A bill to be entitled

An act relating to career-themed courses; amending s. 1003.493, F.S.; revising the number of career-themed courses that must be offered by a school district; requiring at least two career-themed courses to meet certain requirements; amending s. 1008.34, F.S.; revising the number of clock hours required for a certain component used to determine a school's grade; providing additional components used to determine a school's grade; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of section 1003.493, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1003.493 Career and professional academies and career-themed courses.—

(1)

(b) A "career-themed course" is a course, or a course in a series of courses, that leads to an industry certification identified in the CAPE Industry Certification Funding List pursuant to rules adopted by the State Board of Education. Career-themed courses have industry-specific curriculum aligned directly to priority workforce needs established by the local workforce development board or the Department of Commerce. School districts shall offer at least <u>four two</u> career-themed courses, and each secondary school is encouraged to offer at least one career-themed course offered by a school district must be aligned with a

regional demand occupation field as identified by the school district's respective regional demand occupations list published by CareerSource Florida, Inc. At least one career-themed course offered by a school district must be in one of the following areas: agriculture, construction or trades, early childhood education, health care, or hospitality. The Florida Virtual School is encouraged to develop and offer rigorous career-themed courses as appropriate. Students completing a career-themed course must be provided opportunities to earn postsecondary credit if the credit for the career-themed course can be articulated to a postsecondary institution approved to operate in this the state.

Section 2. Paragraph (b) of subsection (3) of section 1008.34, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1008.34 School grading system; school report cards; district grade.—

- (3) DESIGNATION OF SCHOOL GRADES.-
- (b)1. A school's grade \underline{is} shall be based on the following components, each worth 100 points:
- a. The percentage of eligible students passing statewide, standardized assessments in English Language Arts under s. 1008.22(3).
- b. The percentage of eligible students passing statewide, standardized assessments in mathematics under s. 1008.22(3).
- c. The percentage of eligible students passing statewide, standardized assessments in science under s. 1008.22(3).
- d. The percentage of eligible students passing statewide, standardized assessments in social studies under s. 1008.22(3).
 - e. The percentage of eligible students who make Learning

Gains in English Language Arts as measured by statewide, standardized assessments administered under s. 1008.22(3).

- f. The percentage of eligible students who make Learning Gains in mathematics as measured by statewide, standardized assessments administered under s. 1008.22(3).
- g. The percentage of eligible students in the lowest 25 percent in English Language Arts, as identified by prior year performance on statewide, standardized assessments, who make Learning Gains as measured by statewide, standardized English Language Arts assessments administered under s. 1008.22(3).
- h. The percentage of eligible students in the lowest 25 percent in mathematics, as identified by prior year performance on statewide, standardized assessments, who make Learning Gains as measured by statewide, standardized Mathematics assessments administered under s. 1008.22(3).
- i. For schools comprised of middle grades 6 through 8 or grades 7 and 8, the percentage of eligible students passing high school level statewide, standardized end-of-course assessments or attaining national industry certifications identified in the CAPE Industry Certification Funding List pursuant to state board rule.
- j. Beginning in the 2023-2024 school year, for schools comprised of grade levels that include grade 3, the percentage of eligible students who score an achievement level 3 or higher on the grade 3 statewide, standardized English Language Arts assessment administered under s. 1008.22(3).

In calculating Learning Gains for the components listed in subsubparagraphs e.-h., the State Board of Education shall require 88

that learning growth toward achievement levels 3, 4, and 5 is demonstrated by students who scored below each of those levels in the prior year. In calculating the components in subsubparagraphs a.-d., the state board shall include the performance of English language learners only if they have been enrolled in a school in the United States for more than 2 years.

- 2. For a school comprised of grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, or grades 10, 11, and 12, the school's grade shall also be based on the following components, each worth 100 points, except as provided in sub-subparagraph c.:
- a. The 4-year high school graduation rate of the school as defined by state board rule.
- b. The percentage of students who were eligible to earn college and career credit through an assessment identified pursuant to s. 1007.27(2), College Board Advanced Placement examinations, International Baccalaureate examinations, dual enrollment courses, including career dual enrollment courses resulting in the completion of 150 $\frac{300}{300}$ or more clock hours during high school which are approved by the state board as meeting the requirements of s. 1007.271, or Advanced International Certificate of Education examinations; who, at any time during high school, earned national industry certification identified in the CAPE Industry Certification Funding List, pursuant to rules adopted by the state board; or who earned an Armed Services Qualification Test score that falls within Category II or higher on the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery and earned a minimum of two credits in Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps courses from the same branch of the United States Armed Forces.

c. For the percentage of students who earned a national industry certification identified in the CAPE Industry

Certification Funding List, the component is worth 200 points to calculate a school's grade.

- 3. When calculating a school grade for a school comprised of grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, or grades 10, 11, and 12, or a district grade, the following apply for courses that lead to a national industry certification identified in the CAPE Industry Certification Funding List:
- <u>a. Courses totaling 150 or more clock hours do not have to be included in the same program, as designated by the name and program number.</u>
- b. Courses totaling 50 or more clock hours must align with an occupation field on the Local Targeted Occupations List for the school district published by CareerSource Florida, Inc.
- c. Courses totaling 50 or more clock hours that are included on the Credentials of Value listing do not have to be included in the same program, as designated by the name and program number.
- d. Courses totaling 50 or more clock hours that are included in the College and Career Acceleration component in one of the following areas do not have to be included in the same program, as designated by the name and program number: agriculture, construction or trades, early childhood education, health care, or hospitality.
 - Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2025.
