2	An act relating to the Florida Museum of Black
3	History; amending s. 267.0722, F.S.; specifying
4	functions and activities of the Florida Museum of
5	Black History; providing for legislative designation
6	of the permanent and temporary locations of the
7	museum; requiring a specified nonprofit organization
8	to create the exhibits for the temporary museum;
9	establishing a governing board for certain purposes;
10	providing requirements for the governing board;
11	requiring the governing board to submit a written
12	report to the Governor and Legislature by a specified
13	date; requiring the Department of State to provide
14	certain support; removing obsolete provisions;
15	providing appropriations; providing an effective date.

17	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

19	Section 1. Section 267.0722, Florida Statutes, is amended
20	to read:
21	267.0722 Florida Museum of Black History
22	(1) There is created within the division the Florida
23	Museum of Black History. The museum, once constructed, shall be
24	a multipurpose facility capable of generating revenues to offset
25	operating costs and expenses, with archival research and storage
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26 facilities, meeting rooms, full-service banquet facilities, and 27 a locally funded performing arts theater. 28 Based on the report delivered by the Florida Museum of (2) 29 Black History governing board to the Governor, the President of 30 the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the Senate, and the Minority Leader of the 31 32 House of Representatives, the Legislature: (a) 33 Determines that the City of Opa-locka shall be the 34 permanent location of the Florida Museum of Black History. 35 Designates the Opa-locka Historic City Hall and Fire (b) 36 Station as the interim location for a temporary museum. 37 (c) Designates the Ten North Group, a nonprofit organization located in Opa-locka, as the entity responsible for 38 39 creating exhibits at the temporary museum. 40 (3) (a) A governing board is established to oversee the 41 predevelopment activities and the development and governance of 42 the museum. The governing board shall consist of no more than 25 43 members, appointed by July 31, 2025, as follows: 44 1. Two members appointed by the Executive Office of the 45 Governor. 46 2. Two members appointed by the President of the Senate. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 47 3. 48 Representatives. 49 Two members appointed by the Mayor of Miami-Dade 4. 50 County.

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51	5. Two members appointed by the chair of the Miami-Dade
52	County Commission.
53	6. Two members appointed by a member of the Miami-Dade
54	County Commission, District 1.
55	7. Six members appointed by a majority vote of the Mayor
56	of the City of Opa-locka and the Opa-locka City Commission.
57	8. No more than seven members appointed by a majority vote
58	of the governing board members. At least three of these members
59	must have 5 or more years of experience as academic scholars in
60	Black studies or African-American history.
61	(b) Members of the governing board shall serve for a term
62	of 3 years or until replaced.
63	(c) Members of the governing board shall serve without
64	compensation but are entitled to receive reimbursement for per
65	diem and travel expenses as provided in s. 112.061.
66	(d) The governing board must hold its first meeting by
67	<u>October 1, 2025.</u>
68	(e) In conducting the predevelopment activities, the
69	governing board must conduct site visits and guide the design
70	and planning phases with a focus on conceptual design,
71	regulatory compliance, and community engagement. Additionally,
72	the governing board may take an active role in securing
73	necessary funding and financing, approving detailed financial
74	models, establishing strategic partnerships, and coordinating
75	the procurement of contractors and resources to ensure that the

76	museum can seamlessly transition into the construction phase.
77	(f) By March 1, 2026, the governing board shall submit a
78	written report detailing its plans for constructing the
79	permanent museum to the Governor, the President of the Senate,
80	and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
81	(4)(a) The Department of State shall provide support,
82	including administrative support, to implement the
83	predevelopment activities of the museum. The department shall
84	also make historical artifacts, as requested by the Ten North
85	Group, available as part of the exhibits for the temporary
86	museum.
87	(b) The Ten North Group must create at least two exhibits
88	at the temporary museum within the first year of the temporary
89	museum's existence. Task Force for the purpose of providing
90	recommendations to the division for the planning, construction,
91	operation, and administration of a Florida Museum of Black
92	History. The museum shall be a multipurpose facility capable of
93	generating self-sustaining revenues, with archival research and
94	storage facilities, meeting rooms, full service banquet
95	facilities that include a kitchen capable of serving at least
96	250 people at a single event, and a performing arts theater that
97	shall be made available for private events.
98	(2) The task force shall be composed of nine members.
99	Three members shall be appointed by the Governor, three members
100	shall be appointed by the President of the Senate, and three
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101	members shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of
102	Representatives. At least three of the appointed members must
103	have 5 or more years of experience in one of the following
104	areas: tenured faculty in history at a Florida public or private
105	university; historical research and publication; archival design
106	or preservation; multipurpose public building design or
107	construction; the hospitality and service industry; business;
108	finance; marketing; law; or education. All appointments shall be
109	made no later than July 31, 2023.
110	(3) Members of the task force shall serve without
111	compensation or honorarium but shall be entitled to receive
112	reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses as provided in s.
113	112.061.
114	(4) The division shall provide the task force with staff
115	and expend funds as necessary to assist the task force in the
116	performance of its duties.
117	(5) The task force shall develop the following:
118	(a) Plans for the location, design, and construction of
119	the museum and all necessary facilities.
120	(b) Recommendations for the operation and administration
121	of the museum upon completion of construction.
122	(c) A marketing plan that may be executed by the Florida
123	Tourism Industry Marketing Corporation to promote the museum.
124	(d) A transition plan under which the museum will become
125	financially self-sufficient.
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126	(e) Recommendations for archival and artifact acquisition,
120	preservation, and research; exhibits; installations; and
128	educational materials that complement and support required
129	instruction provided in public schools in accordance with s.
130	1003.42(2)(h). The recommendations must include materials
131	relating to:
132	1. The role of African-American participation in defending
133	and preserving Florida and the United States, including, by way
134	of example and without limitation, the contributions of the
135	residents of Fort Mose, the Tuskegee Airmen, and all African-
136	American veterans.
137	2. The history of slavery in the state.
138	3. The history of segregation in the state.
139	4. Notable African Americans in this state.
140	5. Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, including the founding of
141	Bethune Cookman University.
142	6. The history of historically black colleges and
143	universities in this state.
144	7. The inherent worth and dignity of human life, with a
145	focus on the prevention of genocide.
146	(6) Before July 1, 2024, the task force shall submit a
147	report detailing its plans and recommendations to the Governor,
148	the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of
149	Representatives, the Minority Leader of the Senate, and the
150	Minority Leader of the House of Representatives. Upon submission
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151 of the report, the task force shall expire. 152 (7) After receiving the report of the task force, the 153 Legislature may consider legislation pertaining to the 154 commissioning, construction, operation, and administration of 155 the museum. 156 For the 2025-2026 fiscal year, the sum of Section 2. 157 \$750,000 in nonrecurring funds is appropriated from the General 158 Revenue Fund to the Florida Museum of Black History governing 159 board for predevelopment activities, with no more than 10 160 percent of the funds to be used for administrative expenses. Section 3. For the 2025-2026 fiscal year, the sum of 161 162 \$750,000 in nonrecurring funds is appropriated from the General 163 Revenue Fund to the Florida Museum of Black History governing 164 board for use by the Ten North Group for expenses incurred in 165 creating the exhibits for the temporary museum. 166 Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2025.

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
