confidentiality of personal
103	information and medical records.
104	jRelevant legal and ethical issues.
105	
106	Such instruction must be offered in various formats, and any
107	interactive instruction must be provided during various times of
108	the day.
109	2. A minimum of 20 hours of skills training on basic
110	nursing skills tailored to the child's individualized care needs
111	as specified in the ordering provider's plan of care, which may
112	include training on the following topics, as applicable
113	including, but not limited to:
114	a. Hygiene, grooming, and toileting.
115	b. Skin care and pressure sore prevention.
116	c. Nutrition and hydration.

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117	d. Measuring vital signs, height, and weight.
118	e. Safe lifting, positioning, and moving of patients.
119	f. Wound care.
120	g. Portable Oxygen use and safety and other respiratory
121	procedures.
122	h. Tracheostomy care.
123	i. Enteral care and therapy.
124	j. Peripheral Intravenous assistive activities and
125	alternative feeding methods.
126	k. Urinary catheterization and <u>care and</u> ostomy care.
127	3. At least 16 hours of clinical training <u>related to the</u>
128	specific needs of an eligible relative and provided under direct
129	supervision of a licensed registered nurse.
130	4. Training concerning HIV infections and AIDS and is
131	required to obtain and maintain a current certificate in
132	cardiopulmonary resuscitation.
133	5. Cardiopulmonary resuscitation training, evidenced by
134	obtaining and maintaining a current certificate in
135	cardiopulmonary resuscitation.
136	(9) FEE SCHEDULE.—The agency shall modify any state
137	Medicaid plans and implement any federal waivers necessary to
138	implement this section and shall establish a Medicaid fee
139	schedule for home health agencies employing a home health aide
140	for medically fragile children at <u>minimum rate of</u> \$25 per hour
141	with a utilization cap of no more than $\underline{12}$ & hours per day <u>and 40</u>
142	hours per week, per medically fragile child. The utilization cap
143	of 40 hours per week, per recipient may be exceeded; however,
144	justification must be provided as to why there is no other
145	qualified provider available, and the request must be approved
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146 by the home health agency and the managed care plan.
147 (10) FEDERAL APPROVAL.—The agency shall seek necessary
148 federal approval, including seeking the appropriate federal
149 waiver, to:

(a) Allow Medicaid private duty nursing specialty providers
 and home health services providers to participate in and receive
 reimbursement for services rendered under this program.

(b) Provide that the income earned under this program by a home health aide for medically fragile children is disregarded in Medicaid eligibility determinations.

Section 3. Subsection (18) of section 400.462, FloridaStatutes, is amended to read:

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400.462 Definitions.-As used in this part, the term:

(18) "Home health aide for medically fragile children" 159 160 means a family caregiver who meets the qualifications specified 161 in this part and who performs tasks delegated to him or her 162 under chapter 464 while caring for an eligible relative, and 163 provides care relating to activities of daily living, including 164 those associated with personal care; maintaining mobility; 165 nutrition and hydration; toileting and elimination; assistive 166 devices; safety and cleanliness; data gathering; reporting 167 abnormal signs and symptoms; postmortem care; patient socialization and reality orientation; end-of-life care; 168 169 cardiopulmonary resuscitation and emergency care; residents' or patients' rights; documentation of services performed; infection 170 171 control; safety and emergency procedures; hygiene, grooming, 172 skin care, and pressure sore prevention; wound care; portable 173 oxygen use and safety and other respiratory procedures; 174 tracheostomy care; enteral care and therapy; peripheral

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175 intravenous assistive activities and alternative feeding 176 methods; and any other tasks delegated to the family caregiver 177 under chapter 464.

Section 4. Paragraph (c) of subsection (1) of section409.903, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

180 409.903 Mandatory payments for eligible persons.-The agency 181 shall make payments for medical assistance and related services 182 on behalf of the following persons who the department, or the 183 Social Security Administration by contract with the Department of Children and Families, determines to be eligible, subject to 184 the income, assets, and categorical eligibility tests set forth 185 186 in federal and state law. Payment on behalf of these Medicaid 187 eligible persons is subject to the availability of moneys and 188 any limitations established by the General Appropriations Act or 189 chapter 216.

190 (1) Low-income families with children are eligible for191 Medicaid provided they meet the following requirements:

192 (c) The family's countable income and resources do not 193 exceed the applicable Aid to Families with Dependent Children 194 (AFDC) income and resource standards under the AFDC state plan 195 in effect in July 1996, except as amended in the Medicaid state 196 plan to conform as closely as possible to the requirements of 197 the welfare transition program, to the extent permitted by 198 federal law. The agency shall seek federal approval, including seeking the appropriate federal waiver or state plan amendment, 199 200 to exclude from the family's countable income any income earned 201 through employment as a home health aide for medically fragile 202 children under s. 400.4765.

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Section 5. Within 60 days after this act becomes law, the
