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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to the Smart Living course; providing a short title; amending s. 1003.4156, F.S.; requiring students in grade 8 to take the Smart Living Course for promotion to high school beginning in a specified school year; amending s. 1003.42, F.S.; requiring that a curriculum known as "Smart Living" be included in required instruction as two stand-alone courses beginning in a specified school year; providing requirements for the curriculum; amending s. 1003.4282, F.S.; revising the number of credits certain students must earn to be awarded a standard high school diploma beginning in a specified year; requiring certain students to earn one credit in Smart Living to be awarded a standard high school diploma; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Smart Living Curriculum Act."

Section 2. Paragraph (f) is added to subsection (1) of section 1003.4156, Florida Statutes, to read:

1003.4156 General requirements for middle grades promotion.—

- (1) In order for a student to be promoted to high school from a school that includes middle grades 6, 7, and 8, the student must successfully complete the following courses:
 - (f) Beginning in the 2026-2027 school year, the Smart

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Living course as described in s. 1003.42(2)(w).

Section 3. Paragraph (w) is added to subsection (2) of section 1003.42, Florida Statutes, to read:

1003.42 Required instruction.-

- (2) Members of the instructional staff of the public schools, subject to the rules of the State Board of Education and the district school board, shall teach efficiently and faithfully, using the books and materials required that meet the highest standards for professionalism and historical accuracy, following the prescribed courses of study, and employing approved methods of instruction, the following:
- (w)1. Beginning in the 2026-2027 school year, a curriculum known as "Smart Living" must be implemented in two stand-alone courses for students in grade 8 and in grades 9 through 12, respectively. The Smart Living curriculum must be centered around preparing students for life after graduation as adults. The curriculum must cover practical subjects deemed necessary to transition effectively to and function in adulthood. Such subjects must be divided appropriately between the two courses required under this subparagraph and must include, but need not be limited to:
- a. Financial literacy, in addition to the requirements of s. 1003.4282(3)(h), including, but not limited to, all of the following:
 - (I) How to create a personal budget.
- (II) How personal credit works, including using a credit card and applying for different types of loans.
 - (III) How to manage debt.
 - (IV) How to file a tax return.

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- (V) The home-buying process, including home insurance.
- (VI) How to write a check, including signing such check in cursive writing.
- b. Personal future planning, including, but not limited to, all of the following:
- (I) Career readiness, such as exploration of one's own personality and passions.
- (II) Postgraduation paths, such as college, trade school, and full-time employment.
 - (III) Creating a resume.
 - (IV) Applying for scholarships.
 - c. Critical thinking and decisionmaking.
- d. Practical knowledge for situations an adult may find himself or herself in, such as changing a car tire or doing home maintenance.
 - e. Reading and writing in cursive.
- f. How to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), including the need to create a Federal Student Aid ID, documents and information required to complete the FAFSA, and how to interpret a FAFSA submission summary and a financial aid offer.

The State Board of Education is encouraged to adopt standards and pursue assessment of the requirements of this subsection. Instructional programming that incorporates the values of the recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor and that is offered as part of a social studies, English Language Arts, or other schoolwide character building and veteran awareness initiative meets the requirements of paragraph (u).

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Section 4. Paragraph (g) of subsection (3) and paragraph (a) of subsection (9) of section 1003.4282, Florida Statutes, are amended, and paragraph (i) is added to subsection (3) of that section, to read:

1003.4282 Requirements for a standard high school diploma.-

- (3) STANDARD HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA; COURSE AND ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS.—
- (q) Credits in electives.—School districts must develop and offer coordinated electives so that a student may develop knowledge and skills in his or her area of interest, such as electives with a STEM or liberal arts focus. Such electives must include opportunities for students to earn college credit, including industry-certified career education programs or series of career-themed courses that result in industry certification or articulate into the award of college credit, or career education courses for which there is a statewide or local articulation agreement and which lead to college credit. A student entering grade 9 before the 2023-2024 school year must earn eight credits in electives. A student entering grade 9 in the 2023-2024 school year through the 2025-2026 school year or thereafter must earn seven and one-half credits in electives. A student entering grade 9 in the 2026-2027 school year or thereafter must earn six and one-half credits in electives.
- (i) One credit in Smart Living.—Beginning with students entering grade 9 in the 2026-2027 school year, each student must earn one credit in Smart Living to prepare for life after graduation. This instruction meets the requirements of s. 1003.42(2)(w).
 - (9) CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION GRADUATION PATHWAY

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117 OPTION.—Beginning with the 2019-2020 school year, a student is 118 eligible to complete an alternative pathway to earning a 119 standard high school diploma through the Career and Technical 120 Education (CTE) pathway option. Receipt of a standard high 121 school diploma awarded through the CTE pathway option requires the student's successful completion of at least 18 credits. A 122 123 student completing the CTE pathway option must earn at least a 124 cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale.

- (a) In order for a student to satisfy the requirements of the CTE pathway option, he or she must meet the GPA requirement and:
- 1. Meet the requirements in paragraphs (3)(a)-(d) and, additionally, for students entering grade 9 in the 2023-2024 school year and thereafter, paragraph (3)(h), and for students entering grade 9 in the 2026-2027 school year and thereafter, paragraph (3)(i);
- 2. Complete two credits in career and technical education. The courses must result in a program completion and an industry certification; and
- 3.a. For a student who enters grade 9 before the 2023-2024 school year, complete two credits in electives or work-based learning programs. A one-half credit in financial literacy may be included in the two credits of electives; or
- b. For a student who enters grade 9 in the 2023-2024 school year and thereafter, complete one and one-half credits in electives or work-based learning programs.
 - Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 2025.
